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PRFFACE

With great pleasure we present to you the 2017 edition of our annual catalogue »The White Ravens«. On the cover this year, beautifully designed paper birds rise into a green sky. They have been imagined by Lebanese illustrator David Habchy, one of whose books was featured in the 2016 »White Ravens« selection.

The »White Ravens« catalogue is the most important annual publication of the International Youth Library. It aims to promote quality in children's book publishing and has become an increasingly useful tool for anyone interested in looking beyond national borders. This year, the »White Ravens« contain a selection of 200 notable children's and young adult books from 56 countries published in 38 languages.

The printed catalogue is published prior to the Frankfurt Book Fair. For decades now, all recommended books are put on display in hard copy at the International Youth Library's booth at the

Bologna Children's Book Fair. This tradition allows booth visitors to peruse the books at leisure, leafing through their pages and exploring them.

In addition to being featured in the printed catalogue, from this year on the reviews, bibliographical data, and book covers are also available in the »White Ravens« database on our website www.ijb.de.

The Library receives a vast number of donation copies and review copies over the course of every year. It falls to our language and children's book specialists to set aside new publications that catch their attention and strike them as noteworthy and that they want to recommend to an international audience. Books are chosen for the list based on the universal relevance of the themes they address, their literary and pictorial qualities, or their innovative approaches or design.

Our Library's staff have long relied on various means to acquire a well-grounded overview of the

topics, trends, and people involved in current international children's and young adult literature: They read new publications in the original languages, visit important international book fairs, scout and gather information, maintain contact with publishing houses, institutions, organisations, and other experts, and they also engage in conversation with the research fellows at the International Youth Library, foreign scholars who have a profound knowledge of the literature of their home countries.

The Library's in-house staff members in Munich cover many literary regions, and freelance readers and advisors are charged with monitoring and tending to further languages and countries. The »White Ravens« catalogue thus presents a unique selection of 200 books that cover a highly diverse range of voices. Its international nature results from the efforts of approximately twenty children's and young adult book experts, who are tasked with sifting through the thousands of books received annually by the International Youth Library.

Sincere thanks are due first and foremost to the countless publishers who have been supporting the work of the International Youth Library for decades through their book donations. I also extend my gratitude to all those who have contributed to this catalogue both abroad and here in Munich.

I hope the »White Ravens« fall into the hands of many curious readers, and that these readers make many new discoveries. May the selected books, along with their creators, receive the international attention they deserve. We hope that our work contributes to this goal.

Whenever Hênd visits her aunt Suheyla, she finds her sitting on her favourite chair with a piece of fabric in her hand that she is embroidering with colourful threads. One day, Hênd asks her aunt whether embroidering ever becomes boring. From that moment on, a wondrous adventure with many imaginative elements begins. The book is carried by the heartfelt dialogues between aunt and niece, interwoven with short stories, keeping readers' attention to the last page. An accessible and flowing literary language characterize the book, along with soft drawings, whose colours pay homage to the traditional embroidery of Palestine and Jordan. Renowned author Taghreed Najjar, herself hailing from Palestine and living in Jordan, is known for tracing her own traditions in her works and conveying these to the young generation of readers by means of beautiful, entertaining stories. Jekar Khourchid has been writing stories, poems, and plays for children for ten years. The story he recounts in this book could occur anywhere, since it is not bound to a particular place or time. The unnamed protagonist is bored by her family's routine-driven everyday life. The food that her mother prepares doesn't taste good to her anymore, the advice her father gives now only give her headaches, and playing with her siblings isn't fun anymore, either. So she goes in search of an exciting new life free of tedium. She imagines being a bird, a fish, or a toy, and takes on their form. She then stumbles into funny experiences or suddenly faces insurmountable obstacles. The Kurdish author, originally from Syria but now living in exile, tells this imaginative everyday life story with gentle, poetic language. The colourful pictures are from illustrator Parisa Rasouli, of Iranian descent. (Age: 6+)

David the giant drives the citizens of the city of Sassoun crazy with his clumsiness and ineptitude, but then he saves them from external foes and becomes their hero. This appealing picture book is about the legend of this giant. Because of his strength and size he is like an elephant in a porcelain shop, yet when the decisive moment comes he knows how to use these traits. Almost as exciting as this tale is the story surrounding the book itself, written by Armenianborn, Ireland-resident, French children's book author Juliette Saumande and illustrated by French artist Julie Grugeaux. The result is a picture book adaptation of perhaps the most important legend of Armenia: »David of Sassoun«, the Armenian national epic, is at the core about the conflict between Armenian and Arab tribes in the Middle Ages. This new edition from Zangak Press in Yerevan offers the text in parallel English and Armenian translation. (Age: 3+)

In four short texts Bulgarian author and translator Jana Bukova (b. 1968) uses typical fairy-tale set ups to tell multi-faceted stories, lending great poetic power to the elementary nature of the fairy-tale plot. What is the book about? It's about a merchant whose pride lands him in hell; about a princess who teaches her suitors something about self-determination; about someone who can outrun his shadow (and death); and about a gift that at first causes more trouble than joy. At the end of each tale there's an unexpected, odd, or paradoxical twist. That it's all about the twists is wonderfully indicated by the text's layout: larger font letters aren't at the start of the story, but rather at the end, cryptically unsettling the typical format of the fairy-tale book. Concrete poetry begins every tale, framed in black like artwork. (Age: 14+)

Cousins Toni and Martin have a cool grandma, who takes photographs for »National Geographic« Normally she's jetting around the world, but after breaking her leg, she has to find subjects to photograph in »wild nature« in her home town of Sofia. Her grandsons are of course brought in on it, and after they grudgingly do some garden work, they make exciting discoveries in the world of insects, plants & co. »Gradska geografija« is the authors' second book that looks at familiar environments from an unfamiliar perspective. The first took on the world of cooking, and this one offers a successful mix of facts about flora and fauna and typical children's literature ingredients (friendship, love, identity, parents!). Co-authors Zornitsa Khristova (b. 1974) and Desislava Dimitrova (b.1967) team up with illustrator Siyana Zaharieva (b. 1982) for some fun comparisons, for instance between underground music and the creepy-crawly life in the earth. They also offer practical advice, for example how to build seed bombs. (Age: 11+)

Aluo's dream is to be the postman of Buluo Town. When the orphan boy finally realizes his dream, he finds himself facing the troublesome task of having to deliver a letter to the dark forest that nobody dares to walk into. His devotion to the job takes over, and soon he becomes a secret communicator between the town and the forest. Thus begins a series of marvellous adventures and an amazing friendship between the townspeople and the forest animals. The stories are filled with wild flights of fancy, but they might also be seen as fables that reveal the link between human beings and the other forms of life on Earth, showing how humans can escape anthropocentrism through expanding what they see and feel. The book was selected as one of the »Best Chinese Books of 2016« by the Association of China Book Review and CCTV (China Central Television). Guo Jiangyan teaches Chinese language and literature at a primary school in Jiangsu. Her fairy tales have drawn attention from both readers and critics in recent years. (Age: 6+)

This novel tells of the children growing up in a small town in northern Jiangsu province in the 1970s. Through the eyes of a child, their world is presented as a mixture of romantic innocence and authentic sophistication. One reads about the boy »White Hair«, suffering from albinism and eager to be accepted by his peers, who learns to take advantage of his disease. A bully named Ma Xiaowu devotes himself to aiding Ximei support her family. The daughter in a singleparent home feels burdened caring for her mentally impaired sister, yet protects her from abuse. Honoured with the 4th Chinese Government Award for Publishing and selected into the »Best Chinese Books of 2016« by the Association of China Book Review and CCTV, the book compels readers to rethink the experience of being a child. Recognized writer Huang Beijia is best known for her children's books. One of her award winning novels, »I Want to Be a Good Child« (1996) has seen its 100th reprinting in 2017. (Age: 12+)

This is a textless book all about the enchantment of books and the fantastic life that we may experience through reading. While a group of animals are drawn together by a book that a little girl is reading, each becomes engulfed in a dreamy world of its own. The light-hearted illustrations show interesting scenes, such as a giraffe and a crocodile drinking greedily from a book, a mouse seeking adventures in a house on the back of a long snake, a rabbit hero bravely fighting against a ferocious wolf, a fox abducting a group of chickens with a book, a worm flying high up in the night sky with a flock of birds ... There's a transformed book on every page that plays a vital role in each animal's respective dream and adventure, showing how books broaden our horizons and imaginations regarding the possibilities of life. Yang Sifan is an editor, illustrator and designer of children's books. His works display a penchant for the nonsensical, still a rare quality in Chinese picture books. (Age: 4+)

This picture book offers a lyrical view of the disappearing rice-growing culture of the Hani, an ethnic minority living by the Yuanyang Terraces in south-eastern Yunnan. Agricultural knowledge, presented mainly through the text, is accompanied by illustrations of the Hani people's daily lives. Young readers will learn about the various farming tools, the Chinese solar terms, the weather conditions necessary for a successful crop, and the many different stages a seed must go through before it becomes a grain of rice in their bowl. The book title is borrowed from an ancient Chinese poem preaching the hardship of farming and the value of food when life depends directly on nature. Yu Hongcheng (b. 1989) has been enthusiastic in introducing traditional culture through her picture books. »Pan zhong can« was selected for the Illustrators Exhibition at the 2016 Bologna Children's Book Fair and won the 5th Feng Zikai Chinese Children's Picture Book Award in 2017. The years between 1948 and 1957 witnessed a series of vital changes in Chinese society. Jixiang, a fouryear-old boy living in Beijing, builds his first impression and understanding of the world. The child's life seems just as plain and trivial as a child's life can be, as readers see him attending kindergarten and primary school. The child's world however, seems less insignificant when set against the background of the major political and social events at the time: the end of civil war, the rise of a new regime, and the subsequent political movements. This semi-autobiographical novel shows how ordinary men were shaped by society and politics, but still would cherish humane concerns. This is why it is called a »propitious« time, which is also the meaning of Jixiang's name. Zhang Zhilu is a renowned writer of children's fiction, having received the National Book Award, the National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature, the Song Qingling Children's Literature Award, and having been nominated for the Hans Christian Andersen Award in 2006. The shoe hovering over an insect on the cover merely provides a measure for the microcosm under our feet: this book recounts the life story of a rhinoceros beetle in a poetic language that is quite unusual for a non-fiction book. In summer, it emerges from underground and spreads its wings to begin the final journey of its life. At the same time, another beetle crawls into the ground and lays a row of milky white eggs before it dies. These eggs form adult beetles, through autumn, when the silent earth becomes golden, through winter, when icy winds sweep away all beauty, through spring, when the whisper of insects tells the story of countless lives seeking companions. More than hundred other creatures are hidden in the double-page drawings, each representing a crosssection of the beetle habitat. Award-winning photographer, author and illustrator Qiu Chengzong dedicates most of his books to the natural environment in Taiwan. His almost photorealistic images aren't mere documentary records but philosophical renderings of the eternal cycle of life. (Age: 6+)

For the past two years, Borna Vujčić (b. 1993) has received recognition in Croatia as a young dramatist. His debut in the realm of narrative literature, the suspenseful allegorical novel »Nužno zlo«, was much discussed by the media. The book is about a boy named Maks, who is a new student at a high school and must navigate its system of social judgment and hierarchy. The school's power structure gradually becomes clear as the thrilling plot unfolds: elections for class president are run like electoral campaigns. The class community is split into liberal, conservative, and left-wing ideological affiliations, with alliances struck for expediency's sake. Intrigues and power games, manipulation and propaganda through (social) media are all par for the course. Maks becomes part of this system, and his schoolmates become either his allies or foes. Vujčić employs these schoolmates as witnesses of the goings-on and thereby shows his feel for the dramaturgy of a text. (Age: 16+)

Petr Borkovec (b.1970) is among the most important contemporary poets of the Czech Republic. He has received many awards, and his poems have been translated into several languages. It's a stroke of luck that he collaborates with illustrator Andrea Tachezy (b. 1966) to make this fanfold book for children. Together they explore what all manner of beings, both living and inanimate, dream of. In the process, a gardener and a sailor, a bear and an elephant, and even a pencil and a crescent-shaped pastry appear in a wonderfully absurd way: the sailor dreams of cleaning up the sea and stacking all the crabs; the pastry dreams of how it is eaten; and the lethargic bear dreams of sleeping. Light and free, Borkovec employs different lyrical forms, from end rhyme and internal rhyme to free verse, while Tachezy constructs off-beat pictures out of collage, water colour and drawing. »O čem sní« is perhaps the best example of the unusual profile of young publishing house Běžíliška, which specializes in elaborate picture books and especially fanfolds. (Age: 7+)

A young man lives under the dictatorship of »A«: Everyone says, thinks and feels »A« – or is at least expected to. There are buildings in »A« form, and newspapers write articles exclusively using the letter »A«. One day the man finds a forbidden flyer with the message: »B«. New ideas germinate in him: other thoughts, beliefs, and ways of life are possible! In an extraordinary effort, the young man floods the dictatorship with books and texts containing all the letters of the alphabet. »A« is a fabulous comic by Czech illustrator Pavel Čech. With narrative acumen, Čech not only captures life in an oppressive system, but also shows how it is possible to resist and overthrow it. Aside from the symbolic letters »A« and »B«, which stand in for messages, information, and censorship, Čech's book is textless making it even more extraordinary and gripping in its expressive power. »Překlep a Škraloup« made a big splash in the Czech Republic this year. It won two of the most important literary awards (Magnesia Litera, Zlata Stuha) and is much loved by critics as well as by the public. Obviously, the author-illustrator quartet of Tomáš Končinský, Barbora Klárová, Daniel Špaček, and Petr Štěpán has hit upon the right way to tell a story about aging and transience - it requires humour and irony. Time's progress is inexorable: Things seem brand new, but suddenly they've yellowed, transformed themselves and sometimes taken on a peculiar smell. Little creatures who use special tools are behind these changes. One day, one of these creatures - »Typo«, who introduces typing errors into texts begins to search for the »source of time«, asking why everything must age and fade away, since this makes people and things suffer. The fact that young Sana Bakkoush was the central character of the last season of the successful Norwegian TV series »Skam« is a clear indicator that times are changing. This also holds true for literature. People are finally starting to tell the stories of those who have so far been given little attention: girls from Muslim families. »Skam's« Sana and Sheherzade, the protagonist of this multicultural novel, show how difficult it is for a girl or a woman to negotiate life between two conflicting worlds: family life ruled by traditional values and the completely different customs and norms of the outside world. Their lives are minefields. Sheherzade manages to strike a balance between both; yet when she falls in love with a girl – Thea, the daughter of a well-off, leftist intellectual family - everything starts toppling over. Kristina Aamand narrates this story with a knack for selfirony and a clear socially critical edge. (Age: 14+)

This book has three ribbon page markers, maybe because three different artists - two illustrators and one author - have created it. In 1992, Louis Jensen started his long-term storytelling project with the book »Hundrede historier« (A hundred stories). Since then, he has published another nine volumes in this series. To this volume, he has contributed one text, while the rest of the tales are told by Lilian Brøgger and Maria Lundén in pictures packed with lots of wit and bizarre ideas. The stories are brimming with dogs riding on bones; stars, moons, and dragons; a wedge of cheese on a surf board (one of the funniest characters); mouths with feet; frivolously grinning cats in nylon tights; and ... and ... and... The pictures invite readers to look at them again and again, to discover new things, to further embellish the tales, in short: to continue the storytelling forever. After all, the book's title was chosen for a reason! (Age: 4+)

The little finger is gone. His hand wrapped in a blood-stained T-shirt, Finn is standing in the middle of his sick brother Arne's room. Although Arne can hardly get up, he sets off with Finn in search of Finn's pinkie. On their way, the two brothers meet more or less bizarre people, and Arne slowly forgets that he is sick. What they don't find, however, is the finger. It lies at home. Finn cut if off himself to save his brother. Jesper Wung-Sung tackles similar topics as in his former books »Skolen« or »Ud med Knud«: The main question is what kind of sacrifices one can, should, or must make during a lifetime. »Lillefingeren« is reminiscent of biblical texts, of Nikolai Gogol, and of Janne Teller. It is anything but a runof-the-mill book, not least due to the drawings by Otto Dickmeiss. Their wealth of detail is reminiscent of medieval Vanitas paintings or art by Expressionist painters such as Otto Dix. They emphasise surreal and absurd things, but at the same time create and reflect on an existential dimension. (Age: 12+)

Prague | History 1950s | Murder | Crime fiction

The life of sixteen-year-old Roman Kovar from Prague changes course when the criminal Tomas Bilek escapes from prison. Roman, the son of a simple watchmaker, becomes involved in all manner of political intrigue. The book »De zilveren raaf«, which was given to Roman's father just before he died, motivates the young man's adventures. It tells about a miller who takes revenge on the murderer of his wife and child and leads Roman on his own quest to find his father's murderers. The story is set in turbulent post-WWII Prague, in a time when no one trusts anyone else. In this novel, building suspense is very important, as well as developing historical background. For the reader, it is not always easy to link all the characters because they may not be who they pretend to be. For instance, Roman's girlfriend Lenka proves not to be the girl he thought he knew. His life depends on his creativity because if he does not succeed, he runs the risk of ending up before the firing squad. Ludwig Volbeda, known for his work aimed at adults, brings to life this timeless parable about the absurdity of war and the dilemmas one can become trapped in. His drawings are packed with cannons and swords, emperors and castles, all of which tell their own fascinating stories. 

It's the winter of 1944/1945, the »Winter of Starvation« in the Netherlands. Other than watery slop from the soup kitchen, Jaap's family have barely anything to eat. His mother is a shadow of her former self, his brother Little Kees's belly is swollen with hunger. Their parents decide to send Jaap, Little Kees, and their sister Nel to the north where the food supply is better. After a distressing journey by boat, the three children have to live in separate places in the province of Friesland. Koos Meinderts perceptively describes the minor culture shock they experience: urban, Catholic Jaap finds himself in a village with a strictly Calvinist couple who, for instance, tell him not to make the sign of the cross before meals. The author tells this family tragedy, set in World War II, in his signature style that relies on precise, nuanced observations. The book's power lies in the details, often harrowing, which present a vivid picture of the time and make the suffering palpable. This gripping story can be read in light of the current debate about refugees. (Age: 9+)

Anne dies at age fifteen in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. Anne's father, Otto Frank, is the only one of the eight people to survive. Over several years, the Anne Frank Foundation in Amsterdam has been collecting children's most frequently asked questions about Anne Frank. In this informative, well-designed book the story of her life is told in chronological order in a clear and sober style. It's not only about Anne's story, but also the history of the war and the persecution of the Jews, supplemented by many black-and-white photos. There are no pictures from the time in hiding, but Huck Scarry offers colourful illustrations based on Anne Frank's diary and the house at Prinsengracht that today is an internationally known museum. 

Collaged illustrations effectively use materials from a variety of sources: photographs, catalogue advertisements from earlier eras, and printed papers with an array of textures. These materials are expertly intermingled with original drawings and embedded within engaging compositions. This charmingly illustrated book also sustains reader attention through story, as Gordon shows readers that through persistence and help from friends, dreams are achievable; and that after having adventures »somewhere else«, coming home can feel pretty wonderful too. (Age: 4+)

Twelve-year-old Iris Chen-Taylor travels from Australia to Spain on a self-described spy mission, but nothing can prepare her for what she finds at Bosque de Nubes, her great aunt Ursula's vast estate. Iris's parents have sent her to discreetly learn about her aunt's plans for the property, in the hopes that Iris and her family will inherit it. But when Iris arrives, she immediately has an odd feeling about the place, which once belonged to her late great uncle, a famous surrealist painter. She starts to see inexplicable things, like notes on a piece of sheet music dancing around like ants and giant sunflowers playing tennis. Iris and her new friend Jordi decide to investigate these strange occurrences, and together they uncover a mystery much greater and more dangerous than a simple question of inheritance. Ever since, she has suffered panic attacks and can't string the thoughts in her head into coherent sentences. Her desperate attempts of communicating with the wider world are her contemplative written poems, which she hides in various places. Manny James, adopted by a local couple, tries to escape the memories of his whole family being brutally killed during the war in his home country Sierra Leone. Meeting and slowly falling in love starts a healing process for both of them. Through two authentic first-person narratives, each with a distinctive, poetic voice, Glenda Millard tells a heart-breaking but ultimately hopeful story of pain, love, and survival. (Age: 14+)

Claire Zorn is not afraid to tackle contentious social issues in her fiction for young adults, and her latest novel is no different. »One would think the deep« is a sensitive and engaging exploration of mental illness, coupled with a provocative critique of the relationship between masculinity and violence in Australian culture. The novel focuses on a troubled young man, Sam, who recently lost his mother. Cut adrift from his former life, Sam moves in with his cousins and escapes into a world characterised by restlessness, disillusionment, and anger. Set to a soundtrack of poignant 1990s songs from artists such as Nirvana and Jeff Buckley, Zorn's sparse but emotionally rich prose gives Sam's story a depth that will linger in readers' minds long after the story is finished. Zorn offers readers an unflinching portrayal of adolescent masculinity in crisis, prompting young people to reflect critically on the ways in which society silently and implicitly endorses violence as a natural part of human experience. 

Shari Green's first book for middle-grade readers is set on a small coastal island. The author's lyrical free verse smoothly alternating between thoughts, descriptions, and dialogue, paints an atmospheric picture of a little beach community and its idiosyncratic people from eleven-year-old Bailey's point of view. Spending her summer holidays with her little brother at their grandmother's house, Bailey discovers a driftwood mermaid, finds new friends, and builds a tree house. Yet underneath the surface of the laid-back beach holiday, emotions run high. With her parents away at Marriage Counselling Camp, Bailey believes she needs a miracle to fix their problems, and while she is at it, she would also have a go at fixing everyone else's troubles: her friend Daniel's health, the growing rift between the village people, the thievery of a treasure, etc. Both funny and heart-breaking, this verse novel with its imaginative metaphors follows a spunky heroine as she slowly comes to peace with the fact that the world follows its own course. (Age: 10+)

From the usual to the unusual, from pragmatic to silly, the Liszts make lists, lists, and more lists. But on Sundays, they are »listless«, and an illustration shows the list-less Liszts in full relaxation mode, with middle-child Edward the epitome of listlessness. In this elegantly designed book with illustrations that depict extended family members attired as if from an earlier century, the arrival of an unexpected visitor marks a shift in the story. Edward has left the door open without knowing why, and their unplanned visitor requires a response. The visitor has many philosophical questions about life, and Edward does too. The importance of these questions, shown in pages filled with large, bold text, demands attention. In contrast, a colorful, wordless double-spread shows the two exuberantly exploring the world after casting aside their lists. List-making remains the Liszts' defining practice, but they learn that making room for spontaneity can turn this useful but at times consuming behaviour into something even better. (Age: 4+)

The story of the admirable and proud great auk that once populated the Northern Atlantic Ocean shows how extinction can have multiple, intermingling causes: evolution, climate change, and human intervention. Naturalistic illustrations combine wide views of the bird's rugged habitat of swirling seas and rocky shores with closer, emotional images: a fluffy chick being fed by its parent, and, later, the last known auk egg lying on a rocky ledge, broken. The final spread features clusters of other birds, including puffins, now living on Funk Island, standing next to the haunting, ghostly white outlines of the auks that once called it home. In the end, young readers will understand there is no simple lesson to be learned from the great auk's demise. Instead, the worlds of humans and animals are complexly intertwined. This sad yet beautiful tale will encourage discussion and offer hope, as the extinction of the great auk led to the establishment of modern bird conservation efforts. (Age: 8+)

A. F. Harrold blends reality and fantasy in this absorbing and moving story about the importance of family and friendship in the face of adversity. One summer day, Frank runs into bullies who cruelly throw her bag into a patch of stinging nettles. Nicholas, a boy from her class, helps her; and they escape to his house. Frank is intrigued by Nicholas's home. It smells like an old forest, and peculiar music plays from somewhere deep inside the house. When Frank leaves, she cannot stop thinking about this music that fills and calms her. She isn't sure she wants to be friends with Nicholas because he is ostracized even more than she, and she doesn't want to become a bigger target. But she needs to hear the music again. When she returns and finds the music's source, Frank knows she has stumbled on an important secret. What she doesn't realize is that this secret could change the universe forever. Levi Pinfold's beautiful, realistic pencil illustrations create an eerie atmosphere of wonderment that further bring the text to life. (Age: 8+)





Darkus is a clever, determined boy who believes his father's mysterious vanishing can and must be solved. But how? With help from Virginia and Bertolt, the trio of unlikely friends joins forces to outwit the powerful and connected. They ultimately protect the vulnerable, endangered beetles that seem to hold the key to Darkus's father's sudden and unexplained disappearance. This fanciful, imaginative tale is a wonderful page turner imbued with humour and cliffhangers. It is drawn with intriguing and entertaining characters, an evil nemesis, a damsel in distress, unexpected plot twists, and a hoard of insects with unusual abilities. The series of odd coincidences often involving numerous types of Coleopterans (beetles) will surprise and delight readers. Leonard's expert storytelling is rich with layers of description of a variety of beetles and easy to imagine scenes. (Age: 12+)

Magician Monsieur Lapin realizes that a successful show depends on the right assistant. He ultimately selects Houdini the rabbit, who proves to be a stellar choice. Houdini »took care of...everything.« But one night Monsieur Lapin slips on a banana peel, and Houdini steps in to salvage the show. By sheer accident, Houdini turns the magician into a rabbit, thereby switching the roles of magician and helper. Houdini increasingly embraces the starring role, and soon Rabbit Lapin and even the other rabbit assistants grow increasingly unhappy with their new star. But ultimately Houdini tires of stardom and schemes with the others to perform his greatest trick - he turns Rabbit Lapin back into Monsieur Lapin. Visual sequences effectively propel the story's plotline. End papers (opening ones depict a deck of playing cards with the magician as the king; closing endpapers include the rabbit as Ace/Joker), title page (presented as a lit marquee billing the show), and double-spreads all signal a notably well-done book design. 

Since that time, every adolescent is called for one day to the Sídhe underworld, where they are hunted by grotesque creatures and beautiful but vicious fairies. The call lasts three minutes in our world, but when the Called reappear, they return dead or otherwise forever changed. Nessa isn't likely to survive her call; she contracted polio as a child and has walked with a limp ever since. She struggles with her disability but adapts to challenges creatively and works harder than anyone at the Boyle College of Survival - Nessa is determined to live. Peadar O'Guilin has crafted a deliciously imaginative story in a uniquely Irish setting, with a diverse cast, woven together with dark bits of Celtic mythology. This gripping fantasy with gruesome horror elements is distinctive and memorable for its boldness and creativity. (Age: 14+)

In this well-crafted novella, Non Pratt offers an honest, heartfelt view of lost and rekindled friendship. After drifting apart, a group of friends reunites for one night to open a box they put together five years earlier. However, one person is missing – Millie passed away from cancer three months ago. Before she died, she asked Alix to bring the group back together, but Alix is nervous to see her old friends. After they made the box, Alix changed schools, in part because she was afraid to come out to them as a lesbian. Though comfortable with who she is now, she feels guilty for never having told them. But when the friends retrieve the box and examine its contents, they begin to recreate the bond they once had. In storyline and voice, »Unboxed« feels authentic. The dialogue rings true to the characters' ages, both in the present and when they made the box at thirteen. This title is accessible to children of many reading levels and is an adeptly written story that resonates. (Age: 14+)

Life in a city close to the sea is interrupted by a war that destroys the city and takes father. Tension-filled scenes contrast the happy family in their framed photo with the now fatherless family, clutching together to stay safe from the reaching hands of danger. They pack their belongings and go in search of a faraway place where they will no longer be frightened. The journey is marked by nighttime departure, hiding in various modes of transportation and leaving more and more of their belongings behind. Strong visuals give emotional pulse to the story – the overwhelming power of the menacing figure denying border entry, followed by the children's nuanced feelings of safety in their mother's arms, unaware of her silent tears. The passage across the water is presented as frightening but also with encouraging undertones in the sea. The book ends on a note of hope for a new beginning. This is a story about being a refugee in times of war; since the country is not specified, it is open to universal interpretation. (Age: 6+)

A little boy wakes up on a rainy morning eager to go outside. But Grandad thinks it may be better to wait until the rain stops. While reciting numerous reasons for why playing in the rain would be fun, the little boy waits. Meanwhile, the mail has arrived and includes an envelope with hearts on it for Grandad, who seems a bit perplexed at first, but then works and reworks at writing an appropriate response. Once finished, he is just as eager as the boy to go out and mail this important letter. As they give way to their imaginative minds and open themselves to possibilities, joyousness fills the double spread. The pacing of the watercolour illustrations works well with the story, alternating from smaller, sequenced vignettes to double-spread scenes that bleed beyond the pages. This picture book successfully depicts a warm intergenerational relationship; and its closing line, »the very best things are always worth waiting for«, leaves clues to the interpretation of Grandad's letter. (Age: 3+)

Beginning with the attention-commanding eyes and the red-hooded head on the cover, Bethan Woollvin's »Little Red« delivers a visually arresting rendition of what readers might assume to be a wellknown story. Little Red is a strong, clever girl - she is not afraid of the wolf, and she is not easily duped by his donning of her grandmother's nightdress or glasses and hiding in her bed; instead, she is prepared with her ax to do what she knows she must do. Woollvin effectively uses visual elements to communicate the deceptive and scheming behaviour of the wolf as well as the pragmatic attitude of the girl. Sparse lines used to draw Little Red's face accentuate her expressiveness. The design of this book is also notable: the front endpapers show Little Red prominently in the woods, seemingly unaware of the wolf hiding behind a tree, whereas the back endpapers show her clothed in a sporty wolf-fur jacket. The softback cover features end flaps that serve as entry and exit from the story. (Age: 6+)



The village life of the Santhal, one of the largest indigenous groups of India, is depicted through illustrations created in a traditional scroll style, but conveniently printed on thick paper and folded into a book format. Vibrant illustrations by Rohima Chitrakar are presented in the artistic style of the neighboring Patua community in West Bengal, with whom the Santhal share art and friendship. When one holds the book horizontally, each section unfolds, focusing attention to specific segments of the detailed, complex picture. The scroll-shaped book can also be hung on a wall to present the illustrations as a unified whole within a yellow frame. Section topics include a village feast, a day in the village, common spaces, evening activities, and summer heat – the text presents readers with questions that lead the reader to seek out small stories within the larger composition. For example, wedding preparations means getting ready for a village feast, and viewers are asked to find the special knives used to chop fish, thereby focusing attention. (Age: 5+)

As might easily be deducted from the title, Paul Gamble's hilarious debut novel contains an extraordinary amount of weird, wacky, and wondrous characters and events. The main plot follows inquisitive young Jack and his slightly violent sidekick Trudy, two new recruits at the Ministry of SUITs, as they try to solve the double puzzle of the sinister company Chapeau Noir, who donated wind turbines and new polyester uniforms to their school, and the mysterious disappearance of kids considered loners and oddballs. The novel's short chapters alternate with excerpts from the Ministry Handbook, which sprout all kinds of essential information that readers have undoubtedly been dying to learn, such as: the role of kangaroos in duvet manufacture, the clothing choices of ninjas and vampires, or the potential lethality of Battenberg Cakes. The hare-brained story, intertextual references, and the abundance of absurd footnotes make for an irresistible reading experience. (Age: 10+)

Since their first publication, Lewis Carroll's nonsense poems »Jabberwocky« and »The Hunting of the Snark« have sparked the creativity of many artists. What David Elliot has created, however, is on a completely different level. Rather than re-illustrating the original texts, he has invented an elaborate, complex background story, complete with (pseudo-) scientific research findings, to convince readers that the poems were not nonsense at all but based on a real-life expedition carried out in the 1850s. Elliot's »diary«, assumingly written by one of the expedition party - the lowly Boots -, lays before the readers an astonishing and frightening tale of a crazy captain, dangerous monsters, and a deadly voyage to unknown parts of the world. The stunning watercolour illustrations in subdued colours, the different parts of the book seamlessly woven together, and the appendix with an abundance of »source material« make this book a true labour of love, which Carroll fans will devour. Fuzzy starts life as a simple scribble but then becomes a quirky caterpillar with a voracious appetite for ink and words. When words cannot satisfy his hunger, he dines on paragraphs, stories, and even illustrations, before entering his chrysalis and emerging transformed. Charcoal and watercolour illustrations especially stand out in this creative picture book, flawlessly combining with the text to show the transformation from Fuzzy the scribbled idea, to the word-eating caterpillar, and finally the beautiful butterfly book. The first pages are black and white, but as Fuzzy eats more creative and colourful meals, swaths of watercolour brighten the pages and Fuzzy himself. Rhyming text parallels a caterpillar's growth and metamorphosis with the creative process of writing. At first, Fuzzy is only an idea, »a smudgey sort of 'something' at the bottom of the page.« But with words, images, time, and a little magic, this idea becomes something greater than how it first began. (Age: 4+)

Miko and Rico enjoy sharing ideas: funny, weird, exciting, thought provoking, marvellous ideas. But when Rico comes up with the most brilliant one ever, it just disappears! So the brothers set out in search of it, ultimately venturing deep into the place where all lost thoughts go: the idea jungle. When the boys finally recover Rico's brilliant idea, they don't share it with the reader. After earning a degree in Communications Technology Management in Manila, author Pam Marie Ang studied and worked in Beijing, Xiamen, and Hong Kong. With her debut book she encourages readers to chase down their own ideas, no matter how crazy, silly, impossible, or elusive they might seem. Bru Sim-Nada produces graphic designs, illustrations, and »strange creations« in her Manila-based studio Electrolychee. Her wonderfully wild and wacky creations for this picture book engulf large portions of the English text – or is it the text that infiltrates the illustrations? (Age: 6+)

The novel touches on pressing contemporary issues such as family relationships, adoption, superstition, and the exploitation of the oceans. The author combines these with an atmospheric description of the insular setting and a charming love triangle, as well as some magic to propel the story forwards and capture her readers' attention. (Age: 13+)

»No one knows what the Witch does with the children she takes. No one asks...«. A fog of despondency envelopes The Protectorate, caused by the perceived witch's demand for one infant each year. The witch lives in the forest – but no one has ever seen her and no one knows what becomes of the infants. In truth, the witch Xan is a grandmotherly (and magical) healer who rescues the »abandoned« infants and brings them to the Free Cities to be adopted by caring families. The fate of one child is different, however. When Xan rescues this baby, she accidently feeds her moonbeams that »enmagick« the infant. Xan names her Luna and raises the child in her own cottage. There, Luna flourishes under the tutelage of Xan, Glerk – a Bog Monster – and Fyrian - a Perfectly Tiny Dragon. Kelly Barnhill intersperses poetry and storytelling as she weaves a magical tale of mystery, malevolence, and merriment, while Luna trundles towards adolescence and the release of her magical powers. An accident leads Roz to adopt a surviving baby goose; she intellectualizes each step of what to do as an adoptive mother by seeking information. But information is not enough – learning to intellectualize emotions means becoming caring, which leads to vulnerability. Roz ultimately learns to behave in ways that make her a feeling and thinking member of the island community. Philosophical questions on issues such as the effects of climate change on nature, technology vs. humanity, survival against violence, and more are embedded throughout the book. One thing is clear: Roz began by »computing a plan« but comes to understand the concepts of belonging and home. Sixty-five illustrations, from spot art to double-spreads, punctuate the text, setting the tone and adding emotional depth. (Age: 10+)



From the intrigue on the cover in which two insects look at a budding plant and ponder, »Du iz tak?«, viewers are invited to engage in a delightful story of life cycles. All action takes place in one garden setting, almost as if on a stage, and the story is told completely through its illustrations and dialogue, which is spoken in an invented language both syntactically and morphologically sensible. At first, most movement happens along the ground line, leaving the airspace open. Slowly, the growing plant and insects fill more of the space, until one suspenseful moment when the page is overtaken by the figure of a giant threatening bird. The story continues and seasons change until the following spring when the book comes full circle. In this original work that appeals to all ages, the emotions of the well-dressed insects are abundantly evident and indicate changing moods throughout the story. With every read, new details in the illustrations emerge, making this enchanting work one that can be enjoyed again and again. (Age: 2+)

Throughout the book, engaging words and phrases, combined with a narrative perspective that takes on a voice like a scientist's, prod the reader to notice and question details. Eric Rohmann's superb oil-paint-on-paper illustrations gradually reveal different parts of the giant squid while keeping its whole being mysterious, resulting in a picture book that works on all fronts. The visual pièce de résistance of the book follows a series of pages murky with inky water – the result of a toothsome barracuda's pursuit of a baby squid. Immediately after these pages, a four-page gatefold finally reveals the giant squid as a whole. The book closes with a bibliography and information for further study, including a diagram labeling parts of the squid. (Age: 6+)

Part fantasy, part historical fiction, part superhero tale – with generous dashes of humour – this book unfolds much like »The Canterbury Tales«, through stories the Inquisitor teases out of individuals from diverse stations in life who are patronizing a countryside inn in Medieval France. Their stories each contribute a piece to unlocking the mystery of why the King of France has declared war on three children and a dog. Each child has a special something – prophetic visions (the peasant girl Jeanne), extraordinary strength (the biracial, learned, very large oblate William), the power to heal (the slight, thoughtful Jewish boy Jacob) – and the dog, once dead, is again alive. Central to their story are issues of class intolerances, anti-Semitism, censorship, commonsense and formal learning, Talmudic and Biblical wisdom, and the value of books to civilization. All of this is crafted by Adam Gidwitz in a way that thoroughly engages child readers in a tale that is as contemporary as it is traditional. (Age: 9+)

In the final volume of the graphic novel trilogy, John Lewis – now a US Congressman – recounts his personal story as a leader of the American Civil Rights movement. Engaging and informative, his memoir provides an historical account of significant events of 1963-1965 such as the 1964 Democratic convention, Alabama voter registration, Bloody Sunday, and the Selma to Montgomery freedom march. What makes »March. Book 3« especially effective is Lewis's insight into the internal political and personal triumphs and squabbles of the various factions and personalities of the civil rights movement. He brings to life the reality of the differences between the law and the implementation of the law endured by African Americans in much of the 20th century. The book is rendered in black and white, characterized by its effective use of panel sizes and pacing. Occasional all black background pages emphasize particularly painful moments and violence endured by marchers. Also effective are interspersed scenes of Lewis with Barack Obama at his inauguration. Two voices tell the story in alternating chapters: Pax, a fox, and Peter, the human who rescued him as a kit. Pax fills the hole in Peter's life left by his mother's death, and Pax and Peter develop a relationship in which each becomes the most important figure in the other's life. When Peter's father enlists to fight in a war not far away, he sends Peter to live with his grandfather, forcing Peter to abandon Pax on the way there. Each sets out to reach the other, meeting helpers and overcoming obstacles along the way. Their paths take them directly into the face of war, and by the time they meet, both have learned where they now belong. Though actually named after the brand of Peter's backpack, rather than the Latin word for peace, Pax's name still serves to underscore the war that pervades their lives and is the catalyst for the story. 



Castle Crenshaw runs – fast. Nicknaming himself »Ghost«, he ran for his life when his father tried to shoot him and his mother, and has continued running ever since. But could he run better if he had those fancy running shoes instead of his cheap, ill-fitting hightops? Living in poverty, Ghost feels ashamed of where he lives and how he looks and sad for his mother who is overworked and tired. Walking home one day, he comes across a track team practising and ends up on the team with a coach who provides a much-needed safety net after Ghost makes some bad choices. Through his involvement with the team, Ghost learns to redirect his anger and behaviours. At one point, Ghost asks what Coach thought running would do for him. Coach's reply: »Show you that you can't run away from who you are, but what you can do is to run toward who you want to be.« This National Book Award Finalist combines compelling storytelling told in first-person with believable and well-developed characters facing moral dilemmas not entirely of their own making. (Age: 10+)

»Some Writer!« is a visually enticing book that presents the life, work, and thoughts of author E. B. White. He is perhaps best known for his book »Charlotte's Web«, but was also a prolific journalist. This narrative biography is designed in scrapbook style as a collage of text, photographs, quotes, and factual details. Melissa Sweet masterfully intersperses the narrative with quotes and excerpts from a variety of the author's writings. The layout is both aesthetically pleasing and carefully arranged to best convey information. While photographs of White's letters show his handwriting, passages from his journals are reproduced using a manual typewriter. From the opening chapter quotes to the choice of typewriter keys as font for chapter numbers, no detail is without meaning. This book celebrates the life and work of a humble man who never let his enormous success overcome his sense of self. While decidedly a very specific biography, the format and presentation offer wide appeal for general biography reading. (Age: 10+)

Duncan Tonatiuh's retelling of the legend of Mexico's two majestic volcanoes, Iztaccíhuatl and Popocatépetl, is rich with Spanish and Nahuatl words and symbolism. The illustrations echo the stylized art of the eleventh-century codices that inspired this tale, thus grounding the story in its indigenous roots. The plot combines several major motifs – a sleeping princess, a quest to win the king's approval, and a reward of the beautiful princess. The unusual – and enchanting – plot twist is reminiscent of »Romeo and Juliet«. But Itza never stirs from her slumber; she sleeps on as a dormant volcano while her lover Popoca stands loyally by her feet as a volcano that spews ashes and smoke in the hopes of waking his sleeping princess. Tonatiuh digitally combines the flat lines of Mixtec codices with textured collages to add an engaging dimension to his art. The illustrations not only interpret the story accurately but also extend it with details and emotions that are both subtle and clear. (2017 Pura Belpré Illustrator Honor Award) (Age: 5+)



Richly poetic text and powerfully evocative illustrations portray the endlessly repetitive work of slaves in 1800s New Orleans and their brief weekly freedom in Congo Square, a place that was designated by law to allow the gathering of enslaved and free people of African heritage. Each week, they came together to drum rhythms on various instruments with African roots and engage in lively singing and dancing. The structure of the text rhythmically frames the day-byday countdown to Sunday in Congo Square. Each double-spread begins with the progressing days of the week and ends with the number of days left. Pages describe the endless jobs that were performed by the slaves and the cruelty they experienced that led to despair. Profiled faces are shown looking toward Congo Square, while work in the fields shows bodies in unnatural, back-breaking angular positions. Yet, when the people gather on Sunday afternoons in Congo Square, the curved, flowing lines of their bodies and rounded lines of text lend an air of joy to their music. (Age: 6+)

Readers are offered multiple, creative perspectives on the cat's varying appearance as a clever reminder that while our points of view may differ, we have shared encounters and experiences. The straightforward prose is amplified by the illustrations, which Brendan Wenzel notes were »rendered in almost everything imaginable«, to effectively capture the imagined perspective of even a flea. The simple text, bright and colourful illustrations, and naturalistic settings are evocative. The author's goal is to stimulate readers to reconsider their view of the world. This stand-alone book succeeds in engaging readers of all ages. The book design and paratextual elements add layers to the story, reminding the reader that what we see depends on our position and perspective. (Caldecott Honor Book 2017) (Age: 3+)

Life is often complicated, especially for adolescents. This is certainly true for Natasha and Daniel, who are facing life-changing decisions. Natasha, an undocumented immigrant from Jamaica, seeks to reverse a judge's decision to deport her entire family tonight. Daniel, the son of Korean immigrants who is expected to attend Yale and become a doctor, grapples with defying his parents and becoming a poet instead. As the two strive to do the right thing, realising life as they know it may end in a split second, their lives become intertwined. Alternating chapters convey Natasha's and Daniel's contrasting approaches to life and their growing connection to each other. Additional chapters with an omniscient narrator offer insight into other characters' lives, from security guards to the protagonists' parents, and include scientific and historical facts about human interconnectedness. Yoon's luminous novel captivates readers in the serendipitous coincidences that bring Natasha and Daniel together and considers the complexities of love. (Age: 14+)

Adults are kept at arms' length, while Li and her siblings Lotta and Sass, as well as her best friend Taavi, explore and define their territory. Kaldmaa knows exactly what interests children, why they tell each other stories, what kind (spooky stories!), and how harshly they can treat each other. She employs an energized language to capture this. The book offers more, though: Li's childhood unfolds during the time of the Estonian Soviet Republic, and readers gain subtle insight into the everyday realities of that period (working on a kolkhoz or hospital conditions). This might be why children and adults alike enjoy the book so much and why it is already in its second printing. (Age: 10+)



Taul's picture book debut takes on bold content, for it shows that children, too, can be burdened by difficult and depressing questions. It is also courageous in its illustrations, for Taul exclusively employs black and white, using his reserved pictures and sparse text to open the space needed for such big questions. »Öömõtted« was named one of the »5 Best Designed Estonian Children's Books of 2016«. 

Luckily enough, her companion Sausage is game for any venture. Well, almost any; because when Pikkiriikki wants to paint him with red lipstick, he quickly scampers. Quirky ideas, lively dialogue, and cheeky illustrations by Ninka Reittu, these are the ingredients to make »Prinsessa Pikkiriikki«, whose red-plaited resemblance to Pippi Longstocking is certainly no accident, a reader's delight. With Pikkiriikki, life is never boring! (Age: 4+) »Tuhat ja yksi otusta« – the book title says it all: This large-format picture book celebrates wildlife. However, it does not simply introduce whales, polar bears, or camels via ordinary factual texts. The authors rather employ poems, the contents of which form a felicitous and suspenseful symbiosis with the fullpage watercolour illustrations. The texts frequently point out the humorous aspects of the animals' cohabitation, such as the poem about crocodiles and Egyptian Plovers (aka as crocodile birds), the feathered »dental helpers« who clean the reptiles' teeth. The minimalist images, accentuated with just a few boldly coloured highlights, are impressive: spontaneously brushed onto the page, of sketch-like quality, they result in truly expressive, large animal drawings. The creator of these pictures, Laura Merz, was born in Finland and now lives in Berlin, where she creates works of fine art in addition to illustrating books. (Age: 5+)



The series »Français d'ailleurs«, created in cooperation with the ground-breaking Musée de l'histoire de l'immigration in Paris (Museum for the history of immigration), shines a light on this fact by drawing on the perspectives of immigrant children. It shows the influence immigration can have on social progress, but also does not shy away from inconsistent attitudes in the receiving country, in immigrant communities, and in individual biographies. This anthology unites five short novels previously published in the »Français d'ailleurs« series and a new story from Syria. In these »Docufictions«, Valentine Goby describes the varying immigration and integration processes children and teens aged 9 to 13 experience, realistically and mostly avoiding the usual clichés. In her best book to date, Delphine Perret gives us six chapters from the life of Björn the bear. The irresistible charm of the book lies precisely in the small, lovable eccentricities of its protagonist. Illustrator Delphine Perret, who lives in Lyon, provides a wonderful and inviting combination of good entertainment and thoughtful observation to spark children's imaginations. With seeming effortlessness, she has crafted animal stories full of wit and tenderness – stories on par with »Winnie the Pooh«. Indeed, there are a few whimsical winks at the classic, but Björn the bear does not need to shy from the comparison with Pooh nor feel he is a mere imitation. (Age: 5+)

Three animal friends discover a mysterious, Edenlike garden. Oddly enough, there are doors hidden behind the lush vegetation. Insatiably curious, the friends open them. Animals are concealed behind the doors, and they rambunctiously pursue the liberty they so long for, nearly trampling the friends in the process. In bright watercolour drawings, Julia Woignier carefully lets the comic plot unfold, building hidden meaning into the goings-on. The naive and chaotic trio turns the zoo topsy-turvy: the sleeping guard is the last one behind bars. Furthermore, the gang of boisterous rascals doesn't know what they've done until they hand over the key to the sleeping zoo guard! The reader suspects things much sooner and is usually a laugh ahead. This thoughtful animal fable raises important questions for our time, without becoming overly didactic: Why do we still need zoos? Can we still justify keeping animals in captivity? (Age: 3+)

After the four previous volumes focused on »Mouths«, »Builders«, »Camouflage« and »To be born« respectively, this time the focus of duo Xulio Gutiérrez and Nicolás Fernández is on eyes. Adopting a favourite layout of many non-fiction books, they introduce a different kind of animal on every double page. Alongside general information, a further text describes how the animal's eyes function and what tasks they have. In an easy-to-grasp manner, the texts and the precise, detailed colour illustrations explain, why, for instance, lions are outstanding nocturnal hunters, why falcons can unerringly approach their prey, even from great distances, and why snails move so slowly and rely on their sense of smell rather than their eyes. Unfortunately, this life is over fairly quickly, too, and so are the next five. Some of the sudden deaths are caused by predators, others by people, others by the chilly weather. Finally, at the seventh attempt, the book's open ending allows for some hope: maybe this life will last longer. Oscillating between dream and reality, »Die 7 Leben meiner Katze« talks about death. Aljoscha Blau's pictures are partly reminiscent of children's drawings. The text by Saskia Hula is unsentimental, but not harsh. Thus, death is taken seriously; it is neither trivialised nor demonised. (Age: 6+)

A flat the size of a shoebox in Wedding (a poor neighborhood in Berlin); sixty application letters but no job offer; parents who want to know about every step she takes, but ignore her two suicide attempts. Somehow, Hazal keeps going, swallows it all, and quickly buries her dreams whenever they dare to surface. Still, all the disappointments cumulate into a huge boulder of frustration - and one night Hazal explodes. The situation gets completely out of hand; the girl panics and flees to Istanbul. Readers will feel the urge to shake Hazal awake, comfort her, shout at her, take her in their arms, and make her see that she mustn't throw her life away like that. However, Hazal locks everything away and everyone out. The teenage girl uses a shell of steel as a barricade for her injured and vulnerable soul - that's the biggest tragedy. Right from the first line, the language of Fatma Aydemir's novel develops an impressive momentum. Deep down however, a sensitive narrator reveals herself, who searches and fights; and who fails again and again. (Age: 14+)

Beh feels exactly this way, because during the holidays a few things have happened, sad and stupid, happy and exciting ones. The unusual second-person narrative that the author employs to talk about Beh turns the readers into accomplices and confidants. And thanks to Bach's reserved and elusive style, it does so without clumsily cosying up to them. Beh's emotional turmoil is clad in a language that is both delicate and down-to-earth, poignant and vague, and thus matches the girl's feelings to a tee. Bach does not churn out novel after novel in quick succession, which on the one hand is unfortunate, because it would be an absolute pleasure to read more books by her. On the other hand, the result is always well worth the wait – just as in this case! (Age: 14+)

However, the texts do not only stand out for their sound, the precise, surprising, associative figurative language, but also for their content. They are sometimes personal and contemplative, sometimes socially critical and caustic. »Je suis Siegfried«, for example, a text that tackles xenophobia: »Siegfried's not my name, but through deserts I can whizz / My feet are touched by a flame, so I'm as fast as a fizz, / Bullets and fire are not new to me, nay / I'm unstoppable, when your taxes I take away? / With my bare hands, all animals I can kill? / And to live inside four walls would be my thrill.« (Age: 14+)

His crush, Lynn, has signed up for a blogging project; that is why Lanz has also ended up in this group. Unfortunately, the boy hadn't noticed that his stupid class teacher Gilgen would be the project leader. And to top it all: Lynn doesn't even turn up at first; and when she does, she is not very approachable. An interesting topic for his project also eludes Lanz so, spontaneously he simply choses the title: »My blog in Mr Gilgen's course«. In it, he slags off the »Gilgonator«, describes his attempts to get closer to Lynn, talks about the wrangles between him and his mother's new boyfriend, and discloses his doubts about the world and about himself. Lanz is pounding away at his keyboard, pouring out everything that crosses his mind and touches his heart in an open and honest, sometimes silly, often insightful way. Flurin Decker's debut novel - his final thesis at the Swiss Literature Institute – is refreshing, linguistically creative, and geared towards all readers who are, or have ever been, fourteen. (Age: 14+)

Fyodor Mikhailovich Dostoyevsky is a prime example for the fact that genius and madness often sit side by side. The Russian author, who was a compulsive gambler and was imprisoned in a Siberian labour camp for criticizing the establishment, is considered a trailblazer for modernity. In an almost seismographic way, he sensed socio-critical conflicts and psychological shallowness and shaped them into literature. With this graphic novel, Vitali Konstantinov pays tribute to the author from St. Petersburg. He weaves together Dostoyevsky's life and works, ranging from the cradle to the grave, and from his debut novel to his late works. The pictures in black-white-and-grey, the different fonts, and the often grotesquely distorted faces aptly mirror Dostoyevsky's fears and neuroses. Small, revealing details show Konstantinov's skill for writing concisely. In a masterful way, he makes readers experience Dostoyevsky's genius and madness, exuberant creativeness and depressing abysses. (Age: 16+)



Anke Stelling's novel »Bodentiefe Fenster« (Floorlevel windows) tackled the topic of "the modern" family between idealism and reality« for an adult readership. In her novel »Erna und die drei Wahrheiten«, Stelling deals with the same issue for a younger audience. Here, the author has her elevenyear-old eponymous heroine talk about the family madness in a communal house and her daily life at a grass-roots democratic community school – and she is completely fed up with both of them. Her parents, who apply double standards - an adult-parentstandard and a child-education-standard - get on her nerves, as does her pseudo-sympathetic teacher Birgit. Erna has long been aware that all their rules are (false) pretences, nothing but silly airs... Well, in a way, Erna is right. Life unfortunately consists of many »actually-s« and the subjunctive clause is ever present. However, the girl eloquently puts her finger on the sore spot. Therefore, also this book reveals much about »the modern family between idealism and reality«. (Age: 10+)

In this philosophical exploration you will find almost 100 questions and zero answers. This mismatch may reflect the essence of human existence; after all, life has a lot more questions in store than answers. Yet as long as you ask questions, you are alive. They trigger your thoughts and help you more fully grasp yourself and the world. This is definitely true for the questions that Britta Teckentrup has gathered in her book. Some of them, many people might have asked themselves at some point: »What happens when the winter doesn't end anymore?« or »Is he going to like me?« Other questions are so original and surprising, that you will first grin and then ponder them: »When an eagle collects food for its babies, is this similar to going to work?« or »Why do people have the least contact with each other when they are most closely crowded together?« Due to the reduced style, Britta Teckentrup's prints show the underlying atmosphere in a tangible and sensuous way. In this wordless book, the artist shows everyday life: There are people who are stressed out, others who are in love, and even someone who searches for empty bottles in the rubbish. This realism puts this picture book on a par with beloved wimmelbook-classics. Like them, Julie Völk creates many stories in her pictures, and readers can imagine new tales with every turn of the page. (Age: 3+)

The book is neither feminist propaganda nor a book that paints the women's role in the rosiest colours. If it did, this would be both wrong and negligent, as the two editors - both renowned scientists – are absolutely aware of: »You often have to say 'maybe', when talking about history.« They emphasise that people may know so little about women's deeds because either they simply did not happen or because they were not documented accordingly. The inspiring book frequently veers off beaten tracks and invites readers to think critically - girls as well as boys. (Age: 14+)

So, for instance, an A4sized piece of paper faces discrimination, but in Nefeli's hands, it helps her realize its dreams. In his novel, Thodoris Koukias peers into the souls of his young protagonists in a non-pedantic, compelling way. He animates readers to stand by their dreams and abilities. (Age: 15+)

The expressive picture sequences of artist Achilleas Razis employ intense colours and skilful light effects to reveal the entire spectrum of the text – from dismal terror to shining hope. He wants revenge for this public humiliation. He complains to the emperor, who immediately sends his soldiers to light the city on fire. The story suggests this is the price for senseless hate and warns of its possible consequences. In her adaptation for children, Shoham Smit situates the legend within a framing narrative: In order to settle a fight, a grandmother tells her grandchildren of Kamtza and Bar Kamtza. Einat Tsarfati uses well-defined shapes and colours and speech bubbles in her comic-like illustrations. The facial expressions of the characters are very vivid and reveal their changing emotional states. The picture book won numerous awards and entertains rather than sermonizes. (Age: 4+)

In the end, he acquires the oven much wished for by his grandmother. Éva Vajda and Panni Bodonyi take on the topic of child labour and poverty in a clear and direct way, using pictures that are not overly impassioned: They show but don't judge. Anup's story was first developed as an app and was Panni Bodonyi's final project at the Danish School of Design. Fortunately, the picture book also came about. It made the list of the twenty-five best children's books to appear in Hungary in 2016. (Age: 4+)

Lyrics composed by Tadhg Mac Dhonnagáin are presented as poetry, and the songs are performed on an accompanying CD. Each of the four sections paints a picture of one season and evokes memories of childhood, whether that of the zoo, the beach, or picking blackberries. Although each section is illustrated by a different artist - Christina O'Donovan, Brian Fitzgerald, Tarsila Krüse, and Jennifer Farley -, and each applies a unique style and seasonal palette of colours, there is continuity and visual flow across the seasons. It is a joyful book, full of fun with its clever rhymes and witty turns of phrase. On a deeper level we find a love song to the natural world, evoking respect in a time when nature has never seemed so fragile. It opens with a simple little rhyme, »Síolta Beaga« (Little seeds), and this sets the tone, with gentle philosophy reminding us that the seeds will wake after the snows of winter. (Age: 3+)





When Yutaka dances for the victims, who are still living in temporary housing, he senses their anger at people's lack of compassion. This poignant novel draws an analogy between the suffering of the displaced people of Fukushima and the plight of the native Hawaiians who lost ownership of their land to the United States. It also speaks out against the idea that the weak should sacrifice themselves for the strong. The book's very unique and funny characters help create a lively account of the realities of Fukushima. In the mountains of Nagano in Japan, there is a small village which has a 100-year-old house called the Arayashiki. Kyodogakusha, a Christian welfare organization created in 1974, founded a unique community there in 1976. Since that time, people with and without disabilities live there together, leading an almost self-sufficient life through farming. They roof the building with thatch they made, and when the only trail on the mountain between their house and the town collapses, they repair it together. Vivid black-and-white photos show people's expressions and the mutual respect they have for each other. While this book avoids mention of any problems that could occur in such a community and thus conveys quite an idealistic picture, it is still an important book needed in Japan and other countries, as it reveals the value of an inclusive life in which different people coexist. The author also made a documentary film of Arayashiki with the same title. (Age: 9+)

Riaru is a special boy. He is perfect at everything. His family is not, however. When his young brother died four years ago in an accident, his mother's mental health suffered. She's been living apart from the family since then, but only some of of Riaru's classmates know this - as Wataru, his childhood friend. Unlike Riaru, Wataru does not want to stand out, but he doesn't like how Riaru makes him feel inferior. However, when friendship grows between Wataru, Riaru, and Saji, a new student, Wataru comes to realize that the class expectation for Riaru to be perfect might be an unfair burden. He also notices Saji's suppressed love for Riaru. In supporting them, he finds his own strengths. »Bokutachi no Riaru« shows that unrequited love can sometimes lead to special, long-lasting friendship. This book about homosexual love, which is still an unusual topic in Japanese literature for young readers, is the author's first novel. She has written a second novel that focuses on a transgendered person. (Age: 11+)

Love gives her strength to face life's challenges and support the players and her family. With a fresh awareness, she straightforwardly describes the change in her mind. Even when the situation gets worse and her mother overdoses, Yū's humour and youthful optimism keep the story from becoming too gloomy. Teenage readers enjoy reading this coming-of-age novel, which depicts friendships and love, and shows that family problems can be managed however hard they seem. (Age: 13+)



This theme may sound too sombre for a picture book, but the book gently and successfully delivers its message through its thoughtprovoking narration and unique design. It's so unfair, Haesol can hardly believe it. The sharing of rice cakes on the little boy's birthday represents the communal tradition of sharing whatever is good with others. With neighbours becoming more like strangers these days, the book shows how sharing even very humble things can amplify one's joy and happiness. Lee Hyang-an has been awarded the SBS TV Literature Award and the Woongjin Junior Literature Prize for her fairy-tale and picture books. Lee Yeong-rim studied illustration at Kookmin University and at Kingston University in London. (Age: 4+)

This picture book tells the story of a world where tradition and modernity as well as dream and reality overlap. Shin Sun-Mee's works take up a feminist perspective, while her illustrations mix traditional Korean brush painting, contemporary settings, and fantasy book features. The book's main theme is the communication or rather the non-communication between generations. Ant fairies, tiny women clad in traditional Korean clothing, appear to a sick boy. They are visible only to the eyes of an innocent child. The boy's mother, sitting at his bedside, obviously cannot see them. This was not always the case, as the fairies reveal. They share stories and visions about the past, when the boy's mother was still a little girl and used to play with them. Is the little girl he now sees at his bedside real? Is it his mother? And why hasn't she shared with him her childhood adventures with her fairy friends? Shin Sun-Mee, who studied traditional Korean painting at Hongik University and the University of Ulsan, has become famous after presenting an exhibition of the »ant fairies« series. 

For instance, they lie in the orange colour that shimmers in the fox's fur, but which also reminds Povilas of his mother's ceramic pots and his father's helicopter. The boy and the fox become friends and roam far and wide, seeing how happiness is sought, found and also lost. In this, her second book, she presents twenty-six beings of the Baltic pantheon – along with their good and bad traits, their adventures and tasks. Notably, Zylė transports these mythological beings into today's world and lets them take effect there: The double-headed sea god Bangpūtys steers kite surfers across the Baltic Sea, and the fickle, fairy-like Laumes, who help good people by laundering, weaving and cleaning up, are playfully represented as washed-up young women, sitting on washing machines, surrounded by a chaotic assembly of clothes and ironing board. The illustrations are kept to pastel hues and on second glance reveal the special features of the deities and their casting in the here and now. The chaotic young women, for instance, have animal legs, strangely long hair, and make one shudder slightly. An eerie delight! (Age: 9+)

Loudmouths such as Jon and his loudmouth-companions make life at school hell for Aksel. From day one, the teenager hates high school, where the biggest gobbies rule and fists are employed occasionally. »Ungdomssskolen« follows in the footsteps of classic school novels, recounting the story of an introverted boy who enjoys comic books, listens to Nirvana, and loves skiing. When Eirik, his cousin and best friend, dies in an accident, Aksel's life is thrown off course. Everything becomes too much: the horrible schoolmates, Eirik's death, and the search for the meaning of life. Eventually however, Aksel manages to cope with his crisis and, three years later, school is finally history – and literally so: In his graphic novel, partly based on his own life, Anders N. Kvammen, sketches Aksel's school career in black and white. Thanks to an alternation between time-lapse and slow-motion narration, the novel creates a perfect arc of suspense; the language is not overly sentimental, the story's tone almost casual, which makes it all the more convincing. (Age: 12+)

»Eg er eg er eg er « is a collection of 39 poems in which a first-person persona – a girl – talks about herself and her life. Many of the poems recall situations from her daily life at school or with her family, as well as observations of nature, but thanks to author Ruth Lillegraven's virtuosity of sound and metaphors, these situations are effortlessly moved beyond their ordinariness; e.g. in the poem »Alt brenn« (Everything is burning), which describes a shimmering hot day in late summer: "nokon sette ei fyrstikk / borti sommaren / skogen og trea og / blada flamma opp / alt blei gult / og gulare / enn gulast / det er eg» (someone has struck a match / and touched summer / setting fire to the woods and the trees / and the leaves / everything's turned yellow / and yellower than yellow / this is me). The heat and the power of the colours become tangible in the poem. The few flat illustrations by Mari Kanstad Johnson provide a boldcoloured framework for the poems, mark breaks, and at the same time build up an intensity that perfectly matches the atmosphere of the texts. »I am looking for unconventional people, special people.« That's what author Synne Sun Løes said in an interview a while ago. The protagonist of her novel »Miss« is such a special person: Ea is contrary, lazy, and fat; yet she isn't a loser. She simply doesn't want to conform to the others' expectations of her: to be thin, nice, and efficient. Ea's parents try their best to push her into these moulds and make her »fit for society«. Yet they themselves are the best examples of what happens when you only live to keep up the façade (her mother) or when you run a mega-marathon trying to evade all communication (her father). Security, closeness, and sympathy are in short supply in this family. Therefore, it is not surprising that Ea, despite all her stubbornness, is racked by self-doubt. This novel offers insights into the ambivalent emotional state of a girl whose rebellious differentness is also a strategy for coping with her fears. (Age: 14+)

In 2016, the publishing house Gyldendal started a new series of wordless picture books, which continues in 2017 with titles such as »En skrue løs«. A little man is gathering mushrooms in the woods. He is ecstatic, when he spots a large mushroomlike object sparkling in the clearing. No doubt, this mushroom must be taken home! Yet while the manikin is huffing and puffing, the reader notices a huge robot who obviously misses something tiny but important, i.e. a glittering, mushroom- or rather screw-like thing... Without any words, this book tells a wonderful tale. It combines typical fairy-tale motifs with sci-fi characters in a comic-like style rendered in a seemingly dated palette of shades of brown. What makes the book even more special are the various visual possibilities that Markhus exploits masterfully, such as change of perspectives and picture-within-a-picture. Thus, he manages to have both storylines run together, in parallel, or against one another. This creates both a double arc of suspense and some dramatic irony. (Age: 4+)

The majority of sibling books are told from the point of view of the »older ones« and tackle dethroningfears and -traumas. »Hun som kalles søster« turns the tables on the familiar narrative. In this book, it is the younger sister, who tries to come to grips with the big one; because first and foremost, she is an unknown entity. She lives behind a door through which the younger one has never entered yet. She vanishes into the bathroom for hours - what on earth is she doing there? She gets money for babysitting her sister, but is grumpy nevertheless. In a mixture of awe, curiosity, and puzzlement, the little one approaches the big one – slowly, slowly. Kaia Dahle Nyhus presents the »sister phantom« in headstrong illustrations in brown, cream, black, and white, and describes her in a tone that perfectly gets across how the little protagonist's feelings for the mysterious creature called sister oscillate between admiration and astonishment. But the most important sporting event involves the Pahlevani and Zoorkhaneh rituals, a system of athletics originally used to train warriors in ancient Persia and its adjacent lands during the Achaemenid Empire (550-330 BC). The book includes interesting painted illustrations of the rituals and traditional Iranian sports equipment. This is the first volume in a series published by Kanoon that concerns different aspects of Iranian culture and history. (Age: 10+)



But one day she falls in love with peevish Gholam who is actually a ladies' man and at first doesn't care for Safoora's love. Finally, when Safoora proposes marriage to Gholam, he mockingly accepts. Safoora starts learning to be calmer and more patient. After the wedding, her behavior touches Gholam's heart, and in the end they become a perfect couple. In this free adaptation, the author revives the protagonists of the old folk tale by mocking the rather saccharine features ascribed to them in the original, using satire and folkloric language in an interesting way for teenage readers. She lives alone, has drawn her family on furniture and walls and talks with Zosia in an unusual language. She shows the girl an unfamiliar Bałuty with a »dry bridge« that doesn't lead over a river, and the train station Radegast, from which windowless wagons depart. What seems like an adventure to Zosia turns out to be a trip back in time into the Jewish ghetto of Łódź during the German occupation of Poland in the Second World War. Rutka speaks Yiddish, the bridge connects two parts of the ghetto and the train station is the infamous site of concentration camp deportations. Joanna Fabicka (b. 1970) hints at all of this but does not name anything directly. It's more important that Zosia learns of the hidden past that exists around her, even if it is no longer visible today. »Rutka« was named 2016 Polish young adult book of the year (IBBY). (Age: 10+)

The »practical man« meticulously plans the acquisition of the feline and reads all the advice guides. But even though the cat is optimally housed, she doesn't purr and causes even more stress. It's only when the veterinarian recommends being kind to the cat, to play with her and pet her, that his wished-for result comes about. There can be a point to pointless activity! In her inimitably witty way, Roksana Jędrzejewska-Wróbel (b. 1969) pokes fun at performance society and its offshoots. Adam Pękalski (b. 1975) illustrates the story no less comically, portraying the man as a bourgeois nerd who likes designer furniture and loves all things petty. (Age: 3+)

On her journey, she meets soldiers, police officers, and customs officers who try to stop her, claiming that walls, fences, and suffering lie ahead. The way does indeed become harder: There are invisible walls, fences, and obstacles. Nabu crosses the sea and, exhausted, arrives at a tourist beach, only to be told by some to get back into the water. Others recommend she stops by the houses. What Nabu decides is left open, but one is left with an uneasy feeling. Novelist and poet Jarosław Mikołajewski (b. 1960) crafts this journey poetically. His laconic text makes the events seem allegorical, yet still unsettling. Joanna Rusinek's (b. 1978) illustrations amplify the text. Her depictions of Nabu's escape uncannily let fear seep in, as in the screaming mouths of the enormous soldiers, whose speech remains incomprehensible. (Age: 7+)

Who would have thought there are so many stories about the city of Warsaw - its creation, the river Vistula, its neighbourhoods and houses?! This exceptionally beautiful and appealingly designed 621-page tome »Legendy warszawskie« collects many of these stories, often in multiple variations. There are six versions of the legend of the magical beast known as the basilisk, for instance. There is, of course, also the story of Warsaw's emblem and crest - the mermaid - and the one about the name of the city, which supposedly comes from Wars and Sawa, settlers on the banks of the Vistula. Each legend is prefaced with an age advisory that lets readers know whether the legend is suitable for younger readers or is intended for adults. There is also an index with a glossary. Beyond this, the editors thoroughly introduce the stories according to the contemporary Warsaw's layout. Steeping oneself in the book, the city itself comes to seem like a legendary mythical being. (Age: 7+)



Brazil's gravest environmental catastrophe occurred in November 2015, when two dams broke and highly toxic sewage from an ore mine flowed into the Rio Doce. A 700 kilometre long stretch of the river was poisoned, flora and fauna were killed, the human population cut off from drinking water. The river's ecosystem is destroyed for the foreseeable future. Renowned author Leo Cunha handles this inconceivable event in an unusual way in his poem by giving the river a voice. In gentle, melodious language, it speaks of itself and of life, and of the riches it gives to people and to nature – until one day it is suddenly no longer a river. Where there was melody, now there is silence. Where there was sweet water, now there is bitter sludge. Where there was life, now there is only death. Illustrator André Neves enhances the poignant text with pictures full of symbolism and melancholy. The river is depicted as a child, unshielded from and succumbing to the violence and overpowering force of industrial destruction. (Age: 6+)

»The jaguar hunts to eat. Father hunts for pleasure«. These statements perfectly capture this story's essence, as it focuses on hunting and its many facets, such as necessity, pleasure, power, suffering, compassion, and death. Young Birigüi abhors hunting, unlike his father, who loves it and sees it as proof of manliness. The conflict comes to light when Birigüi is forced to accompany his father hunting for the first time. While the father is gripped by the thrill of the hunt, the son fears for a female deer, threatened by guns and a pack of hounds. In the end, thanks to him the doe gets away (at least this one time). Maurício Mereilles tells this story using dense and intense language. The story grabs readers from the start, as they experience directly the conflicting feelings of the main characters. The rough-textured, naturally brown paper that the large-size picture book is printed on, along with Odilon Moraes' sketch-like pencil drawings heightened by white ink, match the atmosphere of the story in an outstanding way. Daniel Munduruku, one of Brazil's most high-profile indigenous children's book authors, provides further evidence of his narrative skills with these »Voices of the ancestors«. In the foreword to the book, he remarks upon the enormous number of ethnicities found in his country: there are 307 known ethnic groups, about 275 languages are spoken, and there still remains much to be discovered. Some ethnicities are nearly unknown, others are threatened by extinction - and with them their culture and rich treasure of surving stories and myths. Daniel Munduruku, who himself belongs to the Munduruku people, has collected stories from all parts of Brazil, with the support of friends, and retells ten of them in this volume. The stories are about, for instance, the creation of the world, about festivals and rites. about the origin of particular peoples or about the meaning of life. Information concerning each of the ethnic groups as well as black-and-white photos of individuals complete this well-worth-reading book. (Age: 10+)

The rich oral storytelling traditions found in multiethnic Brazil have increasingly found their way into the country's children's and youth literature in recent years. This book is the result of a project aimed at supporting this development. Cristino Wapichana, of the Wapishana people, received distinction for the text at a literary competition for authors of indigenous origin. The story is about a boy who secretly sneaks to the river to experience the sunset for the first time. Astounded and curious to know more, in his sleep Kupai finds out in a dream conversation with his father why the sun goes down and what the mysterious »Mouth of the night« is. Thus, Kupai learns much about his people's notions regarding the workings of the world. Graça Lima, one of the bestknown Brazilian children's book illustrators, adds impressive images to the story. Her large-format pictures derive their force from the contrast of colours, of light and dark as well as the play of shadows and silhouettes. (Age: 6+)

A sentence hidden on the book's impressum says it well: "This book may contain smiles". Smiling is in fact inevitable, due to the haptic pleasure the book pages provide and due to the silkscreenstyle pictures, wonderful in their minimalism and exquisite pastel tones. And of course also due to the text, which is about the Portuguese word »morar«, i. e. »to live« or more precisely »to reside«. From the opening reflection, where houses live, the text relentlessly and a little erratically meanders across winding associations. For instance, it considers the birds who live on the "top floor" of the street, then music that constantly »moves« and can live at any place, and then on to beehives and bee wax and from there straight to ear wax, which leaves its »house« to »live« on cotton swabs. In the end, this picture book is about language and the marvellous pleasure of allowing one's thoughts and words to roam in all directions. (Age: 5+)

The book of Catalan artist Joan Negrescolor (b. 1978) will intoxicate readers with intense colours and fabulous forms. A lush world reveals itself in swirling and shining reds, yellows, greens, and turquoises. We are seeing the remains of an apparently abandoned or destroyed city, overgrown by the jungle and inhabited by wild animals. A girl named Nina loves to visit the city to tell the animals of the past days of the world of human beings. The book's short text is ambiguous and leaves many things in the air. It seems most like a prophetic vision of a future where the disappearance of human civilisation is not a grim dystopia, but rather a lively utopia. Nature takes back what humans have taken away from it. Across large double-page spreads, the silhouettes of plants, animals, buildings, and objects layer one on top of the other or merge. They aptly visualize the concept of the book, where artifacts gradually disappear behind vigorous, powerful nature. (Age: 5+)

Following their first collaboration »Uma escuridão bonita« (2013), Ondjaki and António Jorge Goncalves show once again in this newest co-created book that they have an obvious interest in darkness. The story is about a boy who lives close to the »Great Forest«. Together with his understanding and patient grandpa, he wants to investigate the world of fireflies, including the »switched-off« fireflies who are not allowed to be discovered. The nature-loving boy has equipped himself for the expedition with, among other things, an »one-ocle«, a »path expander« and a »firefly inviter«. These are not only practical devices, they also help the boy cope with his fear of darkness. The poetic text fits beautifully with the atmospheric pictures, which are full of silhouettes and shadows and are kept to various shades of blue. The text and images create a space between the real world and a child's fantasy, while also revealing something of the relationship between human beings and nature. (Age: 7+)

In contemporary Portuguese young adult literature, the novels of Ana Pessoa (b. 1982) take up an exceptional place. The author is masterfully adept at describing the cosmos of maturing teens, with its challenges and dramas, turbulences, moments of happiness, disappointments, and catastrophes. She writes in an authentic language that captures the protagonists' sense of life and closely orients itself to their pulse. In an astonishing way, her newest book does all this and more. »Mary John« sets itself apart from the author's previous novels by its even more coherent storytelling, its undisguised, intense language, and the deep insight it offers into the emotional world of the protagonist and first-person narrator. Maria João, called Mary John, writes a single, long letter to Júlio »Pirata«, her first, unrequited love. She openly writes of friendship, longing, desire, and sexuality and the painful process of dealing with feelings such as rejection and loneliness. (Age: 14+)

Following highly praised short stories, poetry, and a debut novel (2016), »Rostogol merge acasă« is her first children's book. The manuscript won the 2014 Prize from Arthur Press, which intends to encourage new Romanian children's literature. In her homeland, Lavinia Branişte is among the most promising new literary voices. Why, for example, does pink seem to be the favourite colour of princesses? What would happen if the princess hadn't kissed the frog? And why do dragons need multiple heads? Rosetti and Radu playfully bring in well-known fairy-tale material and mix things up. This is the second collaboration of these two artists. Like the first in 2015, the result is both charming and entertaining. (Age: 4+)

For some time, Nina Dashevskaya (b. 1979) has been one of the best-loved Russian children's book authors. Publishing houses fight over her, and the public and critics adore her. Nearly every one of her books has received accolades - »Ja ne tormoz!« is no exception. In the first-person voice, thirteen-yearold Ignat, a wonderful character, describes his city of Moscow, his school, and family. With him it's all about tempo, rhythm, beat: riding the escalator in the subway, the houses and trees zipping by when he's scootering around town. He rarely shares his perceptions and sensations with someone, because Ignat keeps to himself and is introverted. With her great sense of the musicality of language and linguistic rhythm, Nina Dashevskaya portrays an urban childhood as well as today's challenges for children and families, such as ADHD and an achievementdriven society, hinted at through the prismatic lens of a young person's perspective. 

This graphic novel was first a theatrical work and still retains that dramatic quality, since its main characters – an elephant and a tattered doll – tell their story on a stage. They represent the body and the mind of a paraplegic person. What one learns from them makes one gulp one instant and laugh out loud the next. For instance: apparently, when one is wheelchair-bound one is supposed to find a girlfriend who also uses a wheelchair, since after all you'd fit so well together. In chat sequences, telephone conversations, and flashbacks, the fictional audience and real readers witness the everyday discrimination, paternalism, boredom, fun, and thoughts about helpless parents and care-workers that people with disabilities face. Vladimir Rudak and Lena Uzhinova worked on this very stirring book for two years. It is the first Russian comic that focuses on the topic of disability. How fortunate that it found its way to the wonderful and wonderfully open-minded Petersburg comic publisher Boomkniga. (Age: 14+)

Yevgeny Rudashevsky (b. 1987) has been exploring new terrain in contemporary Russian youth literature for a solid two years now: After his story set in Abkhazia about a boy named Amza who befriends a dolphin, Rudashevsky turns toward Siberia: Following a story about a Baikal seal and a boy named Maxim, the novel »Voron« is also set in the Siberian taiga. Here, too, the author focuses very precisely on the relationship between human and animal. Fourteen-year-old Dima is allowed to go along on the Siberian weasel hunt! What many readers certainly will find alienating is initially the boy's greatest dream: to hunt like a »real man«, trekking through the wilderness, shooting, catching prey, and boasting about it. But the hunt, led by his testosterone-driven uncle and his two pals, turns out to be reformative for the boy. Dima recognizes the cruelty and the overbearing manner of the hunt. This change of heart is very understandable, given how vividly Rudashevsky describes the setting of the traps and the strangulation and skinning of the animals. (Age: 12+)

In Serbia, the title that Pop Đurđev (b. 1953) chose for his book could lead to misunderstandings because it carries the name of an important Serbian royal family from the 14th century. The book is only about the Mrnjavčevićs in a witty, intertextual sense, however. It is really about another family that likens itself to royalty: cats stand at the centre of this rhymed text. In funny verse and imagery, Đurđev and illustrator Kosta Milovanović (b. 1971) tell of the mishaps and turmoil of a love between a poor yellow cat and a classy black cat. Next to his authorial work, Pop Đurđev directs one of the most important children's literary festivals in Serbia. Kosta Milovanović is known in his home country for his comic-like illustrations, which often have a touch of irony. »Mrnjavčevići« is a nice example of the new line coming from Pčelica Press, which is publishing more and more children's fiction. Small publisher Odiseja is known in Serbia for its children's book translations. Alongside classics from the likes of Astrid Lindgren, stars of contemporary children's literature, such as Jaqueline Wilson, Jean-Claude Mourlevat, and Andreas Steinhöfel. are also represented. Here, Odiseja offers a gem of native Serbian children's literature: young adult and children's book author Jasminka Petrović (b. 1960). With illustrator Ana Petrović (b. 1989), she has written a very funny children's book about what it would be like if one could exchange one's parents. Young Nikola is annoyed by his parents' constant »Do this« and »Leave that alone«, so he wants to find new parents on another planet. The selection is rather thin, though: Stiff robot parents and infantile mamas and papas who themselves want to be taken care of are not what Nikola had in mind. He returns home and – lo and behold – finds his own parental exemplars pretty okay! (Age: 6+)



There are heaps of books about house pets. But when a book comes along that's about two Mexican axolotls, as in young illustrator Rudá Sova's (i. e. Mirka Rudášová) book »My water dragon«, then we have something special indeed. As becomes evident from each descriptive text and image, axolotls are unusual critters. Bruno is an albino axolotl, while Ugo is spotted. Both have gills that look like Native American feather adornments, and can either live on land or in water. Rudá Sova stylizes her axolotls into magical pink-hued, dragon-like beasts. This makes seeing the realistic representation of the animals all the more astonishing. They truly possess all those peculiarities and are portrayed with accuracy and care in this picture book. »Moje vodné dračiky« received accolades in 2015 as one of the most beautiful books in Slovakia - a lovely feather in the cap for small publisher Virvar. Together with master illustrator Daniela Olejníková (b. 1987), Slovakian author Marek Vadas (b. 1971) enters the world of children's books for the second time with »Útek«. In muted yet intense colours, Olejníková's pictures and Vadas's text tell the story of an escape across surreal locations that only furtively mark points on a route across the African continent. A boy, his father, and a dog named Alan leave their village in the wake of strange, threatening goings on: The people there were eating everything they could get their hands on. Father and son go from one place to the next, meeting inhabitants who demonstrate strange behaviours and make them aware of their own foreignness: Some love to ignore each other and to lie, others shut themselves off from the world, and still others have a pedantic penchant for order. Driven ever onward, the boy gets separated from his father along the way and arrives on his own at a giant refugee camp. The ending is left open. (Age: 8+)

Ferdo, a giant raven-like bird, is helpfulness incarnate. He's a wonderful jungle gym for children, he works as a crane at the construction site, and he comes to the aid of chimney cleaners. Ferdo gets thirsty after all that hard work and sucks an entire pond dry. He's shooed away by the fishermen, fish and water fowl left high and dry, so he finds a large rain cloud and empties its rain water into the pond. Finally, everyone realizes the big bird's helpfulness and he is awarded a medal. The illustrator of this little bird story is Andreja Peklar, well known in Slovenia and a winner of many awards. The manuscript of »Ferdo« made her one of eight finalists in the Silent Book Contest at the 2015 Bologna Children's Book Fair. Typical for Peklar are the extensive cut-out style illustrations that focus on just a few pictorial elements. They make it possible to tell and intensify Ferdo's story using only a few select central scenes. (Age: 3+)

At least since her novel »Ime mi je Damjan« (My name is Damjan; 2001), author Suzana Tratnik (b. 1963) has been an important voice in nationally and internationally recognized Slovenian literature. In »Tombola ali življenje!«, Tratnik deploys her powerful, irony-laden, tough language to present the story of Mija, a teenager in Yugoslavia in the 1970s. Over the course of ten chapters, Mija's roaming adolescent life unfolds, complete with a bitter, single-parenting mother, a dodgy stuntman father, true friends, false friends, and falling in love. The novel also shows the complexity of life and the circumstances that take subtle effect on Mija's reality: Animosities amongst the Yugoslavian populations, discrimination against Sinti and Roma, the promise of guest labourer work in Germany, and the power of President Tito. At the centre stands Mija, trying her luck and searching out her own story. A powerful book! (Age: 14+)



Violence and tyranny leave behind wounds and scars. These only heal when victims receive justice, have their identity and dignity restored, and are protected from being forgotten. In her newest novel, inspired by a real event in 2003, Márgara Averbach shows that often it is only the subsequent generation who first tends to these tasks. The novel is about five students who, animated by their history class, want to find out who is buried in the anonymous grave in their town's cemetery. After researching in archives and libraries, it becomes clear that the buried bones belong to a woman and a man who were murdered during the military dictatorship in Argentina (1976-1983). The novel connects different temporal planes, perspectives and experiences, by joining individual voices - of the students, witnesses, of the victims' kin, and of the victims themselves - into a multivoiced choir. The book demonstrates that society bears a great responsibility for the fate of individuals. (Age: 12+)

The time of the military dictatorship in Chile (1973-1989) has only recently been broached in children's and young adult literature. In her debut novel, Carola Martinez Arroyo, a Chilean native author who has long lived in Argentina, portrays that time through the experiences of a child. Matilde, who is approximately ten years old, grows up in the 1980s without her father, one of the thousands of the regime's »disappeared« victims. Matilde's mother and friends of the family also face the threat of persecution. The girl, who experiences her mother's and grandmother's suffering, insecurity, fears, taboos, and sense of powerlessness, wishes nothing more fervently than to live a »normal« life like other children. When the situation comes to a head, mother and daughter finally get themselves to safety in exile. Martinez draws this portrait of an injured childhood against the concrete background of Chilean history. At the same time, her moving, unsettling novel has a universal character, since it shows that Matilde's story can repeat itself anywhere and anytime. (Age: 10+)

This book for readers young and old is strikingly different in terms of both its content and appearance. Thumbing through the pages, one first notices the book's design: the use of very diverse fonts and font sizes, as well as irregularly placed text on white and light green pages entices readers to look more closely. The playful layout and creative typography, however, do not simply serve as decoration, but mirror the heterogeneity of the voices speaking here. Each of the eight chapters opens with an introductory question, a humorous black-and-white drawing and a short story, in which author Sara Bertrand considers the question. On the subsequent pages, twelve children who helped with the book give their own answers The questions are ones you wouldn't necessarily expect, such as »Is death ugly?«, »What is the imagination for?« or »Do your parents lie?«. But children find no topic too outlandish to concoct an unexpected, funny, or reflective pronouncement on the matter. (Age: 7+)

Ben doesn't understand his father. He often seems so strange that Ben believes his father is an extraterrestrial inhabited by an alien. In the book's twentyfour chapters, Ben looks for evidence to confirm his suspicion and wonders how things came to be like this. Why does Dad yell at Mom and hardly say a word to his son? The first-person narrator tries to explain his environment using a mix of fantasy, incomprehension, humour, and observational skills. Based on Ben's perspective, a picture gradually forms of an ailing family that is close to falling apart. Despite no real happy ending, the family still moves forward together, and Ben finally learns something personal about his father, who lets his guard down a little and gives his son insight into his own childhood. Thus, an initial, fragile connection forms between the two. In her very worthwhile children's book debut, Juliana Muñoz Toro (b. 1988) offers an unadorned, unusual view into the conflicts and mechanisms of an ordinary family. (Age: 8+)

This picture book is an example of this, published by Cataplum libros, a small independent press that has recently entered the arena with a couple of very promising titles. »Adiós«, a poem by Black Colombian author Candelario Obeso (1849-1884), first appeared in Obeso's collection »Cantos populares de mi tierra« (1877). Originally written in a local, rural Spanish dialect, it has been translated into modern-day Spanish for this edition. Illustrated with shining, atmospheric water colour pictures, it describes in verse the happy anticipation of a man who, having spent years away from his place of origin, is returning to his longmissed village by the sea. A trip to the countryside proves liberating: he there encounters resolute, impetuous Irina as well as a circus lion. This experience with the imposing animal makes life easier for the boy and allows him to fly away. The short, well-crafted story by noted Colombian author Antonio Ungar is here published in the attractively designed book series »Frontera ilustrada«. Ungar's text and the lively pictures by young illustrator Santiago Guevara are separated. Andrés and Margarita Rosa, the main characters of this great story from young Mexican author Esteban Hinojosa Rebolledo (b. 1987), couldn't be more different. Andrés is the small, shy, new boy in class whose mother is fatally ill, and Margarita Rosa is the stoic, quiet, resolute, overweight girl. They form an invisible bond as outsiders of the class. Margarita Rosa protects Andrés, who longs for recognition. She helps him gain self-esteem and gradually establish his place at the school. But she also guards him from abusing his newly won status: when Enrique the »nerd« joins the class and is bullied by all the children, Andrés finds himself annoyed by the new kid but also oddly drawn to him. Margarita Rosa urges him to look inside his heart, which beats fast in Enrique's presence! The sensitive story ends with a jump into cold water, goose bumps, and butterflies in the stomach. This story bowls the reader over with unbelievable force. In sentences that seem carved in stone, each hitting the mark, Antonio Ramos Revillas tells the tale of a boy whose environment almost destroys him. Shy and a little fearful, Bruno endures the coldness, malice, and antagonism of his family and classmates. Once he is only a ghost of his former self, it's his little brother who saves him by awakening Bruno's compassion and empathy. All the hardness crumbles. The story is definitely addressed to older readers, yet has the look and format of a picture book. Amanda Mijangos's dismal, threatening illustrations correspond closely to the text. At the same time, they interpret it freely, adding a whole other level to the story: Bruno is represented as a bright yellow canary in the midst of black crows, trapped behind cage bars, threatened by dangerously dangling strings, pointy beaks, and sharp claws. This book will long reverberate in readers' minds. (Age: 10+)

This image captures the matter well: Ledicia Costas's novel, which received the prestigious Premio Lazarillo in 2015, connects history, fantasy, and a dose of nostalgia. In colourful, multi-faceted language, the Galician author transports readers to the late 19th century. Starting point is Jules Verne's real-life stay in the city of Vigo in 1884. The French author, so the novel would have us believe, arrives at the port city in 1884 in order to get to the bottom of the mysterious species of »plant women«. An adventurous plot unfolds from square one, cantered around three protagonists: Verne himself, a cabin boy named Pierre, and Violeta, a pharmacist's granddaughter who is herself a plant woman. With a great sense for detail, atmosphere, local and period colour, Costas tells a suspenseful story which tightly interweaves the real and the fantastical. (Age: 12+)

After these hefty turbulences, peace finally sets back in, but the author still can't think of anything to write, because, she surmises, nothing ever happens in her life... 

Adolfo Serra's quiet, reflective, breezy poem helps even young children grasp the basic questions of human and creaturely existence. The bird girl leaps into an adventure that is part rescue mission, part quest, and part coming-of-age journey. The book thus not only portrays the protagonist's experiences, but also provides non-fiction information about the flora and fauna of Venezuela. Stefano Di Cristofaro illustrates Arianna Arteaga's text in an atmospheric way. Some landscapes, vegetation, and animals are only represented in a shadowy manner. Some pictures look like they've been painted with a sponge and recall plant printings. Overall, the illustrations impress with their gamut of colours in many differen shades They convey something of the special nature and atmosphere of the various biospheres of that vast country. The Fenno-Swedish publishing house Schildts & Söderstroms frequently publishes illustrated poetry for children. Even though most of the books are slim volumes, they always assemble a wide variety of poems ranging from thoughtful ones to nonsensical ones. The illustrations add extra pizzazz to the lyrical gems. Just take the potato – the speaker of this volume's eponymous poem; it looks rather funny sitting on a swing in the circus ring in its glittery miniskirt. And the text is quite bizarre, too: It focuses on the longings of this sad brown root vegetable: »Tänk om jag fötts till ett skimrande bär! / Tänk om jag fötts till en stor pianist / eller en världsberömt cirkusartist« (What if I had been born as a juicy berry / as a great pianist / or a famous circus acrobat). What if, indeed! Still, if you have such big dreams, there is no way you should end up an ordinary potato in the pot. So, hop onto the swing, brown tuber! (Age: 6+)

In this book, Ulf Stark, the Swedish doyen of children's literature who passed away in June 2017, brings to life an array of imaginary animals with just a few words in short poems. His concise texts are masterpieces of sound – laconic, sometimes even a little mocking. Yet they can also be quiet and melancholy, as the poem dedicated to Stella Parland shows, a young poet who died of cancer a few years ago. Linda Bondestam, who has repeatedly collaborated with Ulf Stark, places the imaginary beings into boldly colourful, atmospheric collage worlds and provides them with the fitting facial expressions: some look a little cheeky, others rather mournful. Ester wears her key around her neck, is allowed to go home alone, and knows how to make French toast. Wow! Signe wants to do this, too. She simply thinks Ester is mega-cool. Signe's parents, on the other hand, are sceptical. Who is this Ester? Can it be true that her mother is called Greta Garbo? And what about Ester's dad? In a light-hearted tone, yet with depth, and adorned with humorous pictures, this novel describes how wonderful it is when you find a friend with whom you can have the best fun ever. Yet it also describes pinching a piece of cake to impress your friend, or the guilty conscience you have when you tell a fib to your parents. And it reveals that Ester wears the key around her neck because her mother is dead and her father is constantly away, so that she is almost always alone. Most of the time, the girl copes quite well, but sometimes she doesn't. Which is why it is wonderful that Signe is there. (Age: 8+)

Researching for her book, Moa-Lina Olbers Croall talked to, chatted with, and e-mailed many young people. What they all have in common is that their »biological gender« is not the same as their gender identity. The respective biographies and experiences are similar in a way; yet they all have their individual – often tragic – story. A lot of the trans-people interviewed consider themselves »wrong«, or lacking something, and are deeply unhappy. They feel that they don't belong anywhere, because they don't fit into any of the strict, predetermined categories. The book wants to enlighten people, and does so in a very pleasing way. It is rendered in a clear language and offers a wealth of information without rambling on. At the same time, it touches its readers because they become aware (again) of how restrictive language, terms, and thought patterns can be, and how much suffering and embarrassment they may cause. The rest of the book is made up of descriptions of thirty-six different plants, all of which can be found in Turkey. Blank pages invite readers to fill them not only with their observations, but also with leaves that they have collected and dried following the informative book's instructions. This »green diary« encourages its readers to be more observant of their surroundings, invokes curiosity about nature, and helps children familiarize themselves with the flora and fauna around them. The two meet each other in the forest, when Marija loses her way and Orisja helps her. They come to deeply care about each other, learning that young and old can get along great, and that the elderly can have a youthful temperament, while the young can be wise. Sofia Andrukhovych (b. 1982) wonderfully upends typical categories and associations of youth and senectitude in this book and relativizes the two supposedly contrary life phases. Illustrator Mariana Prokhasko (b. 1976) and photographer Olena Subach manage to cleverly visualize this short, gentle, and somewhat off-beat story using montages of photos and drawings. (Age: 6+)

For A-ba-baha-la-ma-ha Press, which only publishes a few elaborately produced titles every year, Kost' Lavro's (b. 1961) quirky and edgy illustrations breathe new life into the tale. The devious fox Mykyta is cocky, clever, and boastful. He knows how to turn everything to his advantage, even when he has to hide himself in a vat of blue colour one day. He climbs out as an electrifying blue creature, claims to have been sent by Saint Nicholas and lets himself be waited on hand and foot. Of course, this doesn't last for long, for the other animals soon discover the ploy. Lavro dresses his fox as a shifty crook in a bow tie and trench coat and comments on the story's events with his jagged stroke in a marvellous and witty way. (Age: 4+)

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
