PRFFACE

With great pleasure we present to you the 2016 edition of our annual catalogue »The White Ravens«. This year, white raven pilots, navigating through a sky filled with books, grace the cover. They have been imagined by Dutch illustrator Annemarie van Haeringen, one of whose books was featured in the 2015 »White Ravens« selection.

The »White Ravens« catalogue is the most important annual publication of the International Youth Library. It aims to promote quality in children's book publishing and has become an increasingly useful tool for anyone interested in looking beyond national borders. This year, the »White Ravens« contain a selection of 200 notable children's and young adult books from 60 countries published in 42 languages.

The printed catalogue is published prior to the Frankfurt Book Fair. For decades now, all recommended books are put on display in hard copy at the International Youth Library's booth at the

Bologna Children's Book Fair. This tradition allows booth visitors to peruse the books at leisure, leafing through their pages and exploring them.

In addition to being featured in the printed catalogue, from this year on the reviews, bibliographical data, and book covers are also available in the new »White Ravens« database at our website www.ijb.de.

The Library receives a vast number of donation copies and review copies over the course of every year. It falls to our language and children's book specialists to set aside new publications that catch their attention and strike them as noteworthy and that they want to recommend to an international audience. Books are chosen for the list based on the universal relevance of the themes they address, their literary and pictorial qualities, or their innovative approaches or design.

Our Library's staff have long relied on various means to acquire a well-grounded overview of the

topics, trends, and people involved in current international children's and young adult literature: They read new publications in the original languages, visit important international book fairs, scout and gather information, maintain contact with publishing houses, institutions, organisations, and other experts, and they also engage in conversation with the research fellows at the International Youth Library, foreign scholars who have a profound knowledge of the literature of their home countries.

The Library's in-house staff members in Munich cover many literary regions, and freelance readers and advisors are charged with monitoring and tending to further languages and countries. The "White Ravens" catalogue thus presents a unique selection of 200 books that cover a highly diverse range of voices. Its international nature results from the efforts of approximately twenty children's and young adult book experts, who are tasked with sifting through the thousands of books received annually by the International Youth Library.

Sincere thanks are due first and foremost to the countless publishers who have been supporting the work of the International Youth Library for decades through their book donations. I also extend my gratitude to all those who have contributed to this catalogue both abroad and here in Munich.

I hope the »White Ravens« fall into the hands of many curious readers, and that these readers make many new discoveries. May the selected books, along with their creators, receive the international attention they deserve. We hope that our work contributes to this goal.

This picture book shows what it is like to be torn between closeness and distance, companionship and loneliness, rejection and acceptance. After an elderly man picks up a miserable tomcat in the street and takes him home, the two of them initially have a great time together. They eat, watch television, and even sleep in the same bed – until one day, the cat becomes too impertinent. The old man tries to get rid of him, but in vain. Whether abandoned at the neighbour's or the butcher's, the cat returns each time. A long journey by bus, train, and ship to the chilly South Pole is supposed to solve the problem once and for all. Yet, when the man reaches the final destination at the end of the world, he simply doesn't have the heart to desert the tomcat. He says »Let's go home« and gathers him in his arms. Maya Fadawi has created lively colour pictures to accompany the humorous and touching story. They perfectly visualise the changeable relationship between the two protagonists. (Age: 4+)

The award-winning publishing house Dar Onboz publishes a wide variety of books, each of which is unique and particularly beautiful. This picture book, too, stands out for its illustrations, the elaborate design, and the poetic text. It tells the story of young Adhar, who lives in a town that has been swallowed by the sea seven times and rebuilt seven times. However, unlike the town, which weathers all catastrophes and has multiple lives, human beings only have one. When Adhar's mother dies, he is forced to bury her. His grief, his tears, and his anger are presented in a poetic and melancholy way both in the pictures and the text. The enigmatic colour illustrations and the text are rife with symbolism and metaphors. They recount the boy's individual fate but also talk about the bigger picture, such as war, destruction, and new life that grows out of the ruins. Enclosed with the book is a CD on which the text is read accompanied by background music. (Age: 10+)

Margarit Minkov was known far beyond Bulgaria for his plays. Less well known is that the author, who passed away in 1997, also wrote outstanding stories and anecdotes for children. This aspect of his oeuvre is featured in the first volume of an impressive book series in his honour being published by Žanet 45 Press. Ljuba Chaleva's (b. 1974) illustrations are intriguing, as they filter Minkov's stories, each of which is only two or three pages long, through a suitably absurd lens. In Minkov's stories anything can happen. Not only do all things and creatures have their own personality and attitude, the stories also make Minkov's fantastical ideas plausible concerning the what, how and why of Earth's events. For instance, we learn that birds invented flying only because their legs were tired from all the walking, and that a dachshund's long body is best played as an accordion. (Age: 8+)

The students of a sixth-grade class gather together under a willow tree at the occasion of their completion of elementary school. There, each of them buries an object, which in that individual's eyes symbolizes his or her future, and also a note that states what the student most wants to forget from school life up until now. Five years later, they meet again to dig up their wishes and memories and to learn how their lives have gone in the meantime. The seemingly harmless game suddenly turns serious as it becomes clear that life has not treated all of them kindly, as old tensions and conflicts flare up, and painful memories are brought back to life that some would rather have left buried. In her award-winning novel, Dolors Garcia i Cornellà fleshes out the psyches of the various characters and the complex relationships within the group in a very convincing way. The level of suspense rises continually, as the short chapters gradually develop from everyday school stories into a captivating thriller. (Age: 12+)

Even today, the story of Hachiko the Akita dog touches many people around the world. The pet of the Ueno family in Tokyo, he waited every night at the nearby train station to greet his master when he came home from the university. After the death of Professor Ueno, nothing could dissuade the animal to keep waiting, day in, day out, until nine years later, when he died in 1935. Hachiko, still venerated in Japan today, has been honoured by statues, books, manga and films. The amazing story of the dog who was so very human and who stands for unerring faithfulness, loyalty and patience inspired Catalan author Lluis Prats to create this version of the tale, which certainly speaks to readers of all ages. The author expertly composes the text, accompanied by Zuzanna Celej's atmospheric water colour illustrations, and tells the story of Hachiko and of life in Tokyo more than eighty years ago in beautiful literary language. A mixed group of wild animals in a barren land, eager to seek shelter from the burning sun, fall into a fierce fight after they spot a tree. It is the biggest and strongest of them that finally gets to sit under it. The tree, however, has bare branches and provides the winner with scarcely any shelter. The plot shifts as the animals see a pair of humans, a father and son, go by, the boy walking in the shadow of the man. The cat begins to beckon the rat into his shadow, the dog follows suit with the cat, then the leopard, the bear, and the rhinoceros... The page size enlarges as the shadow grows, until finally, all animals stand together under the large shade of a cloud. A thoughtprovoking story! Multi-award-winning author Cao Wenxuan is the first Chinese writer to win the Hans Christian Andersen Award in 2016. This is his second collaboration with Yu Rong, a British-Chinese illustrator who won the Golden Apple at the Bratislava Biennial of Illustration in 2013 for her picture book »Yun duo yi yang de ba ge« (A myna is like a cloud). This picture book offers a charming combination of prose and photographs. In assuming a Bajau child's voice, the author introduces readers to the simple, unique life of the Bajau people in Semporna, Malaysia. There are the wooden cabins built on the surface of the sea, the old canoes floating on their own reflection in the blue water, the busy parents striving for their family's livelihood, and the cheerful children who don't know their own birthdays and ages. The text is lyrical and the photography visually absorbing. Peng Yi is a renowned writer, translator and researcher of children's literature. He was a great advocate of fantasy writing and its study when the genre was introduced into China in the 1990s. His »Tu hua shu: yue du yu jing dian« (Picture Books: Reading the Classics), first published in 2006, was a pioneering, popular book for those interested in picture books in China; it has since received much critical approval. With his third picture book »Ba yao ren de hai zi«, he's thrilling his readers even more. (Age: 7+)

In recent years, Chinese children's literature has dedicated many books to the history of the War of Resistance against Japanese Aggression (1937-45). »Jiang jun hu tong« turns out to be one of the most successful. The story unfolds in Peking, where the General Hutong was once the mansion of a mighty general in the Qing Dynasty, General Tu. Though descended from a privileged Manchurian family, after the Dynasty's end the general inherited only the title and lifestyle of the gentry. However, he was not an idle and wasteful man, working hard to make a living on his own and to resist the Japanese invaders. The story is told through the voice and perspective of Dabao, the grandchild of a merchant family that was close friends with General Tu. The story brings to life the distinct flavour of contemporary Peking dialect and the complexity of history in a chaotic era. Shi Lei's (b. 1970) writing has been attracting critics' attention over the past couple of years. This novel won the first prize of the Bronze and Sunflower Children's Fiction Award in 2015. (Age: 10+)

The story, set in the 1960s, is about violence and betrayal as well as loyal friendship and affection. Tong Dalu finds himself in an awkward situation when he breaks an antique marble table top in his classmate Han Pingting's house. His family cannot afford to offer compensation. Han's father, a gentle intellectual, doesn't blame the boy, but instead introduces more of his collections to him, including »The Fisher Boy«, a precious Ming Dynasty china sculpture by master He Chaozong. Not long after, when the Cultural Revolution sweeps the country and Mr. Han is denounced as an evil reactionary, it is Tong and his family who help save »The Fisher Boy« from the brutality and greed of the insurrectionists. Zhao Lihong is a distinctive essayist, poet and scholar. He is editor of the influential literary journal »Shanghai Literature«. »Yu tong« (Saving »The Fisher Boy«) is his second children's novel after »The river of childhood«, both of which are set in Shanghai where Zhao spent his childhood. 

There is a non-governmental institute for autism rehabilitation in the city of Dalian, started by the mother of an autistic child, which offers free winter camp programs for cetacean assisted therapy for autistic kids. This slight but significant book is the result of Zhou Rui's investigation and interviews with a group of teachers, parents and whale tamers from Dalian. The authentic tone of Zhou's writing makes it particularly touching. This book is expected to help draw more attention to the marginalized group of autistic people. Born in 1953, Zhou is one of the most outstanding writers of children's literature in contemporary China. He is best known for his fairy tales and novels including »Yong gan li fa dian« (Barbershop Brave), »Heng ha er jiang« (General Heng & Ha) and »Zhong guo tu zi de guo cao« (Chinese rabbit and German grass). He has won many awards including the National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature and the Song Qingling Children's Literature Award. (Age: 12+)

»The forest animals enjoyed a lovely summer day. Then another. Then some lovely autumn days arrived, and all was well with the ants, squirrels, birds, deer and wolves. But the animals were waiting for something still missing. They waited for the snow, and it did not come. And so they send the birds into the skies to look. When the birds return, each one carries a snowflake in its beak. Then it finally snows.« The succinct, rhythmic language of wellknown Croatian poet Miroslav Kirin (b. 1965) lends this simple story great poetic force and conveys the feeling that one is catching a glimpse of a wellguarded secret about the world. The minimalist water colour paintings of illustrator Mingsheng Pi (b.1969), born in China and living in Croatia, in which text and picture somewhat melt into one another, support this sense of enlightenment and make »Zimska potraga« an unusual picture book. 

In this children's book, Lenka Brodecká (b.1972) admirably demonstrates how a fairy-tale setting with princesses, king and jester can provide the ingredients for a rapidly paced and quite modern detective story. A Magic Stone that protects a kingdom from evil has disappeared, and now chaos and ruin threaten. Only the two child protagonists, the princess and the court jester, can save the land by going to find the stone. The best thing about this book are its totally unexpected plot twists. They keep even experienced readers in the dark concerning who is really playing which role, whose interests are really being pursued and who is on the side of good and who on the side of bad. The illustrations by Tereza Ščerbová (b. 1982) seem at once antiquated and modern, nicely mirroring the story's style: a clever play on a supposedly familiar plot using a novel language that gives the book a genuine freshness. Clara and her grandpa live together. When Grandpa falls from the roof and has to stay in the hospital awhile, Clara must live someplace else. For almost a year she migrates through eleven different homeaway-from-homes, in the process meeting eleven grandmas – usually friends of her grandpa – each with her own special traits and lifestyle. The girl writes to her grandpa in letters and postcards, describing her experiences and feelings. He answers her by letter, gives advice, comforts her and laughs with her from his hospital bed. A wonderful epistolary novel between old and young emerges, in which fun times, but also serious feelings of abandonment and loss are aired. Olga Černá (b. 1964) displays her skill at keen humour, which brings some levity to the quite dramatic story. Thanks to the buoyant but never rowdy illustrations by Alžběta Skálová (b. 1982), as well as to the book's four different covers, this small-format edition (10,5cm x 16,5cm) is a real mini-treasure in the book case. 

Czech children's literature would not be the same without Martin Vopěnka (b. 1963). For years, he has been valued as a publisher of elaborate picture book projects and as an author of fantasy children's and young adult books, including »Spící město« (The sleeping city). In »Nová Planeta«, which won the important »Zlata Stuha« prize in 2016, Vopěnka presents a dark vision of the future. What happens when the digital elite of the human race distances itself from the rest? Two mutually independent civilizations develop: an archaic, antiquated one and a hypermodern, technologized one that rules supreme. Against this backdrop, we have a boy named Daniel, whose story has to do with trust, betrayal and familial bonds. As part of the digital elite, he is tricked by his less privileged step-siblings and forced to fend for himself in the unknown realm of the old world. Readers breathlessly accompany the boy through the suspenseful story! (Age: 12+)

Boys, boys, boys - Kim Fupz Aakeson and Rasmus Bregnhøi are two old standbys of Danish children's literature. Together they have published many picture books and illustrated children's books, and Aakesson's cryptic texts and Bregnhøi's ironic strokes always enhance one another in the best way imaginable. »Mogens and Mahdi« is a premiere, namely the duo's first co-produced comic. Here Mogens and Mahdi take centre stage, »two boys that are too big for what they are supposed to do, and too little for what they want to do.« Out of this familiar dilemma and the clash of hubris and reality, Aakeson and Bregnhøi develop highly memorable stories and trenchant comedy. Mogens and Mahdi dream of building up a world-spanning sweets business, to become karate heroes and laid-back swimming pool divers. This all only works out so-so, but the two boys naturally don't let themselves be discouraged: Happy is the man with a dose of healthy self-confidence... (Age: 10+)

Cut to a dreary auto shop in Jutland's countryside. This is the home and workplace of Morten, his parents, and of Szymon, whom they refer to as »the Pole« and who is just there as cheap labour. The family has their own take on living together and what others consider »normal«: they booze, go whoring, and beat each other up – the latter never entirely without reason. They all seem vulgar, almost bestial, but somehow they manage not to go under. When the mother dies, things get out of hand. The father beats Szymon to death in a drunken fit and winds up in prison. This is Morten's chance: he authentically restores an old American beater that had been parked in the workshop for years. His father would never have thought it possible that his son could accomplish this, and is surprised and proud. Morten tells his family story without great emotional upheaval. Readers do not learn precisely whether or how much he is suffering under the circumstances, but do experience his joy at having restored the car and to have proven he was up to the task. Zam is a zombie, who like every zombie was once a »proper« person. He is loyal to his zombie family, yet he feels torn because he also really wants to be »normal«, free and human again. Thus, in contrast to the other members of his family, Zam makes an effort to look human and to speak like the others do. He is polite, goes to school and does not eat meat. But then he bites Oskar. Zam regrets this at once, but it's too late. He is thrown from the school, and the other zombies also pay a price. The people of »Blå himmel« (Blue Sky) think that there are too many zombies, so they go out hunting for them, trap them in camps, and want them to go extinct. Jesper Wung-Sung's novel is a multi-layered parable about finding one's identity, ostracism and xenophobia in the guise of a horror story, which features plenty of blood and gore scenes. These stand in obvious contrast to Zam's civilized behaviour, thus highlighting his difference. (Age: 10+)

All the novels of Aline Sax are historical novels, capturing a wide range of themes and periods. They have been nominated for and have won several literary prizes. This very interesting novel about the rise and fall of the Berlin Wall interweaves three family members' stories in East Berlin. In the first story, taking place in 1961, the wall is built, and Julian attempts to escape to the Western part of the divided city. In the second part, we meet Julian's younger niece Marthe and her brother Florian in 1997 trying to change the regime, which leads to dangerous situations with the Stasi, the East-German intelligence service. In the last story, we meet Sybille in 1989 when the iron curtain is opened in Hungary. While Sybille's friends try to cross the border to Western Europe, Sybille returns to East Berlin to take care of her grandmother. Like in her other books, Aline Sax has done a lot of research and brings her characters to life. »Grensgangers« is a compelling novel about a part of modern history we should never forget. Even without text, all these little stories are easy to follow. On the double-spread pages many renowned painters and their artworks can to be spotted. Minimalist visual information on these artists can be found on the end papers of the book. Thé Tjong-Khing's (b. 1933) books are appreciated by children and adults alike. In the Netherlands, he was awarded the Golden Pencil three times, as well as the Woutertje Pieterse Prize. In 2010 he received the Max Velthuijs Prize for his entire oeuvre. »Kunst met taart« is a work of art of its own. (Age: 4+)

In this book, the author does not begin with the war, but portrays the lives of the animals from the beginning to end with genuine concern. Readers thus get to know the story of Kali the rhinoceros, Hans and Grietje the bears, and a group of chimpanzees, which seem like family. A sad and poignant detail is that the zoo was about to be relocated outside the city centre, and the new location was nearly ready, but too late for a lot of the animals. Jouke Akveld delved into archives and carried out interviews to chronicle the amazing wartime history of Blijdorp Zoo and its inhabitants. Martijn van der Linden's photorealistic pictures show his love for animal illustrations. (Age: 10+)



While doing all kinds of jobs, Jeroen only thinks about one thing: How will he be able to fulfil his dream of becoming a famous artist? Later, he becomes the artist of nightmares. 2016 marked the 500 year anniversary of his death. Since there is not much information on Bosch's youth, the author and illustrator use historical information about the city of 's-Hertogenbosch and about paintings made by members of the Bosch family in order to reconstruct a possible sketchbook of the young painter. The interesting and sometimes humorous information, in combination with the beautiful, imaginative sketches, often in brown tint with colourful accents, give a lively portrait of the early years of the famous painter (c. 1450-1516) we know so little about. At the back of the book, fragments of Bosch's fourteen bestknown paintings supplement the text. (Age: 11+)

In a very accessible style, Ted van Lieshout also gives insight and an introduction into many different aspects of poetry. He discusses several rhetorical devices, always giving inspiring examples, which will stimulate young people to play with language. Ted van Lieshout studied at the Rietveld Academy in Amsterdam and worked as a designer before moving on to writing and illustrating children's books. His work is in a constant state of growth because he is always looking for new styles and techniques for writing and illustrating. In 2009 he received the Theo Thijssen Award (the Dutch state prize for children's literature), and in 2014 and 2016 he was shortlisted for the Hans Christian Andersen Award. (Age: 10+)

Themes such as good and evil, guilt and innocence are very well worked out. The images and the typography are hand-printed in letterpress, silkscreen or woodcut, each showing unique qualities and interact to create a unique visual language. The book was first published in a limited edition and later in a regular print edition. This hard-cover edition, offset-printed in bright pantone colours, has a cloth spine with a manually printed screen-print ornaments. The book received the Dutch illustration commendation »Vlag & Wimpel« in 2016 and was named one of the fifty best designed Dutch and Flemish books in 2015. Merlijne Marell completed a Bachelor's degree in illustration at Willem de Kooning Academie in Rotterdam and a Master's degree at the School of Arts in Ghent (Belgium). (Age: 7+)

This novel presents an amazingly strong psychological portrait of a troubled boy. The book consists in three parts, of which the middle one is a diary written in an awkward, boyish style. The last part answers the question whether Elmer will win his personal battle for freedom. Daan Remmerts de Vries once again demonstrates his stylistic skills and his great talent to give psychological insight into young teenage boys. (Age: 10+)







In early 1965, a student protest movement - the Freedom Ride - reaches Walgaree, and Robbie eventually finds the courage to take a stand; a decision that changes his life in more than just one way. Sue Lawson's latest young adult novel is based on true events and tackles a difficult chapter in Australian history. This inspiring and fast-paced story shows a believable protagonist, who overcomes his own fear and shyness to fight for what he believes in and make a difference. (Age: 12+)

In 2009, when Tohby Riddle was working on the illustrations for »The Return of the Word Spy« – Ursula Dubusarsky's second book about the English Language - he became »increasingly interested in visual information and the extent to which you can show any information visually.« This was the beginning of his own project: a visual book of grammar. Containing basic grammatical concepts, the square little volume leads young readers from simple letters, words, and word classes to more complex aspects of phrases, clauses, and sentences. Yet instead of just offering dry rules, this well-researched work is brimming with different colours, textures, typography, and pictures. These serve as wonderful mnemonic devices helping readers to playfully understand matters such as the six different types of nouns or the difference between »me« and »I«. The funny examples and nonsensical combinations make this a highly entertaining and memorable introduction to English grammar. (Age: 8+)

However, author and illustrator take the biblical story of Joseph and Mary's flight to Egypt with baby Jesus as the starting point to tell a version of the tale that is both contemporary and timeless. Just like the Holy Family 2000 years ago, this modern family is forced to flee their home town and cross an inhospitable desert in search of a new home. The oppressing charcoal pictures in dark shades depict vast landscapes, the terrifying tanks, and the huge fires caused by bombs, as well as the unforgiving heat and howling winds that almost drown the parents' hope. The simple but engaging text and the powerful and dismal double-spread illustrations make the harsh reality of a refugee family's journey an almost tangible experience. (Age: 8+)

Mutual respect is the only power that can save the teenagers. Award-winning author Karen Bass skillfully combines survival drama, mystery, thriller, and Cree mythology to craft a fast-paced fantasy novel well anchored in the real world. At once a gripping read and an ethnographic study, »The Hill« successfully transcends didacticism. (Age: 12+)

»Charming« and »whimsical« best describe this slender volume one would expect to find in the gift section of an old-fashioned bookshop. It tells the adventures of Miss Petitfour and her sixteen feline friends, adventures neither too small nor too big but »just the right size – fitting into a single, magical day.« And magical they are. Using carefully selected tablecloths as her means of transportation, Miss Petitfour takes off through the air, her sixteen cats holding on to one another. The charm of this book resides in the love of language and storytelling. The omniscient narrator adopts the tone of a cat- and pastry-loving Mary Poppins, gently but firmly instructing readers in the art of narrating a story (including literary devices such as digression and plot triggers such as »then one day«) and instilling the love of long and complicated words such as »perambulator«. Emma Block, well known for her vintage-style magazine illustrations, perfectly captures the tone with her gouache-and-pencil-crayon illustrations. (Age: 8+)

In »Betty«, he remembers Helen Betty Osborne (1952-1971), a young native woman who was abducted, assaulted, raped, and murdered. He dedicates Betty's story to the »close to 1,200 missing and murdered Indigenous women in Canada, that they be honoured and not ignored.« Scott Henderson's black-and-white illustrations add the power of visual storytelling. The graphic novel rescues Betty from being just another statistic. Readers learn about the young woman's ambitions and the mechanisms of racism, sexism, and indifference. The importance and urgency of sharing stories like that of Betty is underlined in the narrative frame: A young man receives a post on his Facebook page – a notice from the Winnipeg police looking for a young missing Indigenous woman. He clicks to share. (Age: 14+)



Through Zahra's captivating first-person narrative, which deftly alternates between her present life and memories of her early childhood, readers get glimpses into the joys and dangers of everyday life in Somalia, the difficulties of growing up between two cultures, and the danger of FGM. Craigie has created a strong heroine who stands up to her family to break the circle of a traditional practice that killed her older sister. (Age: 14+)







Renowned Nigerian-American author Nnedi Okorafor has written several fantasy and sci-fi novels for adults and children. In her picture-book debut, which won the Children's Africana Best Book Award 2016, she tells the story of a young girl who wakes up in the middle of the night to find a giant chicken wreaking havoc in their kitchen. Is it a mischievous spirit or might it be a friend? Young Anyaugo summons all her courage to find out. The funny tale, set in a Nigerian town during the New Yam Festival, offers young readers a glimpse into "the fascinating" masquerade culture of West Africa«. The engaging text is accompanied by vibrant digital illustrations that put a spotlight on the two main characters: the glowing giant fowl and the shy little girl. Founded in 2015, Lantana Publishing is a small publishing house dedicated to multicultural and diverse picture books. Their growing list features stories set in cultures around the world, such as Syria, Iran, China, India, Nigeria, and more. (Age: 5+)

Sri-Lankan writer Mike Masilamani's first book initially started off as a short story, which then was performed as a play, before Tara Books editorial director Gita Wolf picked it up and suggested to turn it into a book. The gruesome story is set in Sri Lanka during the civil war - but could take place in any war zone – and recounts the hardships of a young boy in a refugee camp. Rather than offering a straight-forward realistic story however, Masilamani has chosen a »darkly satiric« narrative of the »Civil War of Lies« and infused it with an unusual cast of idiosyncratic (partly animal-like) characters, who point out the absurdity of war. The Boy Who Speaks in Numbers - while everyone else speaks in colours - encounters friends and foes in the »Kettle Camp«, such as the Lying Lizard, the Constantly Complaining Cow, and the Important Aunty and her Peons. Matthew Frame's poster-art-like red-and-yellow illustrations capture both the cruelty and the surreal moments of the tale. (Age: 12+)



In the lavishly illustrated boxed set »The Storyteller and His Bag of Myths«, renowned paper expert and storyteller Neeta Premchand gathers three myths about great floods from different cultures. The simple retellings of tales from the Bible (Noah's Ark), the epic of Gilgamesh, and Hindu mythology (Manu and the Flood) all revolve around the big questions of immortality and death, human sins and God's - or the gods' - revenge, and a new beginning. The texts are accompanied by exquisite matt collage illustrations in a stylised and allusive design. The collages for each picture book volume were created by cutting and tearing shapes from handmade paper adorned with rich intricate patterns in silver and gold. Hand-carved wooden blocks were used to print the waves, swirls, zigzags, etc. The carefully produced set of books is a treasure that points out the striking similarities between creation stories from around the world and celebrates traditional forms of arts and crafts. (Age: 4+)

Irish illustrator Nicola Colton's first picture book is an Irish version of Little Red Riding Hood. The witty tale is set in a parallel-world Dublin that is infused with magical characters. On her way to her (witch-) granny's house, little Fiona – clad in her favourite red raincoat - encounters a giant, a monster, and a dragon. Luckily enough, they all turn out to be far less dangerous than anticipated and gladly come to her rescue when she is attacked by the sly wolf, who had secretly followed her on his red bike. In the end, they all sit down together for a yummy slice of cake and a mug of witches' brew. Colton's simple, repetitive text draws small readers into Fiona's adventures. The double-spread stylised pictures in warm colours feature several of Dublin's famous landmarks (some slightly twisted), which turn the story into an entertaining mixture of modern and realistic vs. timeless and magical. 

Deirdre Sullivan is the acclaimed writer of a witty trilogy about adolescent Primrose Leary and her everyday craziness. »Needlework« however is a much darker book. This complex novel is written from the point of view of teenage girl Ces, who was sexually and physically abused by her father, as was her mother Laura. When Ces and Laura eventually leave their tormentor, and her mother slowly seems to fall apart, the girl has to work part-time and take over all of the household chores in addition to her school routine. Her dream of becoming a skilled tattoo-artist is the only thing that keeps her going. The captivating first-person narrative that skips back and forth between childhood memories and the stark present is interspersed with short factual but also lyrical passages about tattooing that bind the story together. Ces is a strong protagonist who refuses to be defined by the rape and struggles hard to take control of her life again. (Age: 16+)

Kate De Goldi, one of the most renowned New Zealand authors, writes powerful stories for all age groups. Her latest masterpiece is an epic saga with multiple layers: stories within stories told from various viewpoints. It's the portrait of a bustling High Street and its residents, first and foremost twelveyear-old budding filmmaker Barney Kettle and his eleven-year-old sister Ren, producer, list-maker, and excellent speller. While the determined siblings are busy with their latest film project interviewing all their neighbours, some of whom get completely carried away with telling their own life stories (creating digressions à la Tristram Shandy), a mysterious zine suddenly turns up. Who are Orange Boy and Crimson Girl? This is just one of the questions that readers will want to find out. This funny, witty, wonderful, and heart-breaking homage to Christchurch's High Street before the 2011 earthquake will keep readers from 9 to 90 spellbound until the very last page. (Age: 9+)

The single- and double-page spreads in muted tones clearly show that the feathery megalomaniac manages to incur the wrath of animals and humans wherever it appears. With deliberately sketch-like lines full of brio, the illustrator easily depicts the other characters' exasperation and thus

exposes the bird's self-delusion – which leads to an

unexpected and hilarious (but cruel) end. (Age: 4+)

Based on a short story that was originally published by the FunDza Literacy Trust, the book deals with a number of very challenging issues including the widespread homophobia and racism that young people in African countries face. After years of growing up at her grandmother's home in the countryside, fifteen-year-old Nana is finally reunited with her parents and older sister in Cape Town. Yet city life is different from what the teenager expected: There is a lot of violence, her refugee neighbours - two siblings from Zimbabwe - are openly bullied and discriminated against, and when Nana realises that she has fallen in love with the girl next door, even her family turns against her. It takes Nana a lot of courage and determination to stand up for her love (Age: 12+)

True to her form, however, award-winning illustrator Lizi Boyd has created a visually stunning book about opposites that's different – not only in respect to its tall, narrow format. Starting with »Big Bear – little chair«, this book offers a kaleidoscope of unusual word pairs such as »little umbrella – Big Bird« and »Big Forest – little tent«; in the third part of the book, the concept is extended to three pairs: »Big Mouse – little bus – tiny driver«. It isn't until the very last double-spread, that the book's secret is revealed: Every single page is the setting for a story that Big Bear and little bear, a (grand-)parent and child, share with each other. Bold graphic illustrations in black-white-and-grey with small red elements as eye-catchers provide visual springboards from which readers are invited to jump and dive into witty stories. (Age: 3+)

Little CJ is disgruntled. It is raining, and he wonders why, every single Sunday after church, he and his grandmother have to hop on the bus that takes them right across the city to a run-down suburb to help in a soup-kitchen. With patience and imagination, his Nana manages to show CJ that beauty and fun can be found in the most unexpected places. Matt de la Peña has crafted a touching story about a typical Sunday in the life of a young African-American boy and his beloved grandmother. The short, poetic text celebrates both the protagonists' special relationship and the »music in everyday life«. Christian Robinson transforms the text into colourful illustrations that he created with »acrylic paint, collage, and a bit of digital manipulation«. His bright angular pictures, which are reminiscent of the style of Ezra Jack Keats, aptly reflect an urban setting and feature a lively bunch of characters from different cultural and social backgrounds. 

Gary Golio's evocative free verse text is as playful, quick, and associative as the two friends' bebop he describes; while Ed Young's sketchy and vibrant illustrations perfectly visualise the rhythm and atmosphere of the music. Award-winning Young's swirly lines in blue-greens (for Bird's saxophone) and red-pink-orange (for Diz's trumpet) fly across the brown-paper pages, merge and separate again, and culminate in an explosion of colours. An afterword gives readers some background information and invites them to experience the joy of bebop themselves through various Internet sites and recordings. (Age: 6+)

Oppel's powerful firstperson narration, which constantly switches between dream and reality, creates an oppressive atmosphere with the wasps becoming increasingly threatening as Steve tries to revoke his original decision. This frightening atmosphere is heightened by Jon Klassen's dark illustrations. The psychological thriller raises questions of perfection, disability, and what is "normal" and worth living. 





Yet with his camera as a constant companion, T documents his unique view of the world and tries to find and highlight beauty in everyday life. When the bullies target his new friend, a homeless woman called Lucy, and beat her to death, T needs to find a way to use his pictures to brave his terrifying tormentors and reveal their crime. Interspersed with captivating black-and-white photographs, Canadian author Emil Sher's text tells a story about a courageous boy, but also about truth, different viewpoints, bullying, the power of friendship, and perseverance. In addition, the story's special focus on the works of photographer Diane Arbus makes it a celebration of the art of street photography. The moving book was shortlisted for the prestigious Canadian Governor General's Award 2015. (Age: 12+)

Noelle Stevenson's debut follows the adventures of the title character, a spunky teenage shapeshifter with incredible powers and a mysterious past. Nimona is an aspiring supervillain who admires the work of Lord Ballister Blackheart and cleverly convinces him to hire her as his sidekick. Together, they work to bring down the Institution and Blackheart's nemesis, the valiant Sir Goldenloin, who may not be as heroic as he seems. They soon learn that the Institution could be developing a covert weapon with the power to poison the population's food supply. But Nimona too might be hiding some dark secrets of her own. »Nimona« started as a webcomic before being published as a graphic novel; Stevenson has expertly woven together a thrilling, laugh-out-loud story that blends both fantasy and science fiction. »Nimona« defies readers' expectations, artfully explores the grey areas between good and evil, and cuts down stereotypical comic gender representations and roles. 

This playful book is about the truth of assertions, the reliability and subjectivity of perception and about how much can seem true using the power of the imagination. In the story, a little rabbit rejects the reality of anything that displeases him or that he is afraid of. He successfully navigates the dangerous forest by simply »denying away« the mean wolf and foxes. He survives the cold winter saying »No, it's not cold!« and is happy when spring arrives, because his statement is finally true. Kertu Sillaste brings things in picture and text to the point: Rabbits always make it work! (Age: 3+)

But, phew, it was just a joke, because there's no Wilbert to be seen in the crocodile's open maw. But he's not anywhere else. Now rat and crocodile look together, until rat finally finds her friend: Wilbert hid himself under a tree! The crocodile remains befuddled, because he still can't see Wilbert, a giant hippopotamus! The picture book with illustrations done in Oskarsson's characteristic laconic style cleverly uses the dramatic device of page-turning to create surprise moments that imitate the hide-andseek game. 

In this book, Franco-Malian amateur boxing world champion Aya Cissoko tells the life story of her mother Massire and of her own childhood and youth by her mother's side in Paris. With much wisdom and also when needs be with severity, she accompanies her children on their ways to maturity. She supports her rebellious daughter Aya as the latter seeks to gain a foothold she isn't finding at school, but instead in the tough discipline of boxing. Cissoko's second novel honours her close but not conflict-free relationship with her mother, who educated her daughter on the central value of dignity (»Danbé«). 

The only rescue is to read »Teño uns pés perfectos«, which answers wondrous questions: Why do feet smell like cheese? Who knew that there's a difference between Egyptian, Greek and Roman feet? How does the foot »machine« work – and why do we have five toes anyway? Even though the book sheds selective, if not comprehensive light on all things feet, it covers some very enlightening facts. To be sure, the pictures by critically acclaimed illustrator Gusti make no claim to scientific exactness, but their wittiness inspires one to take a closer look at feet. (Age: 7+)

The literary debut of filmmaker Nana Ek'vt'imišvili (b. 1978) is tough stuff indeed. Awarded the Georgian Litera Prize, this book explores a place of hurt. In a Tbilisi border district, eighteen-year-old Lela lives in a »boarding school for intellectually challenged children.« She cares for the younger ones, does the drudge work, knows the hopes and life stories of the children, including those of the supposed heroes who have made it out of the »school for crazies«. Lela, who sometimes sells herself to finance her friend Irakli's English classes, knows the school's dark secrets by her own experience. Vano, the history teacher, abuses new arrivals, and Lela wants to kill him for that. »Msxlebis mindori« is a hefty young adult book about interacting with intellectually disabled people, exploited dependencies, low self-esteem and the insane idea that one can master one's own destiny. 

Good thing that someone was being improper and can now warn the family! The picture book »Different, and not like that whas a charming retro print aesthetic and an unassuming text, which makes it anything but mainstream. The bird consoles the rhino, saying that things are perfect as they are – the big rhino offers a perfect place for the bird to land and rest. The two animals complement each other in their contrastive nature, as do the text and illustrations in Heinz Janisch's und Helga Bansch's new picture book. Suggestive repetitions punctuate the whole text, while the individual lines on each page look and read like poems. The elliptical texts open up a wide associative realm by drawing on synaesthetic connections, for instance: »The rhinoceros is coming. Earth is shaking. The stillness now smells different.« Bansch's rhinocerine studies are just as striking. Capturing the rhino from different perspectives - head-on, from behind, from the side, up close and at a distance – as well as detailing his rough hide make the rhino feel quite real. One can nearly feel it, as one

strokes across the paper. (Age: 2+)

Gabi Kreslehner's coming-of-age novel separates itself from the pack due to its unusual protagonists and their relationships to each other, due to the book's structure, and especially due to the writing. Told from various perspectives, one learns not only of Paula, her wishes and desires and her guilt at sometimes complaining about her brother, but also of Paul's perception of the world. He is a word-finder and word-inventor who loves to play with sounds, syllables and meanings – a term like »sea water« might become »seaswellwaterseashellwater.« (Age: 14+)

In this way, Luna Al-Mousli's very personal book becomes a book for everyone. It has political dimensions, but also invites readers to identify and encourages them to tell their own stories. One quickly notices that all 63 contributors (59 of whom are professional illustrators, the other four children) consider very different things to be dumb (Nazis, tax bills, fighting...). One also notes a variety of techniques and styles: watercolour, coloured pencil, acrylic, print; naturalistic, caricature, grotesque. This book is ripe for many look-throughs, which will encourage comparing, art-making and storytelling. Though more artists could be included, the book also provides a good view into the present state of German illustration. That is why the title »The best of all « is certainly apt. (Age: 3+)



All readers will have great fun in this upside-down world. Bold coloured pencil drawings in various formats and clever play with flowing text and speech bubbles give this funny story an extra boost. Aside from the »Hinundherhering« (here-and-therring), which is an invention of children's poet Frantz Wittkamp, the book contains rhymed and illustrated verses about polar bears, frogs, lions, and a variety of other beasts. There are also many non-animal-related poems and pictures. Uwe-Michael Gutzschhahn's selection is wide and encompasses a broad time frame. It reaches from Lessing and Chamisso to Janisch and Kreller. Great masters of nonsense such as Ringelnatz, Morgenstern, and Gernhard are of course also there. Some of the selected poems are genuine classics always present in poem anthologies. 

The book tells the story of an excursion; the quite minimal text is enhanced by its being embedded in a word search cloud. The opening phrase of the story - »Many little animals« - stands amidst a »wordflurry« of »PANDAPONYPARKURCHINPLA-NEDESERTGERBIL«, for instance; »they once set out« is surrounded by terms such as »dump truck« and »skate boarding.« The word-flurries ground the tale in a literal sense in that they are placed on the lower third of the book pages, while the various animals romp about on top of them – in a boat, in a balloon or on foot. This takes the idea of interweaving text and image to a whole new level. The »word-flurry worlds« animate readers and onlookers to gaze, search, embellish and always find new things, so that exciting new adventures beckon with every new leaf-through and read-aloud. (Age: 4+)

In her novels for adults, Annika Scheffel creates an atmosphere that hovers between the magical, spooky, and bizarre. She does the same here, in this unusual children's book. Nelli, her mother, and her pet pig are on the hunt for Nelli's father in a strange foggy place that they cannot find their way out of. When Nelli's mother also disappears, the girl must draw upon her own resources. She meets odd characters along the way, whose minds the foggy place seems to have »fogged« up. Not everything is obvious from the get go, so this book will elicit questions. An experienced reader will note the central motives of the fog society: order, security and how questions and mistakes are handled. With rules in place like »No crouching,« the whole thing dives into the absurd. Told from Nelli's perspective, one passes through carefully described scenery and accompanies the protagonist on her investigations into the oddness of the place. This novel offers up many things: adventure, spookiness, enjoyment, and social critique. (Age: 10+)

At first closely tied together, the fates of these three drift apart after the fall of the Berlin Wall. Birgit Weyhe modelled the fictional characters of Basilio, José and Annabella on numerous conversations held with »Madgermanes« – how people of Mozambique working in East Germany were called. The lives of Basilio, José and Annabella are illustrated using a limited colour palette of brown, white, black and grey, which reflects both the GDR and Mozambique. 

When all fifteen-year-old boys are set to be recruited as cannon fodder for the war against Iraq, the family decides to flee. Their route takes them over Turkey to Germany, East and West Berlin, Karlsruhe and Heidelberg. The escape takes over two years and wears at the nerves of the parents. The children are less anxious and more robust, but they do sense the insecurity. While Mehrnousch Zaeri-Estfahni tells her story as a fantastical parable in the book »Das Mondmädchen« (The moon girl; Knesebeck Verlag, 2016), she slips into her childhood self in »33 Bogen und ein Teehaus,«, enabling the reader to sense the experience of homeland and of voicelessness along with her, as well as the little joys and moments of good fortune. (Age: 12+)

»Fish!« the otter yells. »Behind the bush, behind the mountain, in front of the lake!« Quickly the other otters pack everything up: pots and spoons for stirring, sage, thyme, and rosemary. Mmm, what a feast this will be! »There, there, there! There's the fish!« The otters are very excited. There on dry land lies the fish ... almost a tasty dish already. But only almost! Because the otters don't want to eat the fish after all, but instead put him in an aquarium, call the whole thing »Cinema under the stars« and intently watch him as he swims. »Fish!« is fun to read not only because of its surprising twist. Short sentences, one-word sentences, as well as repetitions and onomatopoeia make the text rhythmical and give it pace and energy. The colourfulness of the pictures – muted brown and green hues - and their minimalism offer a calm counter-balance. (Age: 2+)

It is the story of a king who at the birth of his triplet sons plants an apple tree. On their seventeenth birthdays the tree bears three apples, which one by one are stolen by a dark figure. The clues lead to a dragon in the underworld, who has captured three girls whom he wants to seduce using the apples. After the brave youngest prince kills the dragon, frees the girls, is betrayed by his brothers and then is reconciled with them, a triple marriage ensues. The important artist and former university art lecturer Hambis Tsangaris lives and works in the Cyprian village of Plataniskia, where he directs a lithography museum. His muchpraised work is strongly connected to Cyprian traditions, as are the lithographs in this book, which are characterized by bright colours and ornamental lines. (Age: 7+)







They arrive at their own insights and learn to live as tolerant people. It brings together ten short stories that all unfold in the future - in the year 2040. Many of the texts are concerned with environmental destruction through ore mining and oil drilling, with social tensions and the negative effects of progress, such as the loss of a Greenlandic identity and traditional ways of life. All these themes have long been in the air in Greenland. The pitch of the texts varies; while many of the stories are rather dystopian, the tone is often not pessimistic or depressed, but defiant and self-aware. Just like Greenland's young generation. When she discovers worms underneath the deck who are helping themselves to the enormous fruit reserves, Noah comes to look, bringing the chameleons to the stock room by chance. The two animals decimate the number of worms, thereby saving all the Ark's passengers from starving. In her first children's book, Yael Molchadsky emphasizes the role of Noah's wife in the story of the Ark and shows that every creature is important and has a specific role to play. Orit Bergman's colourful, humorous illustrations, which bear some folk art elements, give expression to the individual traits of the Ark's creatures. (Age: 4+)

In Dóra Elekes's taboo-breaking young adult book, the oppressive, suffocating atmosphere of living with an alcoholic parent breeds a mixture of emotions ranging from abandonment, shame, helplessness and guilt, along with both love and hate for one's own mother. The author allows the reader to experience the dramatic situation only from the perspective of the child protagonist. Thus it is only gradually revealed that the various jinns (spirits) who, from the child's perspective, have taken possession of the mother, are in fact the various symptoms of alcohol addiction. This scant 37-page-long foray into misery leaves us with an open ending: the child brings the drunk, shivering mother to bed and turns off the light. (Age: 12+)

After some bickering they agree on a new name for the doll: Sri and Santi merge into Srinti, who becomes a token of remembrance and a means to cope with the traumatic event of the Yogyakarta earthquake of 2006. Sofie Dewayani is a University teacher, a writer and publisher and the head of the Litara Foundation, which aspires to improve the literary standard of Indonesian children's literature. 



The first »Sawaru meiro« volume (2013) was selected in 2015 for IBBY's »Outstanding Books for Young People with Disabilities« list. Its sequel, »Sawaru meiro 2«, includes eleven new Braille mazes which can easily be traced with the fingers. They are printed with embossing ink and are designed like traditional Japanese patterns. Even weak-sighted children will be able to perceive the beautiful, colourful geometric structures. Thanks to its accordion format, the pages of this truly unique and universally appealing cardboard book can be spread out so that several children, both visually impaired children and children without disabilities, can enjoy the book at the same time and have a lot of fun together. Since some of the mazes are challenging, readers can use the fingers of both hands to find the way through the mazes along the labyrinthine dotted lines. (Age: 4+)

It is difficult to explore the theme of war guilt from a child's point of view. »Sekai no hate no kodomotachi« is special in that it deals with war guilt as experienced by three young girls of different cultural and social backgrounds. Their friendship with one another in the vast land of Manchuria, which Japan occupied in 1932 and then colonized, has greatly influenced their stormy lives – marked by family members' deaths, abuse in the orphanage, being fostered by loving Chinese foster parents after having been separated from the family during the harsh escape, discrimination and loss of the native language. This book is written for adults, but as the book shows how Japan can establish better relations with neighbouring countries to find the path to world peace, it can also be read and discussed by young adults. Based on meticulous research, this vivid and poignant narrative will touch the heart of teenage readers. (Age: 16+)



Luīze Pastore and Elīna Braslina landed a coup in Latvia with their »Mākslas detektīvi« (Art detectives) series, which was awarded the prestigious Janis Baltvilks Prize in 2015. As in the other volumes of the series, in »Neredzamais cilvēks« (The invisible man) child detectives Teo and Poga delve into Latvian art history in search for clues to solve the caper. When Poga's dog Comma disappears, the two children step into Kārlis Padegs's (1911-1940) famous 1935 painting »Boot and dog« to search for the missing canine. In the process they learn why the painting depicts a pair of boots without a human owner at least not one who's visible. Writer Pastore and illustrator Braslina, who develop the plots together, craft their stories to be suspenseful, funny, entertaining and informative. The style in which each story is written and illustrated varies greatly, since each is meant to fit the respective style of the painting that is the focus of each detective story. (Age: 7+)

An old scientist named Karl Darwing – a nod here to evolutionary theorist Charles D. – is tramping through the snow to retrieve his mail from the mailbox. But what it that? Tracks! There are tracks everywhere. Who's made them? Dotty old Darwing feels the itch to investigate and dreams up various hypotheses explaining each set of tracks: a bird with a broken leg, for instance, may be responsible for the one-step track, a trio of burglars left the six tracks behind, there was a cat and a limping dog... an octopus... car tires wearing boots... nothing is impossible! Ultimately, Mārtiņš Zutis's (b.1988) marvellous picture book debut is not about solving the riddles of the tracks, but about counting and playing with numbers. That this can be a thoroughly engaging activity is proven by the book's lively illustrations, which focus on funny details and offer much situational comedy. (Age: 3+)

Four bird fables by Leonardo da Vinci are presented in this unusual board book project, which was nominated one of the most beautiful Lithuanian books of 2015. »Sparnuotosios raidės« is one of the first children's books of the country designed for both sighted and blind people. Graphic designer Vilmas Narečionis (b. 1964), for whom this is the first foray into children's literature, has created strange bird collages. While the bird figures are an attraction for sighted readers due to their visual presentation, the illustrations can also be experienced tactilely through embossed silhouettes of the birds and through the use of different embossed patterns which, for instance, reveal the structures of the birds' beaks. The text is also available in Braille; in addition, the accompanying CD offers an enchanting audio version of the stories. A great project! (Age: 5+)

That is the name of this book's protagonist, and just as her name begins with an S, so too does the name of the boy who played violin at the funeral and orders a cortado at the café - his name is Simen. He asks for a »cortado«, while everyone else in Sun's village orders plain old coffee. Sun now lives alone with her grandma, since her father died after falling off a crane at work. It was at his funeral that Simen played. Sun cannot believe that her father is not there anymore, that pillar of strength with an Elvis quiff and a big heart. But despite her grief, she has feelings for Simen. Is she allowed to feel that way? Does she want to? Yes, she wants to. Guro Hoftun Gjestad's first young adult novel is cautious in tone, but even with all the tragedy first-person narrator Sun reveals a penchant for self-deprecation and humour. (Age: 14+)

The pictures in this book are lush and often cheerful. Plants and animals are on view, saturated green and beaming white, but also grey and black, empty landscapes and the expansive heavens. The one who calls herself Death wears black, but she has a red-andwhite flower in her hair and rides a red bicycle. Her glance is open and not threatening, and she seems gentle and friendly. She visits everyone: big and little animals, big and little people, young and old people, even those who are not yet even born. »Jeg er Døden« recalls in text and image Kitty Crowther's »La visite de petite mort.« It has a melancholic but also wise tone. The lyrical language is enhanced by its being set to verse: »Livet og jeg / bor sammen / i hver eneste kropp.« (Life and I / We live together / in every single body). Death is a part of life, it has to be so that new things can grow and live. A comforting insight. (Age: 4+)

Hanna and her grandma are on their way to visit Grandpa. He does not live at home anymore, because he keeps forgetting more and more things. Hanna doesn't exactly understand what is up with Grandpa and why he behaves so strangely. When they arrive, he asks her who she is, and gives her his hand instead of just taking her onto his lap and cuddling her. Hanna does not know this Grandpa. But then he begins to sing, and all of a sudden they are close again. »Jeg kan følge deg hjem« is a touching book about a child who misses Grandpa, and about a grandfather who loses himself. Not only the text but also the pictures reflect this insecurity. Akin Duzakin creates symbolically moulded spaces – forest, darkness, emptiness - that capture the vulnerable and hurt presence of a person who no longer knows who he is. But they also show the flare-up of joy, when he is close to his granddaughter again for a few moments. (Age: 6+)

»Monika grabs the dictionary. She goes to the letter S< and moves her index finger down the page. She stops at the word >sadness.< I open my dictionary and locate >understand.<< The first-person narrator in this novel experiences what Ludwig Wittgenstein observed: »The limits of my language mean the limits of my world.« In this story, an Argentinian au pair girl in Norway becomes painfully aware of the fact that, without language, there can hardly be any closeness, any »I«. If one lacks words, one cannot express what one is thinking, nor what one is feeling. One becomes invisible. Veronica Salinas, herself from Argentina, has written her novel in her adopted language of Norwegian. With precision and without pathos, she describes loneliness and sadness, but also persistence, since the first-person narrator gradually masters the language and the country, even though she remains "an other. "Og« (And), the novel's ultra-concise title, hits the mark: the narrator develops new facets of herself, without forgetting her roots. (Age: 14+)

Mari and Torger are a couple. Mari is interested in design, art and yoga, while Torger is more a kind of average, boring business-degree type. Mari has not been feeling great about the relationship for some time, as Torger tends to be a know-it-all and all in all is too conservative for his open-minded and inquisitive girlfriend. When a new roommate moves into Mari's apartment, who not only has a very unique hobby, but also knows interesting people, Mari distances herself more and more from Torger. She falls in love with August and soon wants to try what he does: pierce her skin with hooks and then let herself be suspended by them. Mari is always searching for new physical and psychological challenges, because they make her feel most alive. Heidi Sævareid's second book is a very worthwhile read, because it doesn't play out in a mainstream milieu and because the author succeeds in creating a multifaceted protagonist and in describing plot events in a detailed, yet not sensationalist way. Romsås is a city district in Oslo with many high-rise buildings. Mariana lives there with her parents and her little brother. Her older brother is in jail, and this hangs over the family like a shadow. It burdens Mariana, who really just wants to be young and to live. Mariana's father is from Chile, her mother is Norwegian, and she goes to a school where the »potatoes« - ethnic Norwegians - are in the minority. Mariana talks about her dreams and fears, her family, of small and big conflicts, her friends and of Mu2, her love interest. In its linguistic liveliness, its crew of characters and its setting, the story somewhat recalls »Tigermilch« (2013) by German author Stefanie de Velasco. Mariana has no qualms about calling a spade a spade. She offers up no correct and proper »potato Norwegian« script, but an original, very energized text full of wrong syntax, neologisms, »Norwegianisms« and Anglicisms. This simulated chattiness builds the story's momentum. (Age: 14+)

Telling the story of a fairly unusual trio, this picture book tackles the topic of loneliness and community. The story opens with a white horse that becomes separated from its herd and runs away. In an orchard, the horse finds a red apple that was overlooked at harvest time and now hangs on the branch all by itself. The two of them travel on together – the apple comfortably tucked under the horse's mane, until it suddenly plops into a brook. A field worker leaves his work, fishes the apple out of the water, attaches it to the white's mane, and sets off with these two into the happy ever after. Renowned author, poet, and scriptwriter Ahmad Reza Ahmadi's poetic text is accompanied by Rashin Kheiriyeh's cheerful double-spread colour illustrations, which perfectly mirror the story's fairytale-like atmosphere. A felicitous contrast is achieved through the unusually designed text pages by Kuroush Parsanezad. Their lines placed against a coloured background as well as the silhouette-like horse vignettes emanate a certain elegance. (Age: 8+)

In six stories, young Setareh talks about her daily life at school and in her family. She feels for her friend Azar, who is punished severely for a mere trifle. At home, she has to silently endure that her mother constantly favours her brother, simply because he is a boy. The unequal treatment of the siblings culminates when Setareh is asked to hide her excellent school report from her brother, so that he, as a boy, doesn't feel ashamed of his own unsatisfactory results in front of his sister. The mother also forbids her daughter to participate in the literature class at school; in her opinion, the girl should be content and grateful that she is allowed to go to high school at all. These everyday examples, told from Setareh's perspective, clearly point out what it means and how it feels, when girls are not treated equally within their families and society. (Age: 10+)



On her birthday, Ziba would like to go on an afternoon jaunt with her father, who has been living in a psychiatric hospital for years. She wants to tell him how much she has to endure from her stepfather. For one thing, he ripped the earrings she inherited from her grandmother out of her ears to make money from them. Even though her drug-addicted mother witnessed the scene, she wasn't able to defend her daughter. The stepfather didn't even shy away from sexually harassing Ziba. Eventually, a new path opened up for Ziba, when she took refuge in a girls' home. At their outing, Ziba realises that her father's health is deteriorating – another thing with which she will have to come to grips. In this bitter story, which is rather unusual and open for Iranian young adult fiction, Farhad Hassanzadeh draws a direct and unmitigated picture of the teenage protagonist's life. 

Ravens are clever and sociable birds. No surprise then, that the curious and courageous little raven girl in this book »discovers« an elephant and makes him her friend. True, he is completely different, not least because he is unbelievably tall, but these are mere details. Full of joy and enthusiasm, she tells her mother how lucky she is to have found a friend. When the mother realises who her daughter is talking about, she voices concern – typical adult - and lists several reasons allegedly pointing against this pachyderm. For her daughter, however, appearances are unimportant. She won't let herself be talked out of this friendship; instead, she comes up with convincing counter arguments. This amusing story about otherness, prejudice, and friendship is captured in pictures rendered in various shades of grey - perfectly suitable for the protagonists' feathers and skin. In an imaginative way, the pictures illustrate the disagreement between mother and daughter, which, in the end, doesn't manage to stop this friendship. (Age: 4+)

A big book with a lot of space! And cartoonist Piotr Socha (b.1966) fills that space in the best way imaginable. This non-fiction picture book buzzes with many useful, intriguing, and curious facts about bees and honey. The meaning of the bee dance is explained just as cleverly and wittily as the biometric comb structure of the bee hive; we learn, for instance, how surfers copied the design for their surfboards. The sections on the »cultural history« of bees offer special comedy: knob-nosed stone-age people find out how tasty honey is, Napoleon makes the bee into his crest animal, and cross-eyed Roman lady aristocrats bathe in milk and honey. The illustrations take up the most room in this large-format book and draw readers in to the entertaining text on the lower part of the pages. No wonder »Pszczoły« won many prizes in Poland – it's been a long while since such a beautiful book about bees was made. (Age: 5+)



The book features widely divergent visual configurations, ranging from awkward and odd collages, to clean-lined computer graphics, to gentle water-colour paintings, to eerie grey pencil drawings. The seven illustrators represented in this book have each illustrated two to six poems. 

The bone-dogs and librarian-skeletons wandering around in the book are not really scary, but rather amiable negative prints of this world.



The computer program Work & Dream makes it possible to imbue computer game avatars with feelings – to the point that the avatars not only can smell aromas or feel empathy for other gamers in the virtual world, but they can also experience extraordinary pain that can lead to death. Sixteen-yearold orphan Mika carries heavy emotional baggage into a computer game where one must wage battle for the moon Io. She becomes increasingly dependent on the game. In truth, Mika has been given the task to spy on the other gamers and find out more about their true identities. This is because a school mass shooting took place in the real world that started – police believe – in this virtual world. In 2015, this unbelievably suspenseful book was chosen by IBBY Poland as the best young adult book of the year. It doesn't vilify computer games or claim they inevitably elicit murderous aggressions. Instead, it examines the role of the gaming industry and the development of games that intermingle realities in appealing ways. (Age: 13+)



The tragic love between the Portuguese prince and later King Pedro the First and the Castilian noblewoman Inês de Castro has been deeply nested in Portugal's cultural memory since the 14th century and numerous authors have already broached it literarily. Roger Mello, Brazilian Andersen Award winner for illustration, shows once again in »Inês« that he also writes marvellously. Told from the perspective of Beatriz, the second of four children from the illegitimate liaison between Pedro and Inês, we learn how both lived out their unconditional love against all obstacles, political scheming and social norms, until Pedro's father, King Afonso, had Inês murdered. Years later, Pedro revenged himself in a macabre way, by forcing the royal household to pay respect to Inês' exhumed corpse. Mello's melancholic, rhythmic, melodic text is complimented by Mariana Massarani's atmospheric, stirring illustrations. Against the colourful, flat background, the characters, drawn with soft pencil, seem like silhouetted actors on the stage of a paper theatre. (Age: 7+)

So-called »difficult« topics are not infrequently presented in a somewhat laboured way in children's books. This little, unimposing picture book masterfully shows that this need not be so. The text could hardly be any shorter, yet every word in this story is well placed. In it, a girl tells of her parents' divorce using partly metaphorical and cryptic, though still absolutely reasonable linguistic imagery. The family house symbolizes the intact family. One day it sinks under water; fishes swim in the eyes of the mother, while toads carry the father's feet away. In the end, each half of the bifurcated house becomes a whole house; one for the mother, the other for the father - and both a home for the child. The quiet text is illustrated with light, subdued colour pictures. Harmonizing with the emotional moods of the family, they are calm and spare at the story's start and end. In the dramatic middle part, they are dark, gripping and fill up both pages. (Age: 6+)

Told on two different temporal planes and from several narrative perspectives, this masterfully constructed novel transports the protagonist and the readers to Brazil at the end of the 18th century. In a museum for religious art, Martim admires an intriguing illustrated book of hours discovered in excavations of the monastery that formerly occupied the museum site. This triggers an exciting adventure for the teenager that leads him to the year 1795. It is his mission to find his vanished classmate Clara, a science-fiction fan and time-travel expert. In fast-paced chapters that shift between now and back then, the secret of the breviary is gradually revealed. Important roles are played by a Benedictine monk named Brás and also by Akin who lives in a quilombo, which is a settlement founded by escaped slaves. The novel brings to life this portion of Brazilian colonial history in a captivating and informative way that grips the reader from page one. (Age: 12+)

The illustrations and texts unfold separately in this series, which at this time contains three fairy tales. The pictures come first; the text follows at the end of the book. Rosinha uses the Brothers Grimm version of »Little Red Riding Hood« as the basis for her interpretation, adding a further twist at the end by introducing a second wolf. The text is not necessarily needed, though, since the big, mostly doublespread illustrations speak for themselves. They can be »read« alone or can serve as inspiration to tell the story from memory or even to make up a new story. The pictures use a palette of black, white, and red tones as well as opal green; their abstractness, dramatic perspective and movement are captivating. Many scenes are shown only in sections, and some details are zoomed in on. The wolf in particular is portrayed ravishingly: he slips through the woods as a threatening black shadow, ensnares Little Red Riding Hood and greedily gapes open his giant mouth full of sharply pointed teeth. Her little vignettes create a panopticon of curiously angular, round and zigzag fantasy creatures. Due to their abstraction, they neither explain the poems nor simply mirror their contents. Instead they interpret the poems in a lively way, without overshadowing them. The CD accompanying the volume is a special addition. Margarida Mestre recites the poems, speaking, singing or in sing-song, quietly, loudly, rhythmically or dance-like. Her voice is accompanied by experimental, playful and magical sound-miniatures, which António-Pedro and other musicians coax out of percussive, wind and plucked instruments as well as out of plastic bags, keys, nylon threads and other things. One day the militia comes to the door of this shy, sometimes misanthropic codger and makes him offer board to a transient traveller who had to flee his war-torn home. The texts are short. rich and entertaining, the colourful illustrations are descriptive and funny. This is an informative book for leafing-through, marvelling over and reading together. Norma Huidobro's quick-paced story is written in fluid, highly readable language and with a healthy dose of humour. The multi-perspectival structure also makes reading enjoyable. Also entertaining are the disclosures of Tamara, one of the characters, who presents her view of things in a blog. Her readers offer a wild range of comments and contribute a further background chorus of voices to the crime mystery. (Age: 14+)



Gradually it becomes clear that his is a special biography. The people there are, like in innumerable other places, pawns in the long-enduring civil war or participants in the fight between government troops, guerrilla fighters, paramilitary forces, police and drug dealers, all of whom keep the land hobbled. The first-person narrator and his friend Julián, inseparable since their childhoods, join a guerrilla group at thirteen because life offers them no other alternatives. In brief chapters using concise language, the book paints an oppressive picture of an everyday life in which children and teenagers confront violence and death; it also conveys the protagonist's feelings of love, friendship, loss, grief and his attempt to find a place to live as well as a place in life. Italian illustrator and author Chiara Carrer broaches the secrets of the fascinating, endlessly varied universe of plants in this book that resembles a notebook or diary. She draws using a diverse array of techniques or paints with a strong and colourful brushstroke. Some pages are line-based, others colour-based, some things are minutely worked out, other things cast sketch-like onto paper. Carrer follows things to their origins, studies them in detail, compares them, categorizes flower pistils, muses about seeds, roots and the silhouettes of tree crowns. Some pictures are informative, other associative. The texts follow suit: some are scientifically precise, others fleeting and allusive, including some precious poems and aphorisms. Carrer is also sensitive to the sound and texture of words, as when for example she places smooth, shiny, fissured, scaly and gnarled tree barks side by side. »Antes no había nada« is a surprising, sensuously rich and personal book that invites readers to repeatedly let themselves be absorbed by it. Argentinian author Alberto Laiseca (b. 1941) turns Hans Christian Andersen's »Story of a mother« into an even darker parable about a mother who stoically sacrifices herself to win her dead child back. In »La partida« by Mexican author Alberto Chimal (b. 1970), a woman receives the soul of her deceased child back from the gods, which turns out to be an even greater misfortune, as the corpse continues to decay. The short texts evoke the poetic, suggestive sounds and rhythms of old myths and fairy tales and are illustrated by Argentinian Nicolás Arispe (b. 1978). His electrifying double-page black-and-white drawings are dramatic, mysterious, pregnant with symbolism and literary and cultural allusions. (Age: 10+)

It is real, ever-present and causes the adolescent boy physical pain. This leads to some grim and disturbing scenes. Alonso suffers, is frustrated and engages in self-destructive acts to handle the pain. His condition worsens noticeably, until dramatically in the end the bird leaves his abused body. Catalina Kühne has written a stirring and unsettling narrative, where the borders between reality, imagination and fantasy are fluid and cleverly blurred. The concise text with its placid and figurative language permits multiple interpretations, thanks to the many things left unsaid. (Age: 13+)



At home, too, quite a few things are topsy turvy, and finally the protagonist herself lifts off and floats away over unknown places. Even time seems to halt momentarily. The next morning everything is back to normal. The fish is released into the wild and allowed to float in the water again. Red and free. This wonderfully simple yet profound picture book by Ximo Abadía (b. 1983) shines in every respect. The double-sided illustrations consist almost entirely of colour swaths, soft, open and only hinting at shapes; they glow intensely. The lively, poetic text, too, drifts like a feather and carries one off as one reads. (Age: 5+)

Reading this four-volume book series, whose texts first appeared almost fourty years ago at La Gaya Ciencia Press, one can't help but be astounded and sobered at how the political and social issues have lost none of their relevancy. The significance of this publishing project becomes apparent when, in the newly added epilogue to the volume »Así es la dictadura«, the editors count about the same number of dictatorial, autocratic regimes in existence as there were at the end of the 1970s. The almost squareshaped, beautifully designed volume is replete with new illustrations by Mikel Casal (b. 1965), whose aesthetic and colouration recall picture books of the 1960s. Text and illustration do not focus on any concrete example but instead prototypically describe how dictators think, how they exert their repressive reign and quash all resistance. The endpapers provide concrete examples by lining up twenty-four infamous dictators of the 20th and 21st centuries. (Age: 7+)

Enrique's life abruptly changes into an adventure-filled, fast-paced crime story with all the essentials: villains, drugs, police, chase scenes. The listless boy has to jump-start himself – to escape. His escape is also a coming of age and coming to terms with the past, which reconnects him with his father. Luis Leante (b. 1963) employs an unusual style for his fluidly written, dialogue-rich novel. Enrique himself tells the story, addressing his remarks to his father. This soliloquy to an absent »you« helps him accept and better understand himself. (Age: 13+)

An elephant with his unbelievably long trunk is definitely not normal – that is the unanimous opinion of the other animals, despite the fact that he does incredible and very helpful things with it. For instance, it becomes stairs for a frail monkey to climb, a rocker for a young sleeping antelope, and a clothesline for a zebra's black stripes to dry on. All wonderful things, but still not normal! The hippo mama is especially suspicious and hostile, until she experiences for herself how such an abnormal elephant can even be a life-saver. There's no question, this book has a moral and a message. But these are offered to little readers in a friendly, unimposing way through the imaginative text and the cheerful, dynamic illustrations. One of them is Alma, whom Otto's father rescues from the water while on his fishing boat and brings her home. Otto understands the crisis, but at first feels insecure and fears his place in the family will be lost. This award-winning, sensitively told children's book, narrated from the perspective of the boy, familiarizes readers with the highly timely topic of refugeedom, without being overtaxing or overwhelming. Mónica Rodríguez really understands how to capture the boy's feelings. When it is time to say goodbye and Alma leaves the family, a hole is left behind in Otto's heart. (Age: 9+)

In the end, it is still too small, as Water brings her enormous family along. Sun and Moon must leave Earth from the rooftop of their house and have lived in the sky ever since then. Only at night, the sun remembers her friend Water and sinks down low to play with her. Laura Herrera narrates this myth in a plain, natural language. Because she builds dialogue and refrains into the text, the story is well suited to reading out loud. The double-page illustrations by Ángeles Vargas are mainly kept to a palette of red, yellow and green tones; their aesthetic is reminiscent of African folk art. (Age: 4+)

After he tries to kills himself with a shotgun in an attic room at school, the first-person narrator – his name is Hugo Andreasson – is taken to Solgläntan, an institution for mentally unstable teens. There he is placed in a group with three other adolescents, including April Falk. She is pretty, wild, unpredictable, passionate. Hugo falls in love right away, but has little chance to be more than a friend to April. Hugo is an overweight nerd, who drops self-deprecating remarks to hide his issues from himself and everyone else. Despite this he is lovable and freaky. This is one reason why Hugo could also appear in a John Green novel, since in many respects Mattias Edvardsson's »April, April« recalls the coming-ofage novels of the American author. Aside from the tone and character portrayal, the setting also has something »Greenian« about it. (Age: 14+)

Daisy wants to keep it, but her great-grandma explains to her that this would not be right. At the mouse's funeral, Daisy intones a Christmas song for want of knowing an appropriate funerary hymn. A conversation about life and death ensues after the burial. Though there are other books that take a dead pet or other animal as the jumping off point for broaching the topic of death and mortality, »Gammelmor, Daisy och döden« offers something special: Daisy doesn't become alarmed by these topics, yet still her tone expresses how much she loves her great-grandma. The relationship between the generations is loving and intimate, yet the story avoids falling prey to kitsch. Lotta Geffenblad's illustrations have a good deal to do with this, as they radiate warm-heartedness without being saccharine, and they also capture the subtle humour that has a place next to sadness in the book. Iggy's facial expression leaves no doubt: being a teenager sucks. The only interesting thing is the »ödehus«, a ruined factory where she hangs out with a few people from school. One of them is Jasse, a laid-back skater. Actually a pretty cool guy... though unfortunately Iggy's best friend thinks so, too. In her novel, Hanna Gustavsson describes in a very plausible way how everything is just annoying at age thirteen. Her drawings are raw, offering an unadorned portrayal of the characters, since in the end Iggy finds just about everything awful. Following »Nattbarn« (Night child), published in 2013, »Iggy 4-ever« is Hanna Gustavsson's second graphic novel about Ingrid – aka Iggy. While »Nattbarn« explores Iggy's budding sexuality and offers glimpses into her fantasies and desires, »Iggy 4-ever« is less explicit. Here the focus is on a daily aggravation that can quickly produce high drama. (Age: 14+)

Must I follow norms and conventions in order to be liked or to be a »proper« girl? Thirteen-year-old Rosa thinks a lot about being female. She explores her body and her femininity, encounters chauvinism and sexism and asks herself why gender roles have been distributed as they are. Anna Höglund's text is reserved, and her illustrations have a careful, yet direct and expressive, line. Just like Rosa, who seems both smart and strong, as well as vulnerable and soft. In the comic that she draws, she engages with her questions and concludes, in Simone de Beauvoir's spirit, that one is not born a woman, but becomes one. »Att vara jag« shows much empathy for girls on the cusp of adulthood and also explains why women are often still treated as objects rather than subjects. (Age: 12+)

With her multi-layered adventure novel and its unusual heroine, Frida Nilsson proves yet again what a fantastic storyteller she is. (Age: 8+)

Pencil-drawn pictures appear in variouslysized panels and show a disheartened boy, whom a cloud of loneliness envelops even when amidst a great hubbub. The one thing that makes him happy is to think of the circus and circus acts. Only once he meets a giant dog named Hejdi does his life become more light-hearted and colourful. Expansive, thickly-painted colour pictures stand in clear contrast to the earlier grey on grey aesthetic. The book leaves open whether Hejdi is only a figment of Adrian's imagination. Some things seem to »really« happen, while others suggest that everything is playing out in Adrian's head. (Age: 8+)



In her novel, Jessica Schiefauer powerfully describes what happens when the world suddenly turns upside down. How did things come to a point where one's younger brother beat someone to death? Isak's family is shocked and paralyzed. Where did the family go wrong? When did little Anton become someone who would embrace fascist ideas and hurt others to a lethal degree? There are no answers. The family threatens to crumble, everyone feels guilty. Isak asks himself whether it was wrong that he spent so much time with Ester, his first great love. While the relationship between the two did break off, Ester still wants to be there for Isak and the family. She offers her help and hopes that Isak will once again turn to her and leave his tangle of rage, guilt and bewilderment behind. (Age: 14+)

She is too frightened to search for her that night. In the morning, Mom returns from the mountains, heaving a pannier on her back packed with wild vegetables, her hands and arms pricked by thorns, only to immediately hurry out again to the town market, selling the vegetables in order to support her family. Author Jessie Huang, together with the children of the elementary school in Xilin, developed the story and illustrations to reflect everyday life for a Truku child in 21st-century Taiwan. The text went through many village elder meetings, before a version was deemed to genuinely reflect Truku language. It was only in 2004 that the Truku were officially recognized by the Republic of China, after having long suffered the consequences of Japanese and Chinese colonization – including loss of land, language, identity, and culture. To give others joy - that is the solution Kalben hits upon to become happy again. Young author and illustrator Elif Yemenici (b. 1989) illustrates this melancholic story with unusual pictures. The scenes seem enlarged as if by a magnifying lens and distorted as if within a snow globe. (Age: 5+)

Since its founding in 2014, Fontan Kazok Press has been gaining notice in Ukraine for its children's literature publications. Case in point is »Viter z-pid soncya«, a story told from multiple perspectives during a summer at the Black Sea. Zhenka, the boy, and Rusya, the girl, at first only know each other by sight. As the book progresses, their paths intertwine more and more. Readers gradually learn about their problems and somewhat difficult lives. Since Zhenka's father passed away, his mother and he have suffered greatly. Rusya has to work and earn money for her family. A cat who is calmly watching the human goings-on, registering them and documenting them at a distance, provides the third perspective from which the events are narrated. These changes in perspective give the story depth. Oksana Lushchevska (b. 1982) is very engaged in new Ukrainian children's literature and was especially praised for the psychologically refined and on-point portraits of the book's characters. (Age: 10+)

One after the other, the seedling gets to know chestnut, maple, rowan tree, poplar, birch and so on with their leaf shapes, seed heads and other characteristics. Just when he's becoming a bit disheartened because no one looks like him, he comes upon a gingko tree and finally learns who he is. Kateryna Mikhalicyna (b. 1982) and Oksana Bula (b. 1989) have created a fine little story about self-discovery and the feeling of belonging, while also offering readers an excellent plant identification book for young readers. Anything but boring, the book is informative and captivating: One discovers what is special about each tree and how one can identify it. This book definitely belongs in the backpack for the next outdoor excursion. (Age: 3+)
