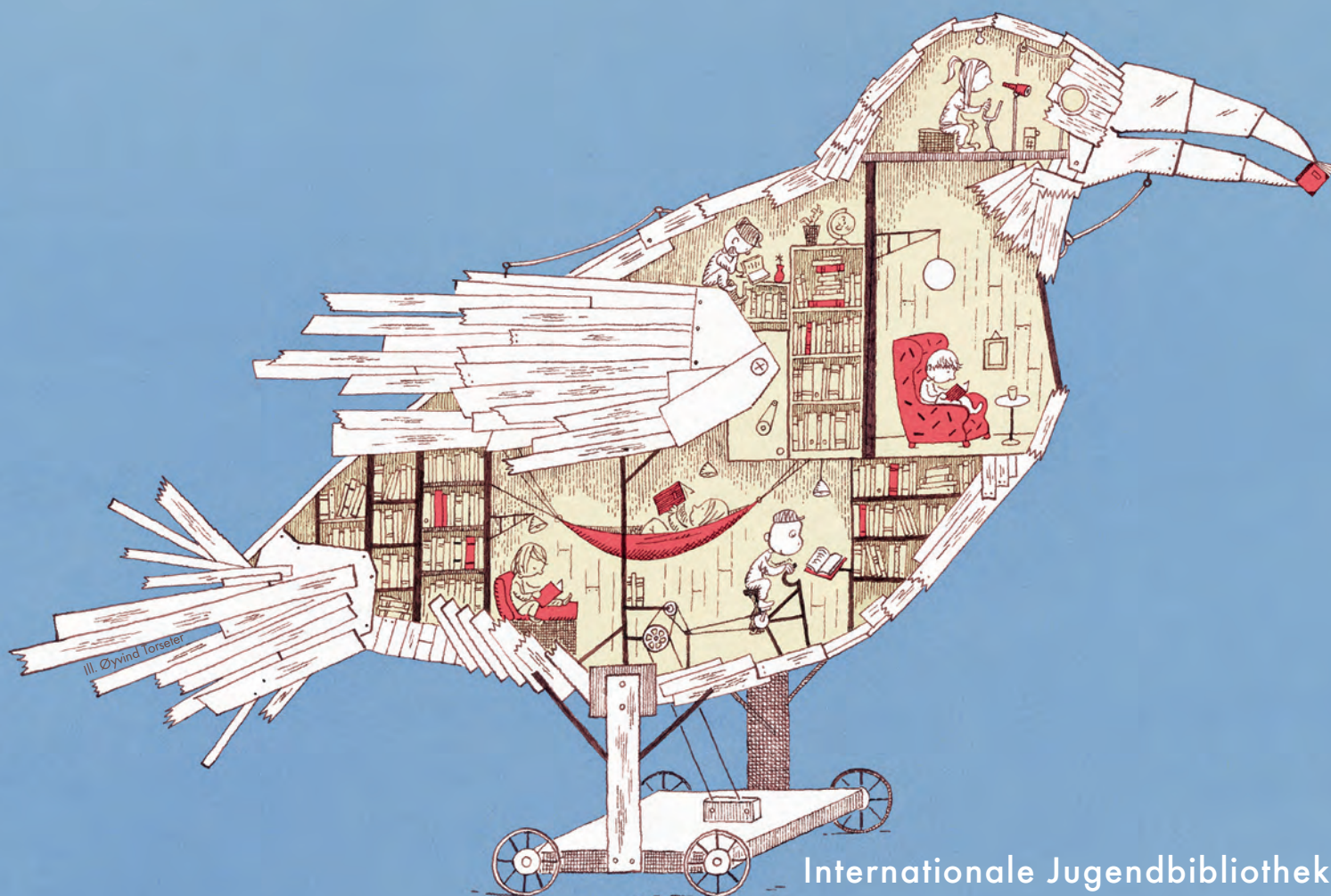

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PREFACE

It is with great pleasure that we present the 2025 edition of our annual recommendation list »The White Ravens«.

This year our cover features a large white raven constructed from rough slats of wood. Its interior is a most welcoming paradise for children – a dreamlike place that exudes the magic and intimacy of reading. This raven recalls the technically sophisticated, mechanical automatons that have amazed people for centuries. Or is it a Trojan Raven slyly smuggling books into the land of non-readers? The image was created by Norwegian illustrator Øyvind Torseter. His books »Dronefangeren« (The Drone Catcher) (Cappelen Damm, 2023) and »Til slutt blir alle hester. Dikt for barn« (In the End, They All Turn into Horses. Poems for Children) (text by Gaute Heivoll; Vigmostad & Bjørke, 2023) were included in the »The White Ravens 2024« catalogue.

We are delighted and grateful that publishers, institutions, and organisations, as well as authors and illustrators, continue to support the International Youth Library with donation and review copies of their new publications. It is only thanks to their support that we

are able to present the »The White Ravens« catalogue, the most important annual publication of the International Youth Library. It aims to promote quality in children's book publishing and has become an increasingly useful tool for anyone interested in looking beyond national borders. »The White Ravens 2025« contains a selection of 215 notable children's and young adult books published in 49 languages and from 63 countries.

The books in this unique selection cover a wide range of voices. Its international character is the result of the efforts of some twenty children's and young adult book experts. The library's in-house staff members in Munich cover many literary regions, and freelance readers and advisors monitor and consult on other languages and countries. They all have the task of sifting through the thousands of books that are donated to the International Youth Library each year and highlighting and reviewing new publications that catch their attention and strike them as being noteworthy. Some of these works are then selected for this list on the basis of the universal relevance of the themes they address, their literary and visual qualities, or their innovative approach or design.

Our library team have long relied on a variety of means to gain a sound overview of the issues, trends, and people involved in current international children's and young adult literature: As well as reading new publications in the original languages, they attend international book fairs, scout and gather information, and keep in touch with publishers, institutions, organisations, and other experts. They also engage in discussions with the research fellows of the International Youth Library, foreign scholars who have a profound knowledge of the literature of their home countries.

As usual, the »White Ravens« are announced and published online a few days before the Frankfurt Book Fair, where the IYL team will present some of the books from the catalogue to the fair's visitors. This podium event has been a fixture in the Book Fair calendar for several years.

The reviews, bibliographical data, and book covers are also available in the White Ravens database on whiteravens.iyb.de/list. We will also be showcasing each of the 215 books on our Instagram account [@thewhiteravens.books](https://www.instagram.com/thewhiteravens.books) throughout the coming year.

For decades, all the recommended books have been displayed in print at the International Youth Library's booth at the Bologna Children's Book Fair. This tradition allows visitors to the booth to peruse the books at their leisure, leafing through their pages and exploring the stories and illustrations. We look forward to having this opportunity again and hope to see you in Bologna in 2026.

Once again, my sincere thanks go first and foremost to the countless publishers who have been supporting the work of the International Youth Library for decades with their book donations. I would also like to thank all those who have contributed to this catalogue both abroad and in Munich.

I hope that »The White Ravens 2025« will fall into the hands of many curious readers, and that they will enjoy making new discoveries. May the selected books and their creators receive the international attention they deserve. We hope that our work will contribute to this goal.

This lyrical picture book by Palestinian author Ibtisam Barakat opens a magical portal into Jerusalem. The story begins when children discover a hidden gate within the iconic painting »Jamal al-Mahamil« (Camel of Burdens) by Palestinian artist Suleiman Mansour. Stepping through this gate, they enter an imagined Jerusalem woven from the city's most familiar artistic and cultural symbols. Here, stone alleys breathe, gates tell stories, and landscapes transform into dreamscapes of memory and hope. With Charlotte Shama's evocative illustrations, the book becomes both a journey through art and an adventure of discovery, linking Palestinian visual heritage with children's imagination. »Bawwābat al-Quds al-ḥafīya« celebrates how art, memory, and storytelling allow young readers to reclaim and reimagine their city beyond boundaries, turning cultural icons into living spaces filled with wonder and belonging. Zahra is a young donkey who lives with her companion Sami in Gaza City. Their days are filled with simple yet meaningful routines: carrying baskets of vegetables from the market, delivering falafel sandwiches to schoolchildren, or transporting flowers and strawberries from the fields. Through Zahra's voice, readers experience the innocence of ordinary life, rich with joy and connection. When war reaches the city, everything changes. The same familiar tasks take on a new weight: flour, water, and even wounded people replace fruits and flowers. Without sensationalizing, this story captures how war transforms daily routines and community rhythms. Hooda Al Shawa's delicate narrative, paired with Sienny Septibella's evocative illustrations, addresses the consequences of war for everyday existence with sensitivity and care. Rather than focusing on violence, the book highlights resilience, companionship, and the quiet endurance of ordinary beings who hope that one day life will be filled with strawberries and flowers again. Nudity in art – is that okay? Or should Michelangelo's David and similar works have some underwear slipped over their private parts, as an outraged Queen Victoria demands on the cover of this small, entertaining non-fiction book? With much humour, the book introduces a central debate in art and art history, allowing artists like Auguste Rodin and Egon Schiele to share their views both on artistic freedom, censorship, and whether nudity in paintings and sculptures is offensive or necessary. Siding with the »underwear« faction, Queen Victoria guides readers through this thought experiment. The pros and cons are presented by Zornica Khristova in engaging, amusing dialogues, without being too theoretical. Thanks to Siyana Zakhariyeva's witty illustrations, the book makes for light, easy reading. The bustling Kazanlak Art Gallery also played an important role in publishing »Put pants on these works of art!«. (Age: 7+) [KW]

The children's poems by Zoya Vasileva (1952-2021) beautifully demonstrate how children perceive the world, their environment, and everyday life with completely different eyes and priorities than adults – especially parents. At times poetic in their perception of nature (rain! snow! water!), and at other times gleeful with the unbeatable logic of a child. For example, when a mother reminds her playing child that there are many tasks waiting to be done, the child responds that these can also be done tomorrow – because after all, they could wait patiently. Mila Yaneva-Tabakova perfectly captures the atmosphere of the poems in well-orchestrated colour illustrations in orange, turquoise, yellow, and blue. Like Vasileva, she has an unpretentious, fresh perspective. Both recognize what is special and important to children in the little tableaux of their everyday life – in their room, on the playground, in the rain. (Age: 5+) [KW]

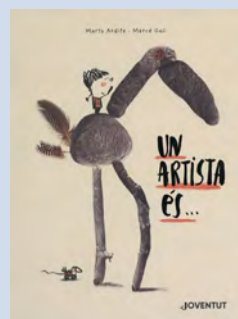

Laia de Ahumada conducted conversations with six migrant women and men, aged between 25 and 45, and then edited the material for this book. With authentic, individual voices, these six people describe why they left their homeland, their often long and arduous journeys, and the challenges encountered in Spain, where they live today. Their individual stories stand for the large number of migrants worldwide, who are often perceived as an anonymous mass. Because the book does not reduce them to this one part of their biographies – each of them had a life before – readers can draw connections to themselves: they are more like us than we may think. The book conveys these experiences in a comprehensible and vivid way, prompts reflection, and awakens empathy. The graphic design is also compelling. The thoughtful and aesthetically appealing black-and-white illustrations and maps by Cinta Fosch, complemented by a different colour for each individual, are memorable and to the point. Pau wants to become an artist. »What is an artist?« asks his little sister Greta. Pau lists several things to explain what he thinks makes someone an artist: being curious, being attentive, closely observing one's surroundings and collecting all sorts of impressions; being brave and trying new things; using one's imagination to conjure things; and, last but not least, telling and expressing things in one's individual and unique way, allowing oneself the freedom not to follow well-trodden paths or those already known. Mercè Galí contributes an exceptionally creative rendering of the text by art historian Marta Ardite. She translates the short, incisive sentences into images through a free, playful, and associative way, at times abstract, at other times figurative, using pen and brush, scissors, or camera. The illustrations are surprising and witty and provide original answers to a child's question. They themselves are a prime example of what it means to be an artist. (Age: 5+) [JW]

With »Helena« Jesús Mollà has produced a compelling novel that will not leave readers unmoved. From the outside, the life of Helena, the teenage protagonist, seems unremarkable and alright. She earns good marks at school, has friends and in general a stable environment. Although there are no visible problems or conflicts, an oppressive reality lurks beneath the surface. At home, Helena is being harassed by her older brother. But there she is given no support because her mother plays down the situation and refuses to take action. Mollà tells the story in direct, clear language that neither sugarcoats things nor shies away from portraying difficult scenes. At times this is painful reading, but precisely because of its unflinching honesty the novel awakens empathy and makes a young person's fear, despair, and anger understandable and relatable. This powerful, raw story of family violence, silence, and repression lingers long in the mind. (Age: 13+) [JW]

As the title says: this is a story that has no ending. Like a yarn being spun, it winds on and on, before finally and unexpectedly looping back to the beginning, where it spins anew. There is something tragic about this – if only it weren't so funny. Sebastià Serra tells the story of a witch who is asked to brew a remedy for the princess's headaches. This would be a routine matter, were it not for that green drop from her congested nose that falls into the cauldron. The potion causes the princess's hair to grow ever longer, denser, and wilder. A gigantic hairy forest emerges, in which birds build nests, animals hide in the undergrowth, and whole villages arise, even a kingdom with a king, a queen, and a witch who is expected to cure the princess's headaches... This endlessly spinning fairy tale, which also deals with power and greed, is superbly illustrated. Sebastià Serra's enchanting pictures are brimming with ideas and details and are as opulent as the untamed and ever-expanding forest. (Age: 4+) [JW]

»Dali Libreria« commemorates the 100th anniversary of the »Manifeste du Surréalisme« (1924) and Salvador Dalí as a representative artist of surrealism. At a time marked by the decline of bookstores, store owner Babou acquires the magical power to penetrate the subconscious of his customers and help save his struggling business. The hyper-rational loner finds meaning in life and a way to keep his store by exploring his own subconscious in a surrealist world inspired by Dalí's art. The graphic novel interweaves extensive allusions to Dalí's work and biography, and references psychoanalytic and surrealist theory with memories of Hong Kong's former cityscape and its disappearing bookstores. Pen So masterfully designs his black-and-white worlds using light and shadow as well as changing perspectives to achieve breathtaking three-dimensional effects with a cinematic flair. Like all of his previous works, »Dali Libreria« received several international awards shortly after its publication. (Age: 14+) [LO]

This novel is set in the 22nd century, where time travel has become a reality. Middle school student Xie Baosheng joins a study trip going through a wormhole to the Mesozoic Era to observe dinosaurs. What was supposed to be a routine excursion takes a drastic turn due to quantum effects. The team arrives just as an asteroid strikes Earth. Amid life-and-death chaos, the characters are forced to use their survival instincts, intervening in a timeline that was never meant to be theirs. Ultimately, the child narrator, who in youthful defiance mocks nearly everything, selflessly makes the choice to save others rather than abandon them. Blending science fiction with fantasy, the novel weaves past and future, forming a fascinating Möbius loop of time and space. Pioneering science-fiction writer Bao Shu, known for »Shi jian zhi xu« (The wasteland of time) and »Gu lao de di qiu zhi ge« (The ancient song of the earth), has won the Nebula Award, the Galaxy Award and was shortlisted for the 2024 Hugo Award for Best Short Story. Humans cannot do without the sun, the clouds, the wind, the rain. Nor without a book, a smile, a dream, a hug, a mirror. This picture book is about everything humans need and should treasure. Its prose unfolds like an exquisite poem, revealing a world both simple and multi-layered. The text, rich in realistic and metaphorical implications, harmonizes perfectly with the illustrations' modern creative interpretation of traditional Chinese paintings. Readers can also use the blank space at the end to draw what they consider indispensable in their own lives. Cai Gao is best known for her creative adaptations of Chinese folklore in her picture books, including »Bao er«, »Tao hua yuan de gu shi« (The story of Peach Blossom Spring), and »Bai niao yu yi« (A feather robe from hundreds of birds). She is the first Chinese illustrator to win the BIB Golden Apple and has been shortlisted for the Hans Christian Andersen Award. In 2022, she won the Special Contribution Prize of the Chen Bochui International Children's Literature Award. (Age: 3+) [FW, ZX]

This novel captures a Chinese childhood from over half a century ago, witnessing how a boy grows almost imperceptibly by holding on to what he loves. Liu Lixian loves scribbling on walls, paper, classroom blackboard newspapers, and his passion for painting scenes from everyday life blossoms from crude sketches to skillful artistry. Woven into Liu's artistic journey are his school experiences, friendships, and youthful romance. Life appears simple, children grow like sunlit wheat shoots – absorbing every bit of the world around them. Rooted in his own childhood memories, Liu Haiqi's vivid narrative feels authentic. His concise language and signature colloquial style bubble with light-hearted humour, subtle warmth, and wit. Liu is the author of »You ge zi de xia tian« (The summer of pigeons), »Wu wei xiao shu li xian ji« (Adventures of a tailless mouse) and »You yong« (Swimming). He has won several awards, including the National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature (Quan guo you xiu er tong wen xue jiang). (Age: 10+) [FW, ZX]

In this book from the author's »Fairy tales of everything« series, the world is like a boundless garden, where beauty waits around every corner. With the crystal-clear gaze of a child, the writer beholds and re-imagines this world, painting it in strokes of poetry. Each story is touched by childhood's whimsical magic: a boy swimming through the sky like a frog in a pond; the wind's invisible footsteps tracing intricate patterns along the water's edge; the cosmos flower raising its fragrant chalice to toast sun and moon; a book reading aloud to another. Blending the wonder of fairy tales and the lyricism of poetry, the writer's pen scratches the surface of things only to plumb their hidden depths. The naive illustrations and the text complement each other in delightful harmony. Xiao Dingli is best known for her fairy tales and novels for children, such as »Xiao dou zi xi lie« (The little bean's stories series), »Wan wu de yao shi« (Keys for everything), and »Xiao shi zi Mao Erdong« (The little lion Mao Erdong). As a member of a renowned horse-judging family, the narrator's brother has to select a racehorse for the richest family in the area and returns from the horse market with Hailong, an unremarkable, scarred little wild horse. No one believes it can become a good racehorse – until the brother rides it to a stunning victory at the Nadam Fair, only to release it back into the wild. »Some horses belong to the pastures, some to the racetrack. But Hailong belongs to the vast sky and earth, to the mountains and rivers, to no one.« The suspense and plot twists are captivating, while the friendship between the boy and the horse is deeply moving. The illustrations show the vastness of the grasslands and the vibrant spirit of their inhabitants. Zhu Xiqin is the author of »Xiao xun ma shi Baatar« (The little horse trainer Baatar) and »Guo bao te gong« (Special agents of national treasures). Yu Hongyan is the illustrator of »Yi li zhong zi gai bian shi jie« (A seed changes the world) and »Ma tou qin de chuan shuo« (The legend of Morin Khuur). (Age: 5+) [FW, ZX]

Granny detests cats, but the neighborhood's strays persistently sneak into her house, settle down, and gradually take over her everyday tasks when she begins to lose her memory. After she forgets that she hates cats, they take complete control and, in true feline fashion, give her a sense of security and happiness. At the end, readers learn that Granny's late husband, who died in a car accident while feeding stray cats, had repeatedly begged them to take care of his demented wife. Large-format paintings in rich colours alternating with delicately drawn comic panels add further narrative layers to the story. While children will enjoy discovering hidden objects and camouflaged cats, adults will delight in the nostalgic views of traditional Japanese-style houses and Taiwanese tin roofs of bygone times. Yen's and Hsueh's first collaboration, »Meng you« (Sleepwalking), was selected for the 2021 Bologna Illustrators Exhibition. »Mao fang zi« has received several awards and is shortlisted for the Golden Tripod Award and the Feng Zikai Award. An impressive picture book for teenagers, this book has universal appeal. It tells the story of all those who find it hard to live with themselves, even while knowing they can't escape who they are, nor would they truly want to. The first-person narrator struggles with herself, her family, and her own life. Wherever she happens to be, she feels out of place and isolated. Inside herself, she senses turmoil and anger. Everyone wants something from her, but simultaneously she feels as if no one cares about her at all. At some point – during a walk and a silent tête-à-tête – she looks at her reflection in a puddle and feels the lump in her throat dissolve. Iva Bezinoić-Haydon's elliptical, contemplative impressions and dynamic sequence of images wonderfully capture that inner tug-of-war and conflict. Hana Tintor's illustrations, which use only a few lines and use colour (red, blue) only in select spots, vividly symbolise the protagonist's mood swings. (Age: 12+) [KW]

How astonishing the absurd and the inexplicable can be is brilliantly demonstrated by Vendi Vernić's large-format picture book. One day, Saturn breaks into a swimming pool named »Future«. The planet swims in the basin and refuses to be removed from the premises, not even by the military or through the construction of a drain. On the contrary, it continues to grow and expand. This disrupts the activities of the pool's regular visitors. Then, one day, Saturn simply disappears. In her picture book Vernić offers a poetic study of human life, illustrating how people react to and cope with unexpected, incomprehensible, and overwhelming events, and with change itself. Vernić creates a contrast between the calmness and the power of the static scene of a large planetary sphere in the pool and the small, scribbled figures. The figures are at the mercy of this event, forced to adapt without understanding what is happening or receiving any logical explanation. (Age: 4+) [KW]

Cycling is fantastic! After reading »Kolo«, you'll have no doubt about it. The passionate cyclist and author Ondřej Buddeus has bundled up all his knowledge and passion for the »dandy horse« in this book, and together with illustrator Jindřich Janíček, he has written an information-packed declaration of love for the bicycle. This non-fiction book for children offers not only the history of its development and many facts in beautifully illustrated and digestible portions, but also celebrates the diversity of the bicycle and its capacity for empowerment. After all, it gives children their first sense of freedom and independence. The bicycle thus becomes a symbol of equality and is the vehicle that lets people nearly fly using their own energy. »Kolo« was first published in German translation and nominated for the 2025 German Children's Literature Award. The Czech edition won the 2025 Golden Ribbon children's book award in the non-fiction category. (Age: 10+) [KW]

The emotional thoughts relate the fear, grief, and loss of identity that the son suffers, as well as the sadness, guilt, and feeling of powerlessness that weigh on the father's mind. His repeated »They said it will be better this way« is clearly a desperate attempt to convince himself everything will be all right. South Korean artist Simji Park translates the two protagonists' silent pleas, suffering, but also hope into atmospheric full-page pictures in soft hues, drawn in coloured pencil and watercolours. Magnolia eventually gets her comeuppance in this wry tale about sustainability, labour rights, capitalism, and kindness. When she visited the Parisian catacombs with her family, the underground tunnels immediately fascinated her – so much so that she decided to write a gothic adventure story for young readers partly set in the city's sewers in the 1890s. The book tells the fast-paced tale of Zélie, a French-Indian girl working in a rich French household, and her new acquaintance Jules, hard-working sewer boy. The two set off on a quest for the missing Snakestone, a mysterious jewel with dark powers, but are pursued by the evil leader of a secret society of sinister scientists. The colourful crew of characters, the spooky locations, and the dab of ancient magic make for a riveting read that also tackles a range of thought-provoking topics, including social justice, gender roles, and the importance of family. However, the traumas they experienced in the past make them extremely vulnerable and insecure. Then, a conversation about spiders casually introduces the ideal hand position. Evangéline Durand-Allizé's airy, predominantly black-and-white illustrations initially focus on the two protagonists. Each of their voices is given a colour, keeping them identifiable even when the images take us on a stroll around the neighbourhood, discovering animals in the city and viewing the quarter from over the rooftops. This excursion underscores the immense freedom conveyed in »Leçons de piano«. Cléo always meets Léon on equal terms. 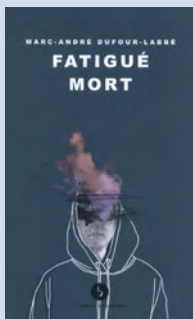

In collages, Katy Lemay unites a variety of techniques, including different types of pens and colours, painted, printed, and cut-out paper, as well as historical illustrations and photographs. With large, colourful elements and sketchy black-and-white drawings, she connects the double pages into a multi-layered and balanced whole. These can produce very different effects—such as through the use of lead pencils, coloured pencils, gel pens, watercolours or felt-tip pens. Images can also be created through collage or even embroidery; inspiration can be found in old photographs discovered at flea markets. As the artist puts it: »It is as if you're learning to write in different languages—but your hands already know so much and have so much to say.« This little book is sure to inspire young readers to try out new and creative drawing techniques of their own. Horikawa interviewed each person for many hours. Due to their now vague and changing memories, she modified her paintings again and again. The book tells, for example, about an eight-year-old boy who tried to get the chairs of his school back from the Soviet occupation army in Manchuria. There is also a fourteen-year-old tram conductor who found reassurance when she reached the evacuation site and could play, only a few hours after the atomic bomb fell on Hiroshima. Each episode conveys everyday civilian life and the immense losses involved. A chronology offers further information about how Japan's policies of colonialism led to the Pacific War. (Age: 7+) [RN]

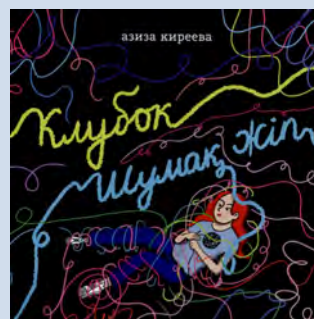

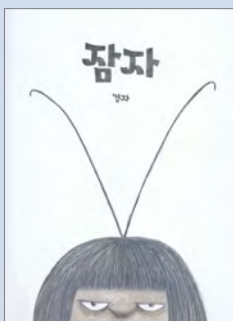

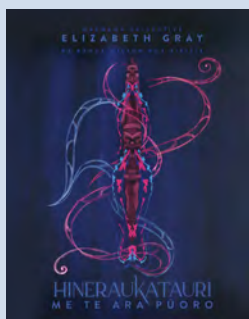

Together with her cat, she explores the small jungle in the backyard of her grandparents' house. Their undertaking is observed by a squirrel that is hidden in each double-page scene, waiting to be discovered by the readers. The little explorers watch the red-winged nuts of the Meranti tree being dispersed by the wind; they gaze in fascination at the seed pods of the Acacia tree, nibble on the purple berries of the Rose Myrtle and taste the fuzzy fruit of the Wild Passionflower before returning home. A glossary shows botanical illustrations of the species mentioned. Emila Yusof, an award-winning visual artist, illustrator, and author of numerous picture books, is known for her delicate watercolours and black-and-white line drawings with only minimal addition of colour. Marta Azcona has chosen a form that is unusual for a children's book: a tale told in rhymed verses reminiscent of traditional balladeers. The chapter headings and the tongue-in-cheek moral maxims at the end of each chapter reinforce this ballad-like tone. The story itself is wonderfully turbulent. One day, a librarian is plagued by a headache and delegates the library oversight to a pig. But the pig is hopelessly overwhelmed when a gang of animal morons – from A for asno (donkey) to Z for zorro (fox) – descends upon the orderly realm of books and reduces it to anarchy and chaos. »Little Red Riding Hood« is gnawed on by snails, »Cinderella« is nibbled at by goats, and »Alice« must serve as wrapping paper for potato salad. In the end, a penguin is able to restore order. In this way, the hilarious tale is a not entirely serious guide to proper behaviour in a library. Anna Font's illustrations briskly echo the absurdity of the encounters and amplify the humour in the text. (Age: 7+) [JW]
