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Jella Lepman. New perspectives on her life and work

Anniversary conference

International Youth Library, Blutenburg Castle 4. – 5. September 2024

To date, there has not been any comprehensive examination of Jella Lepman's life and work. First and foremost, it is Jella Lepman's personal testimonies, especially her autobiographical account "The Bridge of Children's Books", that have shaped the public image of the founder of the International Youth Library and the International Board on Books for Young People (IBBY) and continue to do so to this day.

Little is known however about how Jella Lepman lived and what she did during the Weimar Republic, when she worked as an editor for the daily newspaper "Stuttgarter Neues Tagblatt" and founded and edited a women's supplement. At that time, she was involved in politics with the centre-left liberal German Democratic Party (DDP) in Stuttgart and was friends with numerous fellow party members who, after 1945, were to contribute to the establishment of the Federal Republic of Germany, including Theodor Heuss.

We know next to nothing about Jella Lepman's years in exile in London, where initially she stayed afloat financially doing odd jobs, and later worked for the BBC. During this time, she wrote the essay "Women in Nazi Germany", published under a pseudonym, in which she portrayed German society in the Weimar Republic and during the first years after 1933, focusing on the role of women. Likewise, there is hardly any information about her private life, friendships, and relationships. Very few diaries, personal letters, or other private documents have survived in public archives or in the International Youth Library.

Reasonably well-documented is the post-war period, with Jella Lepman's work for the American regulatory authority, her struggles with founding the International Youth Library, her commitment to the library during its early years, her role in establishing IBBY, and her relationship with Erich Kästner. However, even this phase of her life is mostly accounted for on a mere descriptive level. A thorough examination of Jella Lepman's literary works, of her concept of childhood, of her Jewish identity, or her relationship with her American employers is still lacking.

On the occasion of the 75th anniversary of the International Youth Library, this conference will attempt to take a fresh look at Jella Lepman's life and oeuvre and, for the first time, to shed light on lesser-known and unknown aspects of her personality and achievements.
