

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PRFFACE

With great pleasure we present to you the 2019 edition of our annual catalogue »The White Ravens«. This year's cover is teeming with a flock of curious, book-loving birds in blue, yellow, and white. The feathered friends, both big and small, are eagerly pecking at pages on the search for their favourite book. Diego Bianki, the creator of this picture, is also the illustrator of the book »Cuentos cansados«, which was selected for the »White Ravens 2018« list.

The »White Ravens« catalogue is the most important annual publication of the International Youth Library. It aims to promote quality in children's book publishing and has become an increasingly useful tool for anyone interested in looking beyond national borders. This year, the »White Ravens« contain a selection of 200 notable children's and young adult books from 58 countries published in 37 languages.

The printed catalogue is published prior to the Frankfurt Book Fair. For decades now, all recommended books are put on display in hard copy at the International Youth Library's booth at the Bologna Children's Book Fair. This tradition allows booth visitors to peruse the books at leisure, leafing through their pages and exploring them.

In addition to being featured in the printed catalogue, the reviews, bibliographical data, and book covers are also available in the »White Ravens« database on our website www.ijb.de.

The Library receives a vast number of donation copies and review copies over the course of every year. It falls to our language and children's book specialists to set aside new publications that catch their attention and strike them as noteworthy and that they want to recommend to an international audience. Books are chosen for the list based on the universal relevance of the themes they address, their literary and pictorial qualities, or their innovative approaches or design.

Our Library's staff have long relied on various means to acquire a well-grounded overview of the topics, trends, and people involved in current international children's and young adult literature: They read new publications in the original languages, visit important international book fairs, scout and gather information, maintain contact with publishing houses, institutions, organisations, and other experts, and they also engage in conversation with the research fellows at the International Youth Library, foreign scholars who have a profound knowledge of the literature of their home countries.

The Library's in-house staff members in Munich cover many literary regions, and freelance readers and advisors are charged with monitoring and tending to further languages and countries. The "White Ravens" catalogue thus presents a unique selection of 200 books that cover a highly diverse range of voices. Its international nature results from the efforts of approximately twenty children's and young adult book experts, who are tasked with sifting through the thousands of books received annually by the International Youth Library. Sincere thanks are due first and foremost to the countless publishers who have been supporting the

work of the International Youth Library for decades through their book donations. I also extend my gratitude to all those who have contributed to this catalogue both abroad and here in Munich.

I hope the »White Ravens« fall into the hands of many curious readers, and that these readers make many new discoveries. May the selected books, along with their creators, receive the international attention they deserve. We hope that our work contributes to this goal.

A rooster is quite dumbfounded when his »Cocka-doodle-doo!« is parroted by a child. When he flaps his wings, the boy waggles his arms. When he stretches his talons up high, the boy sticks his foot in the air! So the game goes on, until the proud bird alights himself on a washing line and shows the cheeky imitator his natural limits. In the end, the fun competition resolves peaceably. Lively, brightly-hued gouache pictures depict the antagonists with expressive mimicry and pose-like gestures, as in a comic. Alternating whole-page illustrations and small-format panels make the story even more dynamic. Lebanese author Hasan Abdullah has published poetry volumes for adults as well as more than 50 children's and young adult books. Lena Merhej specializes in film animation, book illustration, and comics. She has published more than 30 books and has received several awards. (Age: 6+)

This book is about writing and an author's love for his characters – characters that he must let go when his work is finished. The plot follows a writer as he strenuously searches for an appropriate protagonist for a new story, until he finally lands on a unique-looking cat. The shaggy, plain, but selfconfident and brave animal becomes the hero of a tale full of adventure. When the writer later leafs through his work, the cat prances out and bids him a final adieu with the words: »You surely don't want me to stay stuck between the book covers«. This original, cleverly-told book has witty and dynamic coloured-chalk illustrations. Lebanese author Nabiha Mheidly studied biology, publicity, and pedagogy and has directed Al Hadaek, the publishing house she founded, since 1989. Egyptian illustrator, cartoonist, author, and painter Walid Taher is among the Who's Who of Arabic children's literature. (Age: 8+)

This picture book shows how humans fundamentally resemble each other, yet remain unique. One half of the inhabitants of a village wears a feather on their heads and believe they are better than everyone else for it. But then the previously non-feathered also start growing a feather on their heads thanks to the pills that Mr. Plan sells for 5 rivals. Scandalous! To combat the »false feathers«, the first group buys adhesive tape from Ms. Idea for 10 rivals, which they use to remove the feathers off the rivals' heads. Then, for 15 rivals Mr. Plan offers a mysterious, ineffective drink as a countermeasure. The conflict escalates, until Ms. Idea explains to the village community that what's special about humans is found inside their heads, and it makes no difference whether one wears a feather or not. Finally, peace is restored. This fairy-tale story of Saudi Arabian author Al Batool Kamal is accompanied by humorous, lively pictures by Egyptian illustrator Aly Elziny. (Age: 8+)

Teddy bear in arm and pursued by a spooky giant, a little boy gets out of bed and heads into the street in the middle of the night. War is raging in the city, loud thunder can be heard, explosions pierce the sky with flashes that light up the darkness. The threatening atmosphere only abates on the final page, where the teddy bear, stitched back together again after having been damaged, embodies the hope that the wounds of war will heal over time. This message is echoed in the book's endpaper, where lines are cast across the page like rough seams. The mixed technique of the expressive pictures as well as the stuffed-doll protagonists fit very well with the story. By representing spaces in a highly distorted manner, an especially dark and claustrophobic atmosphere is created. Rama Kanawati is from Syria and lives in Qatar, working as a screenplay and children's book author. Fadi Fadel, also Syrian, is a painter, illustrator, and cartoonist who works in Sharjah (UAE). Lia is not happy that her parents have sent her on her own to visit her grandmother in Quintaforca during the holidays. Quintaforca is boring, and she isn't all that interested in hanging out with Grandma. The train ride starts strangely - Lia receives a »special ticket« for people who would rather not reach their destinations – and then things get even stranger. The train stops many times – but the question is: where?! There are no place names listed at the train stations. Also, the locations themselves are very odd: At one location, the buildings shine with all the colours of the rainbow; at another, the road signs are ultraprecise, listing distances to destinations down to the millimetre; at a third, people are only allowed to ask a question once one they have already heard the answer to it. Featuring lively coloured illustrations, this episodic children's novel blurs the lines between reality and dream. It is a very entertaining read, thanks to the many imaginative ideas and lively conversations that transpire between Lia and the people whom she encounters along the way. (Age: 8+)

Chun'er is born into a family of hunters. However, a dream convinces his grandfather to stop hunting on the day of Chun'er's birth. When the boy grows up, he possesses the magical ability to fly into the forest and help animals escape poachers, while his sleeping body remains lying on his bed. Thus, he becomes known as the »Weird Child« around the village. With the help of "wild men" in the forest, he and his friends finally win the war against the poachers. This novel not only urges readers to pay attention to the value of nature in a world of progressing industrialization, but also reminds them that human life is still deeply rooted in the natural world. Poet and children's book writer Dong Hongyou is the author of »Yi bai ge zhong guo hai zi de meng« (Dreams of a hundred Chinese children), »Yi bai ge hai zi de zhong guo meng« (A hundred children's China dreams), »Shi si sui de sen lin« (The 14-year-old forest) and other children's books. He has won several awards including the Chinese National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature. (Age: 10+)

The animals are enjoying a sunny day on the mountain. However, in the afternoon, they find that the sun is setting in the sky. Each animal tries its best to grab it, but each fails, one by one. The sun sinks down eventually, and the animals strive to dig it out of the ground, until they fall asleep. When they wake up in the morning, they are happy to find that they have »dug« the sun back out. Guo Zhenyuan offers a humorous explanation of how the sun falls and rises. Illustrator Zhu Chengliang combines Chinese traditional lacquer art with oil painting, while the animals' images get their inspiration from traditional toys. Zhu has illustrated a number of awardwinning picture books, including »Mian po po shui bu zhao« (Grandma Mian can't sleep) and »Da deng long« (Playing with lanterns). »Tuan yuan« (A New Year's reunion) won the Grand Prize of the 2009 Feng Zikai Children's Picture Books Award and was selected for »The New York Times's Best Illustrated Children's Books of 2011«. Zhu is nominated for the 2020 Hans Christian Andersen Award. (Age: 3+)

This autobiographical novel portrays childhood life in a small town in Northern China in the 1960s. Haizi, the protagonist, has been longing to have his own pigeons, and one summer finds himself with a pair of them. In saving them from the butcher, who is a bully, Haizi regains his belief in life and the world. Colloquial-style narration gives this novel a charming flavour and has received high praise from critics. Liu Haiqi, renowned writer, publisher, and former Deputy Chairman on the Chinese Board on Books for Young People (CBBY), is the author of over thirty children's books including »Wu wei xiao shu li xian ji« (Adventures of a tailless mouse), »Ba ba shu« (Father tree), »Lü tou fa xian sheng xing yi ji« (The medical practice of Mr. Green-Hair) and »Dou zi di li de tong hua« (Fairy tales from the field of beans). His fairy-tales are known for their distinctive style. Liu, who in recent years has focused on writing children's novels, is the winner of the National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature and other awards. (Age: 8+)

Little Dot visits Grandma, who boards his horses. At first, there are five of them, but as their number increases, it becomes difficult for Grandma to accommodate them. Of course, they need space to stand, sit, sleep, and eat, and they also need to play, bathe, and celebrate birthdays. It makes one smile to discover that these horses are but a result of Little Dot's imagination, and it is gratifying to witness an adult understanding and responding to a child's daydreaming. On every double page, the illustrator juxtaposes the child's wonder world on one side with Grandma's world of reality on the other, providing inspiring interpolations and mutually illuminating explanations. Xie Hua, author of »Kuai le de Lao ti« (Laoti's stories) and many other children's books, started writing in the 1980s and, among others, has won China's National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature. Huang Li is the illustrator of »An de zhong zi« (An's seed), a bestseller and winner of the Excellent Picture Book Prize of 2009 Feng Zikai Children's Picture Book Award. (Age: 4+)

Fifteen-year-old Sha Li (Sand) runs away with his eagle. His father Sha Ye keeps waiting for him in their small village, which is constantly at risk of being swallowed by desert sand. Sha Li's eagle returns without the boy, and Sha Ye is unable to trace his son. Years later, another boy, Xing Chen (Stardust), having gotten lost while stargazing, enters Sha Ye's life. Together, they defend their world from a wolf pack. There is always a feeling of uneasiness in Xue Tao's fiction. This seemingly rural novel turns out to be more about spiritual discovery than about material survival. Whether for Sand or Stardust, on the ground or in the sky, there is always something in life worth chasing. For his children's novels and fairy tales, including »Jiu yue de bing he« (The ice river of September), »Xiao cheng chi (The small castle), »Da fu wen« (The wealthy men), and »Shan hai jing xin chuan shuo« (The new classic of mountains and seas), he has won, among others, the Chinese National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature. This multi-award-winning graphic novel tells the story of Ms Du, a hermit, who happens upon an injured sea turtle at the beach in 2200. She tells the animal her sad life story and, while she's at it, also recounts the most important event of the past 200 years: Scientists discovered that plastic tastes delicious and can be used as food for sea animals and children. The ancient turtle is preoccupied with its own memories, memories about a time when jellyfish swam in the sea instead of plastic bags. When Ms Du takes the turtle to the vet in her hometown, she finds it empty and in ruins, unaware that it was abandoned many years before. The people have disappeared, the turtle survives. Does this give cause for hope? The Chinese-Cantonese text is embedded in somber illustrations rendered in the style of Chinese ink paintings on hand-made paper. Like most of the texts, illustrations, installations, performances, and short films created by this Hong Kong artist, the book discusses the destruction of nature during the Anthropocene. (Age: 12+)

Agui, the eldest daughter of a Chinese farming family, is to be married to a rich old man, because the harvest is so poor that they can't even afford food anymore. Her mother helps her escape this situation by sending her to her aunt in Singapore. For a ridiculously low wage, Agui toils away as a day labourer on construction sites. Nevertheless, she sends most of her pay to her family, even long after her parents have passed away. Like many of these »Sanshuipo« (Samsui women), who mostly came to Malaysia and Singapore from Sanshui County in Guangdong in search of work and independence between 1920 and 1949, she remains unmarried and does not return to her home country when she grows old. Patrick Yee, one of Singapore's best-known children's book illustrators, uses this picture book to commemorate the workers who, after their typical headgear, were also called »Hongtoujin« (Red Headscarves) and became icons of Singapore's economic transformation in the 20th century. Coconut picker Mat Jenin climbs up a palm tree and indulges in daydreams about his future fame and wealth. When he tumbles out of the tree, it's a harsh return to the real world. This Malaysian folktale is reminiscent of the European moralizing fable »The Milkmaid and Her Pail«. However, it does not focus on the moral that you mustn't let yourself get carried away by your imagination and forget reality. Rather, Taiwan's first Chinese-Malaysian bilingual picture book celebrates the daydream with relish. It does so in wonderful monochrome illustrations that are inspired by the traditional art of woodcuts of Chinese peasants and are set against bright floral motifs typical for traditional Malaysian batik fabrics. After completing her degree at the National Taiwan University of the Arts, the Malaysian-born author, illustrator, poet, and blogger Maniniwei stayed in Taiwan, where she published her first picture book in 2013. 

A boy really wants to be someone else and exchanges his face for a wolf's. When he wants to take off the wolf's face and get his own face back, he can't find it. He begins to search for his »true« face in vain, realizing he is seeking his own, lost identity. Meanwhile, his »true« face wanders about and finds many new wearers, such as a girl, a coin, or a lamb. In their picture book, author and comic artist Darko Macan (b. 1966), well-known in Croatia, and illustrator Tomislav Tomić (b. 1977) pursue a philosophical reflection on the matter of what defines a person or creature. The concise text and striking pen drawings show how one decision can completely change a life - and that sometimes such a decision ushers in regrets. (Age: 5+)

Parents shrink – or so it seems from a child's perspective. This is what the first-person narrator in Ema Pongrašić's (b. 1989) picture book experiences. His initially gigantic father becomes smaller over the course of the narrator's life, as the child-narrator grows bigger. But perceived size can change for other reasons, too. Parents shrink in their significance for their children: school and work become increasingly important; life partners and their own offspring take centre stage. Pongrašić keeps her text simple so that it invites readers to talk about what »becoming smaller« means, approaching the big questions of human relationships and lifespans. Tomislav Zlatić's (b. 1976) charming, humorous illustrations show what the text only hints at: Papa keeps shrinking, becomes tiny like a teacup, and in the end disappears totally from the picture, remaining but a memory. A boy named Prcek and a girl named Krisa compete to join the tough gang on the rubbish dump. Both act confidently, wanting to belong. Inside, they are both unsure and lonely. When Krisa makes it into the gang, Prcek wants revenge. But then things become »fantastical«: The plot moves from the real here and now to a suspenseful adventure story with magical stones, a threatened kingdom, and tasks that Prcek and Krisa must complete. They form a bond of solidarity, gradually give up their hard façade, and realize that they actually like each other. With much feeling for the protagonists' inner states, the debut of Bára Dočkalová (b. 1977) considers what it is like not to be just a child anymore, but also not yet a young adult – to be stuck between the fantasies of childhood and the raw realism of youth. In 2019, the book was one of three nominees for the renowned Magnesia Litera Award. (Age: 9+)

This book has everything it needs for building huge suspense plus a chill factor: a mysterious old neighbourhood in Prague that, for unknown reasons, has no electricity; winding, labyrinthian alleys and dark cellars; dodgy, villainous grown-ups; an ancient invention that threatens to destroy the whole city; encrypted maps, plans, and codes; and kids ready to jump right into the thick of things. Jirka (13), the main character, and his friend En are a great team, far removed from clichéd gender roles. Together they uncover the secret of Prašina (Dust Zone) and figure out what Jirka's grandpa, who lives there, has to do with it. The literary debut of mathematician Vojtech Matocha (b. 1989) combines the genres of adventure story, detective novel and science fiction in a thoroughly thrilling and spooky way. No wonder »Prašina« is counted among the most important new arrivals on the Czech children's literary scene in 2018. The book was also nominated for the prestigious Magnesia Litera Award. (Age: 10+)

Ester Stará and Milan Starý are a Czech super-duo for picture books and illustrated children's stories. In »Šedík and Bubi«, they tell a story by closely pairing text and image and by using many tricks to make reading easier. Colourful text-shading, for instance, segments words and sentences to support readers with dyslexia. Speech bubbles and comic strips create a light-hearted backdrop for the charming story about Šedík, a tom kitten, and Bubi, a pink bobble hat. The two become close friends and keep Šedík's siblings and everyone else on their toes. They have a lot of fun, but also console each other, because Bubi has no owner, and Šedík doesn't know where his mother is. Naturally, Bubi finds a fitting head by the end of the book, and Sedík finds his Mama. The story was awarded the Golden Ribbon Award in the Czech Republic. (Age: 5+)

Loneliness and sadness. Bezunk's wife died 1,644 days ago, and he trudges on bravely. He gets through everyday life, but enjoyment and fun are gone. A little squirrel appears at his window, eagerly asking for cookies and wanting to try the »green dots in the winter-machine« – peas from the freezer. The squirrel returns again and again, irritating Bezunk with his energetic, inquisitive feistiness. At the same time, Bezunk is touched by the squirrel's cheerful candour and openness. The old man comes to care about the animal. And so the two strike a friendship. As different as they are, they are good companions. The picture book employs a subdued colour palette, which lets the red squirrel leap into the foreground. Many pictures open up inner spaces and show how Bezunk feels. The text mixes descriptive scenes and dialogue with little stream-of-consciousness passages, a sophisticated and very unusual approach. (Age: 4+)

Listeners may then contemplate why and how a line becomes a dot and vice versa, an activity which may run counter to the aim of falling asleep. The Danish publisher Jensen & Dalgaard publish unusual books, bedtime stories that encourage hands-on interaction between book, reading adult, and child. (Age: 2+)

Few are as capable as Danish author Jesper Wung-Sung at writing books that continually resist fitting into conventional categories, as well as unsettling expectations levelled at children's and young adult literature. He is tremendously productive and still consistently succeeds in portraying basic anthropological and existential themes in new ways, in the process alluding to well-known motifs and constellations. This time he writes about Alfred. who has been put in a pillory at the marketplace for having committed the offense of lèse-majesté. He stands there day in, day out, year after year, decade after decade, uttering truths in a direct, insolent, and commanding manner. At best, passers-by are inspired to reflect a little. This recalls children's characters like, for instance, in H.C. Andersen's fairy-tale »The Emperor's New Clothes«. In contrast, Alfred suffers from his need to speak truth, which exposes him to mockery and brands him as an outsider. He would love to belong, but he cannot and will not submit to the rules, which govern society. (Age: 10+) Crabeels, Kim (text)

Little ostrich lives in the savannah with many other animals. He is afraid of everybody and everything in the savannah. That's the reason he always buries his head in the sand, because there, under the sand, he feels as safe as he did when he was still inside the egg. There are also animals underground who disturb him, but he keeps his head buried nonetheless. One day he hears a beautiful noise, a soft voice, above him. Little ostrich looks around and discovers that all the animals are peacefully lying next to each other. He meets an ostrich girl, and they fall in love. This philosophical and endearing picture book invites children to talk about its themes: fear. loneliness, and finding somebody to share one's life with. The story is told in a poetic language, with few words and short sentences that still say a lot. The pronounced rhythm makes it a book that should be read aloud. Expressive illustrations interpret and complete the story, with humour and an atmospheric use of colours. (Age: 4+)

He is all in a muddle and keeps finding excuses to take one of the animals to the veterinarian. The farmer is in love with the veterinarian, but too shy to ask him to a picnic. Thus, the animals decide to help their farmer. And the veterinarian finally understands what's ailing the farmer – love-sickness. The story of this endearing picture book about love – especially love between two men - is told with simplicity in poetic language. Well-chosen words can help approach a theme that some consider »difficult«. This is certainly the case in this book, whose message is: Love is for everyone. The multi-layered black-and-white pencil drawings have a surprisingly intense coloration. The illustrator uses different perspectives, paying special attention to the eyes of both the human and animal characters. (Age: 4+)

This historical youth novel is situated in the Rupelstreek, a part of the province of Antwerp, at the beginning of the 20th century. After the death of her mother, thirteen-year-old Mathilde is sent away to live with her uncle and aunt because her father has to work all day and doesn't have time to take care of her and her eight siblings. Like the father and some of her siblings, the girl must work in the brick industry. She discovers what it means to work there and how the workers are exploited. After she is sexually harassed and threatened by a supervisor, Mathilde flees to the city of Antwerp, where she finds work as a simple servant for a rich family. This gripping, well-documented piece of historical fiction is based on the author's grandmother's life. It decries the way unschooled workers were treated at the beginning of the last century. It also chronicles how people began to revolt against factory owners. This cultural-historical novel makes young readers think about oppression and labour rights, not only in history, but also in today's world. (Age: 11+)

During the International Colonial and Export Exhibition, which attracted over a million visitors to Amsterdam in the summer of 1883, a diverse group of Surinamese people built their huts in the exhibition hall. During the day, they lay in their hammocks in front of their huts, and at night, they slept on hard Dutch bunkbeds. They were considered part of the exhibition. For this book, historical author Arend van Dam researched the life of one of the participants in the exhibition: 60-year-old former plantation slave Syntax Bosselman, who went to the Netherlands on the invitation of the exhibition's organizers ten years after the abolition of slavery. Arend van Dam tells the story of this man, but also talks about the general history of slavery. At the same time this is about the nature of historical research and how to deal with outdated and racially disparaging Dutch terms. This book will give many young readers – as well as parents and teachers – a clearer picture of the history of slavery. (Age: 10+)

Orpheus wishes to rescue his wife Eurydice from the underworld, and Europa is stolen by Jupiter. These are among the 23 stories collected here, all based upon the great poems of Ovid's world-famous »Metamorphoses« and re-told for young readers in present-day language. Stories about Roman gods, heroes, and creatures are transposed to modern times. The characters are often vengeful or lovestruck, and they are constantly being misled by others. Although most of the stories are tragic, they are told in a very humorous and light-hearted way. The text is rhymed and excellent to read aloud. Silvia Weve's unique technique of drawing outside the lines yields expressive illustrations featuring strong black lines and eye-catching colours, which don't shy away from depicting the stories' cruel elements. In the illustrations, some characters and symbols reappear in different places. In 2019, Sylvia Weve was awarded the Max Velthuijs Prize, the most important award for illustrators in the Netherlands. Freddie, vividly portrayed as a young and spirited girl, is only fourteen when she and her sister join the Resistance in occupied Netherlands during World War II. They are not afraid of anything or anyone, and since Freddie looks like she's about twelve years old, no German soldiers suspect her of working for the Resistance. Their mother insists that they should never become like the enemy, and never kill anyone. But as members of the Resistance, the girls get involved in eliminating Nazis and their sympathizers. The story's atmosphere grows very tense in such moments and its explicitness is often shocking, even more so because readers share Freddie's conflicting emotions. The intensity of resistance work and the insanity of war are impressively captured. The novel is based on conversations with Freddie Oversteegen (1925-2018), who helped author Wilma Geldof when she was writing the book. Freddie died at the age of 93 some months before this absorbing, important, and sincere portrait of an incredibly brave girl was published. (Age: 15+)



Reynard the Fox has many deceitful tricks and misdeeds to his (dis)credit, and now must defend himself before the king. Several servants to the king visit Reynard one after the other to persuade him to come to court, but every time Reynard succeeds in repelling them, and certainly not in a nice way. His cousin Grimbard the Badger manages to get Reynard to the trial before the king, but, even then, Reynard is clever enough to escape. These stories are based on the famous and often recounted medieval fables about the legendary fox. Koos Meinderts imbues the stories with modern elements and a lot of humour, and builds up natural suspense, just like in the original tales. Each of the stories is illustrated by one of twenty well-known illustrators. The readers see Reynard interpreted many different ways and with a wide range of illustration techniques. This volume hence also presents a kaleidoscope of contemporary children's book illustration in the Netherlands. (Age: 10+)

Eleven students from one class, all aged around ten, talk about something strange that they have seen or done. Their stories are usually funny or slightly philosophical. The characters sometimes don't seem to care if things happen in the stories that are actually impossible. Still, the stories are not as innocent as they seem. The children's bright and breezy world can be a little dangerous at times, and it is precisely this element that makes Gideon Samson's work so clever. The author, a master of language and style, seems to be implying: There isn't anything better than the imagination, but be careful what you dream up because it might come true. This is a book of crazy events in an ordinary school class, all about misfits and peer pressure, which will give readers plenty to talk about. This is the first children's book that Joren Joshua has illustrated. In 2010, Gideon Samson was the youngest-ever winner of the renowned Dutch Silver Pencil Award. »Zeb.« was awarded the Silver Pencil (for writing) and the Silver Brush (for illustration) in 2019. (Age: 10+)

A fox cub wants nothing more than to discover life, but he takes a tumble and finds himself in a dream that is a kind of near-death experience. In five double spreads, illustrator Marije Tolman gives the reader the space to get to know Little Fox and his habitat, which she depicts using cleverly arranged grainy blue-green photographs of beach and dune landscapes. The pen drawings of animals and the cheerful bright-orange fox cub shown from varying perspectives make the spreads into intriguing works of art. Edward van de Vendel takes the reader through the dream, writing in clear sentences about the happiness of life's small moments that delight the senses. What is actually happening is that Little Fox, hovering between life and death, is seeing his life pass before his eyes like a film. Marije Tolman and Edward van de Vendel have created an accessible. attractive, and multi-layered book. This is children's literature at a high level. (Age: 6+)



Told in alternating chapters from the two protagonists' points of view, the book combines an entertaining plotline with important issues. (Age: 15+)

Based in Melbourne and founded in 2016, Scribble - the picture book imprint of Scribe Publications prides itself on presenting a »vibrant, eclectic list of illustrated books for children by brilliant writers and artists [...]«. Daniel Gray-Barnett's debut picture book »Grandma Z« definitely fits the description. It depicts the transformation of young Albert from a perfectly groomed, well-behaved boy, who suffers a boring existence deprived of joy in an extremely ordinary town, into a vivacious adventurer. All it takes to turn his grey world upside down, or orange-blue, is a heartfelt birthday wish and – zap – eccentric Grandma Z arrives on her motorbike and takes him on the ride of his life. Bold illustrations in different sizes catapult the two protagonists into a humdrum world of craziness, rendered in bright orange, black, and blue. The book is a celebration of imagination as well as of the magic of extraordinary moments that children can find in their everyday lives. (Age: 4+)

Beth Teller was killed in a car accident and her dad is beside himself with grief. So when his boss sends him to a small town to investigate an allegedly easy new case - an (accidental) fire destroyed a children's home and a corpse was found on site the teenage girl-turned-ghost hopes that this will set her dad back on the right path and is determined to help. But then two more people turn up dead within 24 hours, and the stories of the only witness, a young Aboriginal girl called Isobel »Izzy« Catching, prove that this case is anything but easy. The quiet town seems to harbour some shocking secrets. Can Catching, Teller, and the mysterious Crow get to the bottom of the tragedy? In this superbly crafted suspenseful thriller-cumghost-story told from two points of view – Beth's in prose, Izzy's in lyrical free verse - the Aboriginal author team tackle a number of challenging issues, including grief, violence, racism, and the darkest parts of Australia's colonial history. (Age: 13+)

Fans of award-winning artist Shaun Tan know that every new book of his is a special treat as well as a challenge. There is never just one layer. »Cicada« is a tale about an insect, clad in a grey suit and tie, who slaves away in a huge company's sterile office cubicle for seventeen years. Despite the almost robot-like perfection of his performance, the eponymous hero never receives any appreciation; he is maltreated and abused. The concise text is written in clipped, rough free verse, with each stanza concluding with the same call, »Tok, Tok, Tok«, which might refer to the noise cicadas make, or the tapping on a keyboard, the ticking of a clock, etc.... The feeling of oppression created by the powerful monochrome illustrations only lifts when Cicada breaks out of his grey chrysalis as a fiery red creature, free at last, to fly away into a colourful future with other cicadas. In this seemingly simple book, Shaun Tan alludes to a multitude of complex topics, including bullying, belonging, endurance, and liberation. (Age: 5+)



»F-U-N« is all that Norma can read on the little flag showing her family the way to great-uncle Frank's funeral. And why shouldn't it be fun? It's a day off school and Norma's chance to spend time with her favourite cousin Ray. While the service seems awfully long, the triangle sandwiches at the reception restore Norma's spirits. She slips outside with Ray to play, romping across the pages. The wordless double spread at the centre of the book grants a bird's eye view of the two children running across the vast lawn up to the cemetery, where the gravestones are grouped beneath blossoming pink cherry trees. This image exudes pure joy and love of life. With minimal text and maximum impact images, Matt James creates a gentle, life-affirming picture book about life and death. Using dimensional elements made from cut paper, masking tape, cardboard, and scrollsawn masonite, he adds visual and emotional texture to the acrylics and ink. »Mom«, Norma shares on the way home, »I think Uncle Frank would have liked his funeral.« (Age: 4+)

»Sometimes, / if you read hard enough / the whole world disappears.« But it has a way of coming back. Like ebb and flow. Like the lines of free verse of this novel, which perfectly capture the changing emotions of first-person-narrator Jett, who is spending the summer with his grandma Jo to forget what happened in that »rotten bad year« on the main land. As happy and painful memories wash over Jett, readers begin to piece together the events that led him to betray one friend – only to prove his loyalty to another. Smith succeeds in creating well-rounded, convincing characters whose past has marked their present. The Atlantic island is more than just the setting; it sets the tone and rhythm of the verse novel and becomes a place of healing. Feelings of shame and guilt or love find authentic expression in the form of free verse, which leaves lots of room for silence and reflection. This poetic middle grade novel was shortlisted for the 2018 Governor General's Literary Award. (Age: 9+)

It might be a beautiful morning in the park, but without any company Clara feels bored and lonely; until she gently picks up an abandoned (obviously enchanted) umbrella and is granted her wish: a little cat to play with. And the talking umbrella's magic doesn't end there; it also produces a real elephant, who helps old Mr Roberts pick some apples, and a butterfly band playing music for everyone to dance to. While they are all having a ball, greedy, sly Mr Fox sneaks closer to steal the bewitched object away for his own satisfaction - but immediately gets his comeuppance. Elena Arévalo Melville, born in Guatemala and now based in Cambridge, has created atmospheric, matt mixed-media illustrations that take little Clara into a magical realm where »...anything is possible«. This witty and whimsical picture book is part of the first list of books published by Scallywag Press, a new publishing house who focuses on memorable picture books from around the world, including re-editions of picture book classics such as Roger Duvoisin's »The Happy Lion«. (Age: 3+)

This moving collaboration is narrated from the perspective of an unnamed girl. At first, she simply chats about her daily routine, family, and school. Yet one day, her life changes drastically: »just after lunch, war came. « The peaceful, happy world depicted in colour pencil in warm shades is suddenly invaded and overwhelmed by huge black-grey clouds and red-hot fire – the turning point of the book. Although the story of a displaced girl who longs to go to school again was inspired by a true event (as the author explains in the afterword), the book goes beyond the specific by leaving ample space for the readers' own thoughts and interpretations and making any refugee child's trauma palpable. Eventually, the kindness of a young boy and his friends signals a positive change for the girl. The powerful illustrations and the poetic story, in which the offering of a chair works beautifully on both the literal and the metaphorical level, create a seamless, thoughtprovoking story that provides a perfect incentive for discussing war and refugees. Boys and girls are striving to fulfill (or break out of) their gender-specific roles to become brave warriors and caring house wives respectively, and decisions are discussed with the elders, and guided by the assistance of the ancestors' spirits. When one day, a light-skinned, blueeyed, tall stranger – an American – appears in their remote mountain village, the daily routine of tenyear-old Samkad and his best friend, tomboy Little Luki, is turned upside down: Foreign languages, guns, deceit, exploitation, and war enter their world. This gripping novel imagines what living in a country on the brink of colonisation might have been like. Told from the point of view of a courageous indigenous boy, the book whisks readers away into a fascinating, unfamiliar world. (Age: 12+)





To each word, the book dedicates three double-page spreads: On the first one, the letters of the word are scattered around the page amid a sketchy or barren landscape from which this particular plant or animal is missing. The second spread features a full-page illustration of the »protagonist« accompanied by an acrostic poem or »spell« to summon the words back into the world. The final spread presents a full-colour painting of the plant or animal in its natural habitat. The book, with its evocative texts and stunning watercolour illustrations, is a joyful celebration of our natural environment, and has kicked off an important movement that includes a touring musical project and album with numerous new spell songs. Eighteen months prior, Zara's friend Sophie died at a party from a drug overdose, yet the only eye-witness was Zara; and even though she would love to see the culprit punished and help Sophie's family (including her big brother – Ash!) make their peace, she can't; as an »illegal«, i.e. a person not born in Britain, she and her mother live in hiding to avoid being deported by the leading nationalist party. Their only hope is the impending election that might bring about change. Tracey Mathias has conjured up a dystopian scenario that may (at current still) be fictional but doesn't seem particularly unlikely anymore – which makes this a terrifying and important read for readers of any age. 





With middle graders and teenage readers as a target audience, Hendrix describes both the life of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a young German interested in God and religion who later joins the resistance movement, and the rise to power of Adolf Hitler and his National Socialist Party in Germany in the 1930s. Spanning almost half a century, the handwritten text cogently condenses the complex issues and presents them in an interesting combination of fact and fiction. Impressive images, powerful metaphors, insightful quotes, and the juxtaposition of good and evil make this book a compelling read for all ages. (Age: 12+)



This is not merely a guide to writing poetry. This is a guide to »Jabberwalking« (a term based on Lewis Carroll's famous poem »Jabberwocky«). Written by Juan Felipe Herrera, former poet laureate of the USA, the book starts out with the author taking his dog for a (jabber)walk, while explaining his method of writing while walking to the reader. Interspersed throughout are sketches and autobiographical anecdotes, and the layout is lively, with words varying in size and sentences scattered across the pages. This might sound like a strange mix, but on the contrary: The different elements work well together and turn the book into something unique. The author's apparent fun while writing is contagious and makes you want to start scribbling immediately. The fast pace of the text whirls you along (»Hurry!«) and invokes a feeling of impatient excitement. Herrera doesn't simply explain the term Jabberwalking in this volume, he demonstrates it. The technique is funny, messy, playful, quite personal at times, and above all liberating. (Age: 12+)

Thanks to a number of movements such as #We-NeedDiverseBooks and #OwnVoices, children today can find an increasing amount of reading material about characters of different skin colours, ethnic backgrounds, religions etc, created by non-white authors and illustrators. Many of them also address the problem of racism. However, some white parents might feel that this tough and controversial issue has nothing to do with their (small) children. In her brilliant square picture book »Not My Idea«, Anastasia Higginbotham skilfully argues and explains in a child-friendly way, why »Racism is a white person's problem and we are all caught up in it – mostly by refusing to look at it.« Using powerful collages mounted on a brown paper background, she tells the story of a young white girl who is frightened but also curious about the events happening around her. The author not only informs children about white supremacy and the oppression of people of colour, she also comforts them and encourages them to make a difference, no matter how small they are. Darius Kellner – fractional Persian, Star Trek fan, tea enthusiast, and clinically depressed teenager doesn't really fit in anywhere: He is bullied at school; his father, the »Teutonic Übermensch«, is mostly disappointed with his un-manly son; and although he has inherited distinctly Persian looks from his mother, his knowledge of Farsi or the Persian culture is minimal. Therefore, he doesn't have high hopes for the family's first trip to Iran to visit his grandmother and terminally ill grandfather. Yet then he receives a warm welcome from all his relatives in Iran, learns more about his cultural roots, and meets Sohrab, the boy next door. With him at his side, he finally feels accepted, loved, and at home just as he is. Adib Khorram's awardwinning debut novel not only gives an insight into the challenges of growing up in a biracial family, it also provides an authentic portrait of a teenage boy struggling with mental illness without being defined by it. This small-format poetry anthology about two schoolkids is a splendid collaboration between four people. Set in the present – with a slight nod at the authors' own childhoods in the 1980s – the book tackles the timeless and universal themes of race. identity, prejudice, and friendship. When the kids' teacher pairs them up for a poetry project, neither (white) Irene nor (black) Charles is particularly happy to be thrown in this together. At first, they see nothing but their big differences, but over the course of writing poems about daily matters such as shoes, hair, church, the beach, etc., talkative Charles and introvert Irene discover that they have quite a few things in common. And they don't restrict their poems to simple issues either; controversial topics, such as prejudice and fear also creep in – as in Irene's poem »Why Aunt Sarah Doesn't Go Downtown after Dark«: »sky / black / streets / black / faces / black / fear / white«. Accompanied by atmospheric illustrations in bright, matt colours, the poems invite readers to challenge their own preconceptions. (Age: 6+)



Yet when the child unpacks his pens and paper and starts drawing a sparkling superhero with a wand, the old man grabs his own sketchbook and a pot of ink – and all of a sudden, the two discover they can create »a world beyond words« together. Minh Lê's sparse, poignant text about a grandfather and grandson who eventually relate through their love of visual storytelling leaves ample room for Dan Santat's energetic illustrations. In his cartoony pictures, Santat skilfully lets the two protagonists speak in their idiosyncratic styles and then combines the two to create a seamless new unity. A true celebration of art and love! (Age: 4+)

It smells so delicious that one by one, people come knocking on Omu's door to ask for a tiny little (or larger) portion of the wonderful dish. Generous as she is, she ladles out yummy helpings of her meal to Little Boy, Ms. Police Officer, Hot Dog Vendor, and all the others, until – oh no – nothing is left for her. Yet the next knock brings the whole community back to her door with gifts aplenty, and a joyous celebration commences. Inspired by her own grandmother's great cooking and generosity, debut artist Oge Mora has crafted a warm-hearted story of food, sharing, and the joy of friendship. Most importantly: Unlike many other books, which usually finish with the end of World War II, this story begins with the liberation of the concentration camp Bergen-Belsen by British soldiers. Jewish teenage girl Gerta has barely survived all the cruelties and torture – but how is she going to go on without her beloved dad, a violist and music aficionado? What good are her dreams of becoming a famous opera singer now? Should she stay in Europe or try to escape to Palestine? Aided by her friend Lev, a Hasidic Jew from Poland, and other fellow survivors, Gerta tentatively redefines her life, one step at a time. This quietly told and powerful novel draws in readers and carefully explores the question of how you can overcome such a trauma. The sepia-coloured illustrations underscore the special atmosphere of the text while adding a metaphorical level to the story. (Age: 14+)





Neither big brother's silly faces, nor sister's flute-playing, or Mama's song achieve more than a smile. Yet eventually, the grandparents are rewarded with a big laugh. Jonathan Nelson's (Diné/ Navajo) matt illustrations created in pencil, ballpoint, and photoshop present a modern tight-knit family, their cosy city apartment, as well as modernday life on the Navajo Nation, with many endearing, culturally specific details. An informative appendix provides details about the First Laugh Celebration and other ceremonies welcoming new babies around the world. (Age: 3+)

Founded in 2016, their output includes imaginative picture books, exquisite poetry anthologies, such as »H Is for Haiku« and »Thirteen Ways of Looking at a Black Boy«, and stories about uncomfortable but socially relevant topics. One such book is »A Card for My Father«. Young Flora hates all the buzz about Father's Day. How is she supposed to create a special card or attend a picnic for a person she doesn't know anything about? Whenever she dares to ask her mom about her dad, she receives nothing but frowns, tears, and silence. Where is her father and why has he never visited his daughter? The touching text of this slim volume doesn't reveal that Flora's dad is in prison, yet the expressive cartoon-like illustrations eventually give a hint on the last page. This topical book provides a much-needed incentive to discuss imprisonment – but also absent fathers in general – with young readers. (Age: 6+)

Back in 2009, in her children's book Ȇhes väikses veidras linnas«, Aino Pervik took readers on a tour through a city full of bizarre characters. These new stories and absurd poems about the genteel inhabitants of NummiPealt (BonnyHead) introduce a novel cast of quirky characters. With irony, wit, and a feel for the comic, Pervik deftly presents Mr. Aunt and Ms. Uncle: Mr. AbsentMind and his moments of forgetfulness; and Ms. WideEyed, who believes everything she sees and is told - for instance, that drinking petrol makes you faster. Aino Pervik fleshes out the odd crew with wordplay, a laconic tone, and gentle warmth, showing yet again why she is one of Estonia's most relevant children's literary voices. Olga Pärn (b. 1976) and her son Märt Rudolf match Pervik's lovely text and idiosyncratic protagonists with awkwardly funny pictures that are a lot of fun. (Age: 8+)

Pärt is a shy and thoughtful boy, and his inner voice tends to trip him up. This time it happens at the grocery: Pärt is waiting in the cashier's line with his Papa, when his father remembers that he still needs flour. Pärt stays in the line and is mighty proud to be standing all alone with the groceries. But then his thoughts start jostling about: Why is Papa taking so long? Does he need help with selecting the flour? What happens if the line moves quickly and we're up next? With much understanding and humour, Anti Saar (b. 1980) and illustrator Anna Ring (b.1992) have crafted a wonderful children's book character. whose thoughts and fears are all too relatable. It's impossible not to like Pärt! (Age: 6+)

Retired librarian Ms Salvacion takes all the cats abandoned in her dark backyard and opens a »cat library«. She catalogues the animals according to their personality and talent and then lends them to just the right people who need comfort or inspiration. With his book, distinguished author Eugene Evasco wants to raise awareness not only for animal rights, but also for marginalised population groups. The story was inspired by "The Human Library"«, an NGO created in Copenhagen in 2000, in which human beings from different social and ethnic backgrounds can be »borrowed« for conversation. Evasco likes to challenge his readers with excellent stories written in a literary style, instead of simplifying them. The enigmatic illustrations by Jared Yokte, in which people hardly differ from cats, provide another challenge for young readers. This book was the winner of the »Romeo Forbes Story Writing Competition 2018« by the non-profit organization CANVAS, which promotes Philippine art and culture, as well as literacy among children. He remains caught in the »higher, faster, farther« momentum until he hits upon the fish who called for help – help to demonstrate against all the big boats speeding about. By means of its colourful print- and retro-aesthetic and »wormy« hero, »Mato ja meri« raises awareness about the need to protect nature and the environment. 

The French sociologist Gérald Bronner shows how political »disinformation« functions, using many historical examples. Illustrator and manga-artist Krassinsky adds short comics to this, which show how one can apply critical thinking to protect oneself against the targeted spread of false information. (Age: 13+)


The wolf remains the favourite fairy-tale animal of many a reader. Even the early-deceased illustrator Mario Ramos (1958-2012) had a weakness for the ambivalent fairy-tale figure, giving the wolf a special place in his »contes détournés« (fairy-tale parodies). The best appearances made by Ramos's anthropomorphized wolf are as a vain braggard and a farcical scaredy-cat. Armed with careful preparation and the worst intentions, he nonetheless is defeated by his weaker opponents. He manages to aggressively berate a tiny green dragon a moment of triumph - only to have the (terrifying) dragon-mama appear. In this superb volume, Belgian publisher Pastel collects Ramos's five most beautiful wolf stories for the first time, sparing no effort in terms of book design and production. A personal foreword from illustrator Andrea Nève Ramos, the widow of Mario Ramos, completes the book, whose entire composition is on point, right down to the last detail. (Age: 3+)

In 1940, René Tardi, father of comic author Tardi, was a young soldier, who entered German imprisonment and barely survived his time in »Stammlager« (Stalag) IIB, a prisoner-of-war camp. Tardi processes his father's traumatic memories in this personal trilogy, which (in volumes 1 and 2) superbly treats the complex relationship between Germany and France from the perspective of a French prisoner of war. The third volume portrays, among other things, the return of René Tardi to Germany as a regular soldier in 1951/52, this time as an occupier and with his family. Tardi writes himself into the whole trilogy as a (fictional) boy – an exceptionally successful device. The child accompanies his father - critically as well as empathically - through even his darkest hours. The vivacious boy becomes the narrator in the third volume, which describes with subtle irony the bizarre everyday life and contradictions of post-war Germany and France from a child's perspective. Anaïs Barbeau searched Canadian history for 40 great women and their legacies, presenting the results in this young-adult book from small-scale publisher Marchand de Feuilles. The only point of critique: The book's selection unfortunately favours white middle-class female role models. Some female representatives of the First Nations and Black communities, as well as representatives of other social classes are considered. but this list could surely be expanded. (Age: 9+)

True, he lives in a place with a very bad reputation: Hell. However, the abode of the damned is in fact a cheerful living room full of monsters and demons – Hell's somewhat spacedout denizens. Satan's red eyes cast a constant glow in the background, but the two friends don't seem bothered. For Sam, being in Hell turns out to be a welcome and relaxing alternative to life on Earth, which was an experience defined by fear, eccentric phobias and, most of all, by boredom. The illustrations and story-telling boldly capture the grotesque. The Picard/Williams duo has successfully crafted an amusing gem of a picture book on carefree living in the after-life. (Age: 7+)







With satirical twist and unbridled lust for invention – in the best tradition of the »ligne claire« - award-winning Swiss illustrator Albertine's picture book delivers a subtle version of the famous Andersen fairy-tale, "The Emperor's New Clothes«. A child breaks the spell the adults are under and speaks the obvious truth out loud: The king, who pompously puts himself in the spotlight, is a not only human, he is – worse still – a (naked) dreamer, who lives in an alternate world that has nothing to do with the realities of his subjects. With gentle irony, Albertine unveils the monarch to be an eccentric fashion nut who – if things went his way - would rule from the runway rather than from the throne. In a captivating way, Albertine interprets this subversive fairy-tale as a masterpiece on the topic of manipulation and effective resistance. (Age: 5+)

In each of their lives, disputes concerning their right to assert their own, »female« freedom – through professional and personal self-determination, also on the home front - play a significant role. With humour and much empathy, young Lebanese-Palestinian author Jadd Hilal describes the not-always-successful strategies the women deployed against violent fathers or paternalizing husbands and their attempts to determine the women's lives. In his impressive first work, which received the Grand prix du roman métis 2018 and the Prix du Roman Métis des lycéens 2018, Hilal paints a realistic panorama of Palestinian women and girl characters. The stories are about ordinary things: the children go to a new school, and after a few days they already have new friends. They also visit a farm house for children, celebrate Nine's birthday, and when relatives come to visit the family, they show them »their« village. Although the story takes place in a typical Frisian village, life is not traditionally »Frisian« there anymore. The children don't have traditional Frisian names, for instance. Life is full of diverse and sometimes conflicting experiences: Nine receives a clichéd nog doll for her birthday, while Joery's new friend is black and the children's grandmother is Italian. The episodes are told in a vivid way, with natural-feeling dialogue. The lighthearted, expressive, and colourful illustrations pair perfectly with the words of the story. (Age: 4+)

Told with incredible sass and illustrated in vivid cartoon-like drawings, »Jacky Marrone jagt die Goldpfote« (Jacky Marrone hunts the golden paw) consists of a firework of witty, whacky ideas, including various allusions to literary motifs, characters, and genre conventions. Jacky the fox, a private eye, is waiting for his first case – and his wait is over soon: an old little lady who introduces herself as Widow Bolte and throws down a wad of bank notes asks Jacky to bring back Aurelia, her golden chicken. Aurelia is very dear to the widow's heart, and to her household budget, because the golden chicken's special eggs provide the lady with bread and butter (and a formidable mansion) – which is why the hen is of interest to all sorts of scoundrels. Jacky, both canny and courageous, leaves no stone unturned and employs even the most outlandish tricks of the detective trade to find Aurelia. Will he be successful? (Age: 7+)

Zorilla, the marten, is an outsider. He is fairly new to town. The other inhabitants watch him with suspicion that soon turns into outright hostility. Rumours abound: What is it exactly that this Zorilla does? He walks the streets at night collecting glass; he buys screws and nails. The town people indulge in the most horrendous speculations – until one day they can't take it anymore. They simply have to see what's going on. However, when they arrive at Zorilla's workshop, he has disappeared. He has built himself a huge ship-in-a-bottle to cruise around the world. No malicious intent whatsoever; instead it is wanderlust, eagerness to explore, and a general longing that carry him away. Jutta Bücker tells this story about xenophobia in expressive pictures that deliberately set readers on the wrong track, because Zorilla is not depicted as the classic hero for whom readers feel sympathy. Thus, (many adults') expectations are challenged and the readers' prejudices revealed. Cleverly done! (Age: 6+)

Alf, who tells the story, is a sensitive observer with a subtle sense of humour and a big heart that gets considerably out of sync during this particular outdoor-pool-summer... (Age: 8+)

Lubotschka is eighteen and oscillates between the-world-is-my-oyster and melancholy, between posing and searching for the meaning of life. Just like the city in which she lives and which she is soon going to leave for Germany, Lubotschka is full of surprises. In this novel, St. Petersburg is more than just a backdrop, because the young woman does not simply amble through the city; instead, she soaks it up and can tell stories about memorials and department stores as well as the »kommunalka«, the communal apartment typical for Russia. Simply put: St. Petersburg is part of Lubotschka's DNA. Therefore, the book does not merely portray a girl's coming-of-age, but also a city in transition. The story is set during the turn of the millennium, a time when St. Petersburg was home to sassy adolescents as well as nostalgic old folks, to impoverished grannies as well as newly-rich tossers. After his initial shock-induced paralysis and her disdain, the two children slowly become friends. Since the girl is a true amazon, the holidays are further improving, despite - or because of - the fact that a few unexpected and really exciting things happen. »Zelten mit Meerschwein« (Camping with guinea pig) is a summer read, a skilfully told children's novel about the happiness of small things, friendship, and freedom. (Age: 10+)

A mismatched couple of underdogs sets off on a hero's journey through Germany. Their trip leads them from the north-easternmost point of Mecklenburg-West Pomerania at the coast of the Baltic Sea all the way to the Bavarian Alps. Sean, a student from Iran, and Davy, an eight-year-old boy who ran away from a children's home, are being chased by mean gangsters. They find shelter with a group of Polish strawberry pickers and capture the hearts of some voluptuous women; they search for the Nibelung treasure in the Rhine river, the most German of all rivers; they meet the Bavarian »Kini« (King Ludwig II) at Neuschwanstein Castle, and they witness a miracle at »Wieskirche« church. »Tankstellenchips« (Petrol station chips) is a magnificently told road movie or monomyth – a parody that offers an ironic play on German myths and, at the same time, makes fun of German idiosyncrasies, customs, and behaviour. Yet even readers who have never heard of Dwarf Alberich from the Song of the Nibelungs, nor of King Ludwig II will enjoy the fast-paced, comical, and linguistically powerful novel. What a superb book! (Age: 14+)



Unfortunately, Fidaa learns about his plans, and thus two completely different personalities and an injured rabbit in a cool box hit the road heading towards Andrea's mother, who lives in the Black Forest. Yet the fact that there is a »mole« playing a double game even among the team of investigating European journalists who are striving to expose the scandal, is particularly perfidious. The author once said in an interview that there is no topic too complex for a graphic novel. »Salzhunger« (Hunger for salt) is ample proof of this: The book is as suspenseful as a thriller not only thanks to its dramatic structure and expressive, sinister visual language, but also to its all-too-real subject matter: syndicates that stop at nothing to reach their goals, expansion at any price, and governments that show callous disregard for their citizens. The large-format picture book captures the timeless and unfortunately everpresent topic in concise sentences and illustrations rendered in grey, red, and blue. 

Promising artist Vassilis Koutsogiannis creates an almost photo-realistic likeness of the protagonists' faces in the central images. Their contrasting and reluctant feelings, on the other hand, become symbolically visible in an imaginative and empathetic way through the complementary colours yellow and violet. (Age: 5+)

The double-spread pages are divided, with events in Greece documented on the left, and simultaneously occurring international events providing some context on the right. To illustrate the texts, Vassilis Papageorgiou altered contemporary press photos. They are rendered partly in murky, diffuse black-and-white, partly in loud, vibrant colours to reflect oppression and resistance as well as the dynamic developments in politics, society, art, music, and fashion, up to the point when the dictatorship was finally overcome after seven years. Renowned author Marisa de Castro has received several awards for her other outstanding non-fiction books. (Age: 12+)





Wickson Alieni's ability proves itself to be extremely helpful to Inspector Frank Fellikke, since the Inspector relies on the detective to solve cases that he himself then takes credit for. The Inspector thus has a lot of free time, which he likes to spend fussing over the single hair on his head. The single hair is called Filippo and can speak. Readers follow along on three adventure-filled cases that take place in London, a city beset with terrible crimes. Cloud-capturing machines, a thickening fog, and five o'clock teas collide as the real, the surreal, and the fantastical intermingle. The suspenseful and comic story will baffle readers at more than one turn. (Age: 7+)

War is always deafening, even when it is fought without machines or modern technology. This book deals with the wars of early humans and ancient myths, the simulated war of child's play and present-day conflicts, and all undeclared and unexplained, but still utterly real wars. The viewer travels through space and time, studying the powerful images to find the causes, particular circumstances, and signs of wars. The question concerning our future is left open. The players try to kick the can without being noticed by It, the catcher, who guards the can. The protagonist of »Kankeri«, Chie, is a shy girl who always depends on her friends. When Chie plays the game and becomes the only one to save other players, she gathers all her courage. The lively, dramatic illustrations aptly capture the moment when she rushes out of the hiding place and kicks the can. The dark space giving way to light outside represents her slight emotional wavering. Even her thumping heartbeats are tangible to readers. The theme and scenery are nostalgic, but Ishikawa's artistry, as seen in her unique use of frames, for example, makes this book appealing to children today. (Age: 4+)

After discovering a leaf that turns out not to be a leaf, they are frightened by a predator, and finally arrive, amazed, at the scarlet mountain, at which point readers learn the reason for their strenuous search. The simple, repetitive text is easy to follow. The thoughtful and sophisticated design of the book, including its textured jacket and endpapers, makes it a true treasure. (Age: 3+)

Written by Rui Kodemari, a Japanese author living in the USA since 1992, the novel portrays American high school students participating in a panel discussion on the atomic bombing of Japan. The protagonist is a Japanese-American girl. While one of the students believes that the people killed by the bombing were not Japanese civilians but soldiers, opposing arguments indicate that the victims of the atomic bombing and nuclear testing were racially discriminated against non-whites like Japanese, Native American, or Bikini Atoll people. The characters' speaking style is a little unusual, not quite native Japanese-sounding. This may enable easier translation into other languages. (Age: 13+)

Aya's boldness, talkativeness, and sharp tongue sometimes stir trouble with her friends. After she fights with her best friend and fails to make friends with a new shy girl in the neighbourhood, an invisible fluffy cat, a gigantic cat, and a tiny cat appear one after another. They soften her hardened heart and nudge her to make up with friends. The profound and imaginative story invites readers into the inner world of Aya, following the subtle changes in her emotions and her path toward maturity. The charming childlike illustrations match the story very well. (Age: 9+)

His strong-willed and decisive way recalls Jean Giono's masterpiece »The Man Who Planted Trees« and Martin Luther's words »Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree.« The striking photos show the horror of radiation that remains harmful for an immensely long time, as well as the everyday life of people struggling with the intolerable situation. These themes are echoed in other books of the same series »Soredemo Furusato (Still my hometown). « (Age: 9+)

The novel has two protagonists: a tough, feisty girl named Itsuki and Kazuma, an insecure boy who had to leave the top-ranked school because of underachievement. Itsuki takes care of her invalid mother and younger sister but is apologetic about receiving welfare as her classmates condemn it as laziness. As the protagonists come to know each other, their complicated feelings of inferiority, suppressed anger, and helplessness gradually diminish. The book title refers to Itsuki and Kazuma, who initially both feel alienated from the other's circumstances, given their socio-economic differences. The title also refers to Itsuki's wish to realize her dreams in the face of economic hardship. Other characters in the story are also depicted with depth and sensitivity, including their classmate's uncle, economically exploited as an assistant professor, and their friend Abel, silenced by his Nigerian immigrant father, who became a violent man after being the victim of racial discrimination. 

This is another touching story by well-known Korean picture book author Baek Heena, who from 2014 to 2019 has annually been nominated for the Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award. Her books often recall Claymation movies, their protagonists being sculptures arranged and photographed in miniature film sets. From a dog's perspective, we are told how a puppy named Guseuli is adopted by five-yearold Dongdongi's family once the puppy is weaned. Guseuli misses its mother and its sibling puppies terribly, and every time it hears dogs howling in the neighbourhood, Guseuli has to respond, because they might be its family. Guseuli's new life consists mostly of waiting in the empty house for its human housemates to return. It wonders why Dongdongi and Grandmother stumble and get so angry when running for a walk together. Guseuli doesn't understand why it is punished when it has an accident on the bed after having been fed junk food. Nonetheless, Guseuli becomes a real family member and gives – and is given – unconditional love by Dongdongi. (Age: 3+)



The woodpecker gets angrier: This dumb doctor just forbids everything that is woodpecker-y! Then, a saving insight arrives, and he's a happy woodpecker once more. Phew! The pictures, composed by Ragnar Aalbu using his typical graphic-geometric reductive style, illustrate the association-rich conversation between woodpecker and mole. All manner of animal and human being is depicted burrowing, digging, and hacking, sometimes peering through a hole or on the brink of to falling into one. There's much for readers to discover, and there are many story threads to spin further. So, just because you can't continue doing what you've always done doesn't mean you need despair. (Age: 6+)

Winter is gradually coming to an end. It is still cold, but the ice on the river is already breaking. But then Helena and Turid watch a man run out onto the ice. He's not wearing a coat and is carrying a briefcase. He slides a little, then breaks in, and the current threatens to pull him under the ice. Sometimes the narrator's statements refer to past events, sometimes to future events, and sometimes they tell of something that's not necessarily visible: »One hundred and thirty-five people at an airport. Nineteen are homesick«. To whom could this apply? Is it possible to visually detect? Or not? 
This is the first volume of an in-process trilogy. It revolves around three intertwined stories, and has two narrators, decades apart in time from each other. The first is a boy named Majid, who lives in the present time. The second is a poor boy named Reza Qoli, who lives in the Qajar Era (around 1910). Reza was kidnapped from his family and sent to work as a slave for a cruel master who enslaved young boys in a haunted and feared house. The boys' paths cross in ways neither could imagine. As is to be expected from Hamid Reza Shahabadi, social issues such as child labour. poverty, and class distinctions, child smuggling, and historical events are woven into the storylines. Reza finally flees his master's grip with the help of a wise man, who is actually the founder of modern schools in Iran and fights illiteracy, superstition, ignorance, and negligence. Majid reads about Reza's struggles to survive in a diary that accidentally fell into his father's hands and finds out that Reza really existed. (Age: 14+)

It is the story of a cat continuously catching mice. At one point, a mouse hears that the cat deeply regrets having hunted mice. All of the mice learn the news. To improve the hostile relationship between the cat and themselves, they send the cat many gifts. Nevertheless, the cat eats all the envoys, and the fight between the cat and the mice intensifies. In the end, though the mice are the winners at first, all of them are killed. Like an impartial reporter, Sayyed Ali Shodjaie narrates the story as if it were taking place in the present. He recounts Ubayd's story, changing the verse narration into a report on the fight between the mice and the cat. Illustrator Sara Mayari also depicts the animals in a novel way, drawing on her distinct artistic style. Although the original story was written 600 years ago, it still contains a fresh and relevant message for 21st-century readers. (Age: 9+)



Whenever author Justyna Bednarek (b. 1970) and illustrator Daniel de Latour (b. 1971) get together, a humorous, warm-hearted and good-humoured children's book is sure to follow. That is certainly the case with »Babcocha«, which has justifiably earned a nomination as Polish children's book of the year. In 54 shorts stories replete with situational comedy, Babcocha - an ingenious witch - looks after life in a small town. Every story is one page long and is accompanied by a whole-page illustration. Babcocha flies in on her hail cloud and begins to handle the townspeople's problems, teaching malicious types a lesson. She transforms acorns into gold pieces lickety-split, humans into rabbits, herself into a fly and back again into a human. She usually helps the underdogs and the less powerful, like a girl named Bernadette, whom Babcocha befriends. When Babcocha has the feeling that everything is fine and proper in the town, and its people on the whole are happy, she speeds off on her hail cloud – right out of the book. (Age: 6+)

Ania and Nina were the closest of friends. Until Nina kills herself. Ania is left behind, grieving. She wonders why Nina did it and reproaches her friend for not letting her in, for just leaving. She decides to investigate the reasons for Nina's death and enrols in the school of art that Nina visited. After she falls in love with a teacher who befriends her. she realizes that he is responsible for Nina's death. He and his friends drug girls and film them having sex. They sell the films on the Internet. Reading Joanna Jagiełło's award-winning young adult novel is excruciating. But worthwhile. Because she makes the whole grief and misery of a young woman palpable. Little hints are enough for this, for instance that Ania grows older (17 years and one day, 17 years and two weeks), while Nina will always stay 17. It also becomes crystal clear in Jagiełło's novel how easy it is to take advantage of the vulnerability of the protagonist. (Age: 16+)

Mr. Stag lives as a recluse in his apartment. The apartment is everything for him – and so it is not entirely clear whether the apartment belongs to him or if he belongs to the apartment. He uses his car to get the necessary things done »out there« in the city. When his neighbour nabs the last parking space one day, though, Mr. Stag must drive around a long time to find another spot. He is then forced to draw ever-widening circles around the centre of his life – his apartment – and becomes ever more distanced from himself. His car runs out of petrol at the forest's edge. He starts his search for a petrol station, but is instead attracted by the forest, which smells so familiar and cosy. With whimsy and empathy, author Roksana Jędrzejewska-Wróbel (b. 1969) succeeds yet again in fleshing out a neurotic character who manages to escape life's misery. Grażyna Rigall's (b.1970) illustrations marvellously make Mr. Stag's pitiable state apparent, as his existence unfolds in a knot of roads, high-rises, and giant parking lots. (Age: 4+)

Between her fifth and eleventh year, Rita Carelli lived with her parents, an anthropologist and a film-maker, and her brother with the Enawene Nawe people in the Brazilian state of Mato Grosso. She describes some of her recollections of that time in this children's book, marvellously illustrated by Argentinian artist Anabella López. Since the family is whole-heartedly taken in by the village community – the children even get a second set of parents – life runs differently than before, but it doesn't feel foreign. The clearly demarcated gender roles do, however, cause problems for the girl. Because she breaks from the life of the girls and women, she is soon declared a boy and permitted to swim in the river, for instance, and to play »head-football«. When she later falls in love with a boy, she freely »transforms« herself back into a girl. Accompanied by expressive, colourful pictures, Carelli portrays her experiences in a very lively way and with greatest respect for the culture of the Enawene-Nawe, a tribe of only a few hundred people. Poverty, ostracism, and violence define the life of 15-year-old Castanha, who hangs out at a market in the northern Brazilian metropolis of Belém, hoping to catch a break: something to eat, an adventure, or at least some attention. This fascinating graphic novel covers a single day in the young man's life. The plot is simple, the language raw. Worth noting is the overlap and contrast between realism and fantasy in the mostly small-format, dynamically drawn panels - for instance, in the use of a special colour scheme: when we are being shown the protagonist's hopes and dreams, bright, vivid colours are mixed into the dirty grey and brown tones of mundane life. Especially striking and disconcerting are the child and adolescent characters who are depicted as zoomorphic creatures - particularly Castanha, who is shown as menino-urubu (vulture-boy), i.e. as a human with a vulture's head. The clash of different worlds in the microcosm of the market also leaves a strong impression. (Age: 14+) Medeiros, Júlia (text) Carareto, Elisa (illus.)

This book is about a grandmother firmly involved in life and at the centre of a big family. Her granddaughter sums up the elderly lady in a few sentences, which suffice to draw a lively picture. The granddaughter's recollections bring to light grandma's somewhat creepy dentures, resting in a glass of water at night, gleaming like white English porcelain. And they capture grandmother's Sunday ritual: how she goes to market, buys a rooster, and, after visiting her son's grave, slaughters it without much ado, so she can cook a meal for her family that same afternoon. This picture book, the children's literature debut work of Júlia Medeiros and Elisa Carareto, offers a laconic, humorous, and memorable portrait that is touching yet not overly sentimental. The illustrations use a mixed technique of gouache, black-and-white photographs, and collaged paper scraps. They merge, as the text does, to create a mosaic of remembrances. (Age: 6+)



»Clarice« examines the time of military dictatorship in Brazil (1964-1985) through a girl's eyes. Clarice lives with her aunt after her parents have disappeared without a trace. Whether they were arrested or fled remains unclear. Persecution is real and always present in this country, where books and films are censored and life is marked by fear and caution, playing hide-and-seek with those in power who are called E.L.E.S. (T.H.E.Y.). The story consists exclusively of Clarice's immediate experiences and perceptions. Because the child doesn't understand many things, but only suspects, and because the secretive, fearful atmosphere that surrounds her leaves many things unspoken and unexplained, the 25 short chapters of impressions, experiences, and thoughts collectively form a picture riddled with gaps. The illustrations do not explain anything either but further emphasize the mysteriousness of this powerful book for inquisitive, attentive, and well-read youths. (Age: 14+)

Convinced that he caused the accidental death of his father, Tomás despairs and decides to leave his mother in order to protect her. His path leads him to the big city, 200 km away. A natural catastrophe is added to his personal catastrophe: A destructive hurricane and deluge-like rain passes through the country. People evacuate the flooded city. Tomás wanders around sad and aimless, until he meets a young rhinoceros, escaped from the destroyed zoo. Together, the two journey through the drenched countryside and, in the end, find their way back to Tomás's home. On the way, the boy and the animal slowly grow closer without the need for speech and develop a »pretty unlikely friendship«, as aptly stated on the book's cover. The novel perceptively recounts the boy's spiritual and intellectual development by switching between past and present and between first and third person narrative perspectives. Out of feelings of guilt and grief, strength and self-confidence gradually emerge. (Age: 9+)

Fábio Monteiro's story also can be read another way, though: not only as an alternative creation story, but as praise for the so frequently underappreciated manual professions. The poetic, inventive text is paired with bold and brightly coloured pictures by Mariana Rio, which capture the idea of the world as an eternal construction site in a charming way. (Age: 6+)



The narrator of this noteworthy first title in the new young adult section of publisher Bruaá is convinced that she lives in the »beige-iest city«, which outdoes all others in its ability to instil boredom. Looking back, the adolescent describes how her friendship with her best friend broke down. People say things like that happen. Sure, but does that mean one has to be ok with that? And isn't such a friendship worth fighting for? The novel perceptively captures what makes friendships what they are: it describes its challenges, its mechanisms and the resulting roles, as well as emotions like affection, jealousy, admiration, competition, and rage. The young woman, mired in fear and self-doubt, often addresses readers directly. At times with irony and a refreshingly dry sense of humour, she astutely reflects on herself and on adolescent life which, in her view, is a not all that thrilling and mostly overglorified time spent between school, bedroom, family, and clique. In this book, Braniste broaches a topic that is sadly relevant in many Eastern European countries, including Romania and Moldova: »Euro-orphans«. These are children who are left behind by their parents as these migrate to other EU countries for work and who as a result grow up in their grandparents' care. In a gentle yet trenchant way, Braniste and Neacsu tell the story of a little snail who lives in an apricot garden with his grandfather. For his birthday he wishes nothing more than to visit his mother who works on the other side of the street with the silkworms in the mulberry trees. Together with Grandpas' friend, an old centipede, they craft crazy plans to get the little snail safely across the street. (Age: 6+)

Basic mathematical understanding is very useful for reading the book, but splendid »Aha!« moments await even arithmetic novices. For instance, it's exciting to learn why and how people even started to count, that there are different ways to count, and that »zero« first had to be discovered. »Matematika« conveys philosophical and astronomical considerations and mathematical discoveries in Egypt, Greece, and China, up to maths' division into sub-fields (geometry, algebra, topology, etc.). Ptolemy, Euler, and Galileo are introduced, too, along with mathematical delights like the Fibonacci sequence or complex mathematical Millennium problems (such as the Poincaré conjecture). Enlightening illustrations accompany the text and whet one's appetite to spend more time with maths. (Age: 11+)

In this version by Igor Oleynikov, »Teremok« becomes a new story. With cryptic and wittily ironic illustrations, Oleynikov moves the goings-on to the here and now, giving them an air of social critique. The fairy-tale describes a clever mouse who builds a house out of junk at the edge of a metropolis, inviting a migrating lizard, a worker frog, an artist squirrel, a homeless scientist rabbit, a roaming fox, and a rowdy wolf to move in with her. Oleynikov's tale ends with a »Bear« company bulldozer destroying the dwelling. The newly homeless creatures set out for another place to call home. (Age: 5+)

Nonetheless, they return to the Pole with many wonderful vacation memories. With her illustrations, Katerina Gorelik infuses the plot with marvellous situational comedy. While the short text portrays the rather goofy and naive perspectives of the bears, who are loving their holiday, the garishly-coloured illustrations mock the goings-on: jam-packed beaches, tourist traps, and gluttonous bears who eat other guests' ice cream. What superb vacation impressions! In the meantime, a second picture book about the three blundering bears has been made, where their relatives Panda, Grizzly, and company visit them New Year's Eve. Here, too, fun and malicious glee ensue. (Age: 3+)

The short, sober text and black-and-white ink drawings tell children the story of a strong woman, whose »Chronicle« became one of the most important testimonies to the samizdat and the civil rights movement in the Soviet Union. A pet store, location undefined. Lisa the dog and Gordon the cat are sure of one thing: something terrible is happening outside. They're right: human beings vanish after a turbulent, undefined calamity. The animals are on their own. With plenty of suspense, this children's book conveys what dog, cat, snake, squirrel, parrot and company are most concerned with - survival - and how they gradually organize themselves into a makeshift community, overcoming their primal instincts. Initially, author and playwright Uglješa Šajtinac propels his beastly characters and their distinctive traits into conflict with each other. When they realize, though, that threats lurk just outside in the form of ranging, hungry animal gangs, the pet store animals regroup and form their own gang. The book was nominated for the Nin Award for »Best Novel« in Serbia in 2017. Uglješa Šajtinac was the 2014 award-winner of the European Union Prize for Literature. (Age: 10+)

With »Ja sam Akiko«, Stefan Tićmi (b. 1992) presents a narrative text that is highly poetic and whose words flow ever so smoothly. Akiko the protagonist repeatedly introduces herself, like a refrain, as if she were reassuring herself of her own existence: »I am Akiko«. She explains what makes her her (skin that smells like old paper), what she likes (her heart on four points - her bicycle) and what she doesn't like (certain words). Akiko talks with wet towels, which answer with their drops; with the Baobab tree; and with her father, who often sleeps poorly at night, has nightmares, and who loves his daughter very much. What exactly is occurring in Akiko's life and family remains unclear, but that isn't irritating at all. For the many little impressions coalesce to create a wonderfully impressionistic atmosphere, which mirrors back the whole warmth, beauty, and melancholy of Akiko's world - no matter what that world is like in reality. Ema and Max are the best of friends. They write a book together about how they see the world, since usually adults write about the world of children. But grown-ups don't quite get everything. The two protagonists take turns commenting on their own life and their friend's life. Max, for instance, reflects on what it's like for Ema to sometimes live with Mama and sometimes with Papa. This is because Ema's parents are divorced. Over the course of their charming narration, readers learn many things in passing about the protagonists' everyday lives, what moves them, and what they notice about the behaviour of adults. A big turning-point for the children and their friendship is the disappearance of Max's dog Gagarin, an event both children played a role in. Gagarin stays vanished until the end, though he is present throughout Daniela Olejníková's wonderful illustrations and accompanies Jana Śajgalíková's laconic tale about the growing-up of two children and their great friendship. The guardian of a lost dog asks, »Where are you?« and posts flyers of her pet around the city. Then she spots a street musician and gives him some food – an apple. This is seen by a man walking through the park. Readers follow him and see that he is collecting discarded cans. Over the course of her story in pictures, Marta Bartolj (b. 1979) links many more people and their small empathic gestures, revealing an everyday life in which people mindfully live together. The colour red is the binding element between the scenes. Red defines many reappearing pictorial elements throughout this chain story and entices readers to peruse the pictures again. Conceived to be the practical component of Bartolj's final project at the Academy of Fine Arts and Design in Ljubjlana, »Kje si?« received a Special Mention at the Kristina Brenkova Award for Slovenian picture book art in 2018. This book is like a diary with monthly entries that span a year. In it, two girls set down their observations of a third girl who is different from them. Not as pretty. Without a name (or at least the girls have forgotten it). Not a princess (like they are). Practically invisible, without a home of her own. In September the girl disappears, only a few drawings are left behind. When the two girls find the pictures, they realize that the girl was actually just like them and perhaps could have been their friend. Told entirely from the perspective of the two girls, the rhythmic text shows how easy it is to embrace prejudices and stereotypical views of strangers and to ostracize others. For this touching story, Peter Škerl (b. 1973) offers pictures in muted tones to portray the foreign girl and her family as newly arrived refugees. Text and image join together to form a strong statement against xenophobia and discrimination. (Age: 5+)

The two talk about life and existence and are surprised to learn of the idiosyncrasies of the other. When the phone's battery runs out, the stone sits beside his mute friend. Months later a boy discovers the telephone and uses it as an analog toy that he only puts away when he receives a functioning cell phone as a gift. In 2018, Andrej E. Skubic (b. 1967), an excellent author of literature for adults, successfully created his first children's book series about a clever trio of children. He here offers a children's book that invites readers to philosophize about the creation of the world and of time. (Age: 8+)

What's special about this book is that its text is hermetic and puzzling, but at the same time open and conducive to many interpretations. The firstperson narrator explains that for a time he lived inside a zebra, until the zebra asked whether the two of them ought not »move on«, at which point they flew away into the clouds. What this zebra is - an actual animal, or a space, a location, or a particular mental attitude, an emotion, a dream... - remains unclear. The answer is irrelevant, though. It is this very ambiguity that makes Micaela Chirif's text captivating: No explanation is given, no resolution is offered, which is why readers must define its meaning – or perhaps its lack thereof – for themselves. Renato Moriconi's pictures, black watercolour on white and orange backgrounds, offer no further guidance. Rather than explain the words, they instead offer an artful exercise in confusion of black-and-white stripes and alternating light and shadows that play on light and dark, on inside and outside. The fuzzy animal isn't flourishing, however, and is not nearly as happy as the delighted child. One day, the boy finds the hamster dead in its cage. The boy feels great pain and grief, yet these also make him reflect. In the end, the boy has his father dig two holes in the garden: a little one for his beloved hamster, a big one for the cage. Using careful, straightforward language and insightful, easily comprehensible pictures, this book reveals the dilemma at the heart of caring for animals. The child's changing emotional landscape – longing, joy, grief, and determination – are clearly brought to light, as are the topics of freedom and duty to others. (Age: 5+)

A »strange bird« hatches from an egg that fell from the nest. Who am I, and how will I fly?, he asks himself. Pigeons, an owl, an eagle, and even a butterfly bombard the novice with advice. Everyone has precise, yet divergent understandings of flying. This is how I'm supposed to fly?, the bird asks, full of doubt. In the end, he ignores all the tips and discovers his own way to fly. Laura Wittner tells this story with a succinct, witty, and wonderfully rhythmic text, which is perfectly suited to reading aloud. Marcos Farina's pictures are screen-prints done in a decorative, ornamental style, using three partially overlapping colours: bright red, mustard yellow, and blue-grey. The illustrator plays skilfully with geometric shapes, which he combines into animals and plants. The endpapers are also not to be overlooked! Rabbit, sheep, sloth, beetle, seagull, hippo, and whale describe the specifics of their respective excretions in an uninhibited, factual, and natural way. Sheep, we learn, pop out little cubes, while whales defecate red. And the dung beetle even feeds on the excrement of other animals. The final two pages briefly list additional information about each of the animals featured. Every animal gets two doublespreads and, charmingly, it is only after turning to the second page that we learn which animal is behind the poop just described. The cheerful, funny pictures contribute to the playful, relaxed character of this book. (Age: 3+)

The right side of the spread shows a picture of the person, lost against an empty, white background: While their head is drawn with pencil, their body is made up of tiny drawings and picture snippets. These are the objects and the memories that the people carry inside themselves and which combine together into one body and one life. Composed using a sparse text and an original graphical idea vividly depicting the topic, this book by Colombian illustrator Samuel Castaño creates a powerful impact. (Age: 9+)

He also has the feeling that he is carrying the wrong head on his neck and is actually supposed to have a very different one. With time he notices that everyone appears to be changing their heads. The child psychologist he visits also happens to be wearing a polar bear head, and his assistant that of a penguin. In the end, an eccentric »head merchant« secures the right mathematician's head for the child. In the meantime, another child is wearing the protagonist's former head and seems well pleased with it. I am many, and the possibilities to be something are infinite this is the quintessence of Luis Panini's story, whose off-kilter humour Chiara Carrer captures in her diversified and versatile illustrations. 

They concern gender roles, love, violence, dependence, lack of communication, and much more. Whether gentle, reflexive, explicit, or appellative, the texts are well-suited for reading on one's own or in conversational exchange with others. He needs only a few sentences to unfurl a big story from a small idea, drawing on refined, laconic humour and absurdist flair. The story revolves around 14-year-old Valeria, who encounters her doppelganger. Valentina looks exactly like her but is nevertheless totally different than she - Valeria's mirror image and nemesis rolled into one. This leads to confusion as well as enjoyment, as the two surreptitiously switch roles and try out unfamiliar identities. In the process, they continue to grow, as does the novel, which becomes more complex, multi-layered, and also more serious. It is no longer merely a game, as fundamentally important topics for adolescents are touched upon: identity, self-discovery, self-doubt, and self-determination. (Age: 12+)

Argentinian author Ruth Kaufman tracks these human-made onomatopoeic constructions and makes them into the protagonists for this book's 25 stories. So, for instance, there is the »bla bla w of empty chatter, the »plic plic w of rain drops, the »¡Pum!« of a door, and the »Ra-tata-tá!« of popcorn popping in a hot pot. All these sounds along with »Chap« and »Crac,« »Jo jo jo« and »Ju ju ju,« as well as the similar-sounding »Glu glu glu« (swallowing while drinking) and »Gluglú« (a turkey's gobble gobble) are listed and explained in a glossary at the end of the book. Ecuadorian illustrator Roger Ycaza freely plays off the amusing texts. His pictures, which mostly show animal characters in action, are funny, cheerful, vivacious, and lend the verses extra momentum. 

A close, intimate bond is formed between man and animal. Faoro's wife Ángela eventually enters the picture, and it is she who continues living with and caring for the threemeter-long reptile after Faoro's death. María Eugenia Manrique, who met the animal protagonist when she was a child, describes the female caiman lovingly and respectfully. As strange as it sounds, the animal was a kind of substitute child for Faoro and Ángela and a playmate to the neighbourhood children. This story about unconditional loyalty and the love of animals is illustrated by Ramón París on double-page spreads, which seems absolutely appropriate given the protagonist's physiognomy. The pictures, which hint at illustration styles of the 1950s and 1960s, possess great narrative quality and convey the cheerfulness and soft melancholy of the story very well. (Age: 4+)

She has a predilection for including little funny and surprising details, which could tell their own stories, and especially her characters are one-of-a-kind. They are unconventional, charming, and lovable, since they never fit into the widespread, classic category of cute. That's what makes them so special. (Age: 4+)







To craft Shakespeare's monumental play »Hamlet« into a picture book for the very young is quite a feat! Told using language that is elliptical, very rhythmic, and laconic in its simplicity, this retelling brings out the play's essential dramaturgical and plot elements: Love, intrigue, betrayal, doubt, grief, insanity, death. It all ends with: »Nu alla döda. Gonatt, gonatt!» (Everyone dead. Goonight, Goonight!). The colour palette is muted, the moon shines ominously. Anna Höglund portrays Hamlet with bunny ears, Ophelia as a fox, Hamlet's uncle and step-father Claudius as a rat. The animal characters that she frequently works with have an alienating effect. Höglund plays with familiar connotations, anticipated by the animal characters but also subverted by them. The book does not avoid the cruelty nor the great tragedy of the Shakespearean piece; as a result, it reveals the play's anthropological constants. This can be unsettling, but also creates the potential for insight. (Age: 4+)

There's also a yellow air mattress – for Laila: »You receive an air mattress, a sea, a path«. In this book two perspectives intertwine in a suspenseful way. While the pictures illustrate Laila and her point of view, the text is spoken by an invisible narrator who wants Laila to come home. The words are like a bridge, and so readers follow Laila on her way through (her imaginary) deserts, forests, mountains, and seas. She always looks optimistic. She is fearless. (Age: 4+)

An experimental class based on »thought« further fires up their debates as they consider concepts such as knowledge and relativity. The critical thinking and logic they are introduced to lead to lively exchanges that support developing a deeper understanding of themselves and their peers. Questions at the end of every chapter of this book inspire mindful thinking as they invite children to deliberate on words and their diverse uses. The success of these exchanges leads to a group of students being selected for a wordplay tournament, competing with groups from three other schools. This reading encourages a closer look at the inherent polysemy of language used every day and how it may be a vehicle for ludic language use. (Age: 8+)

Soothing pastel colours, mainly blue, green, and yellow, paint the child's poetic daydreams of a future of harmonious play with his sister after she has grown a little. They climb a tree, play with bubbles, and dream up fantasy worlds where they can fly. Üçbaşaran's use of vast blank spaces in each of the compositions builds a complementary bond between the images and the story, which hint at the boy's as yet unrealized future expectations that his sister's arrival will fulfil. The universally understood message in this work is the peaceful enrichment a sibling can bring to a child's life. (Age: 3+)



Oksana Bula links her picture book stories together using animal protagonists, who communicate with each other. Miu the kitten experiences the New Year's festival Tết, the most important Vietnamese holiday, for the first time. In his new home, his task is to get rid of a plague of mice, but the marauding mice and the smelly sewer rat only taunt him. It isn't until after he proves his bravery when fighting an evil cobra, that he dares to enter the battle. Assisted by Auntie Corn Broom and Uncle Copper Pot, Miu defeats the huge rat. Thus, he earns his place in the family and is allowed to join in their visit to the family grave on New Year's morning. This story, a lesson in courage and solidarity, has also been interpreted as a metaphor for the struggle of the three Indo-Chinese countries against their colonial masters and invadors during the Vietnam War. Nguyễn Đình Thi (1924-2003), one of the most well-known Vietnamese authors, literary critics, and composers, wrote his only children's book in 1961 as a present for his own children. For the 60th anniversary of the publishing house Kim Đồng, Thùy Dung created new illustrations for this story. (Age: 8+)

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
