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PREFACE

It is with great pleasure that we present the 2026 edition of our recommendation list »The White Ravens«.

This year's cover illustration was created by the Croatian artist Vendi Vernić. According to her own description of her work, the picture features an imaginary library. It is an inviting, colourful space where people come together, read, relax or play. White Ravens fly in from many directions bringing books that connect readers, spark conversation and foster mutual understanding.

We are delighted and grateful that publishers, institutions, and organisations, as well as authors and illustrators, continue to support the International Youth Library with donation and review copies of their new publications. It is only thanks to their support that we are able to present the »White Ravens« catalogue, the most important annual publication of the International Youth Library. It aims to promote quality in children's book publishing and has become an increasingly useful tool for anyone interested in looking beyond national borders. »The White Ravens 2026« contains a selection of 216 notable children's and young adult books published in 46 languages and from 62 countries and territories.

The books in this unique selection cover a wide range of voices. Its international character is the result of the efforts of some twenty children's and young adult book experts. The library's in-house staff members in Munich cover many literary regions, and freelance readers and advisors monitor and consult on other languages and countries. They all have the task of sifting through the thousands of books that are donated to the International Youth Library each year and highlighting and reviewing new publications that catch their attention and strike them as being noteworthy. Some of these works are then selected for this list on the basis of the universal relevance of the themes they address, their literary and visual qualities, or their innovative approach or design.

Our library team have long relied on a variety of means to gain a sound overview of the issues, trends, and people involved in current international children's and young adult literature: As well as reading new publications in the original languages, they attend international book fairs, scout and gather information, and keep in touch with publishers, institutions, organisations, and other experts. They also engage in discussions with the research fellows of the International Youth Library,

foreign scholars who have a profound knowledge of the literature of their home countries.

As usual, the »White Ravens« are announced and published just in time for the Frankfurt Book Fair, where our team will present some of the books from the catalogue to the fair's visitors. This podium event has been a fixture in the Book Fair calendar for several years.

The reviews, bibliographical data, and book covers are also available in the White Ravens database on whiteravens.ijb.de/list. We will also be showcasing each of the 216 books on our Instagram account [@thewhiteravens.books](https://www.instagram.com/thewhiteravens.books) throughout the coming year.

For decades, all the recommended books have been displayed in print at the International Youth Library's booth at the Bologna Children's Book Fair. This tradition allows visitors to the booth to peruse the books at their leisure, leafing through their pages and exploring the stories and illustrations. We look forward to having this opportunity again and hope to see you in Bologna in 2027.

Once again, my sincere thanks go first and foremost to the countless publishers who have been supporting the work of the International Youth Library for decades with their book donations. I would also like to thank all those who have contributed to this catalogue both abroad and in Munich.

I hope that »The White Ravens 2026« will fall into the hands of many curious readers, and that they will enjoy making new discoveries. May the selected books and their creators receive the international attention they deserve. We hope that our work will contribute to this goal.

A Palestinian child remembers home through the small things that once made it his: a blue bed, a favourite toy, a kite, sandcastles by the sea, jasmine, palm trees, and the shadow that accompanied him to school. War violently interrupts this intimate landscape, but the lyrical text gradually transforms loss into renewal: the child's tears water the jasmine, the sun offers light, and the earth embraces it as a root from which oranges and olives can grow. Baraa Awoor's striking, vibrant illustrations move freely between realism and surrealism, allowing the child's expansive imagination to materialize on the page. In this visual world, fantasy and play become ways of confronting trauma and making sense of life during war. They also acquire political meaning, enabling the child to imagine beyond destruction and displacement. Poetic and visually inventive, this book turns memory, imagination, and play into expressions of attachment, resilience, and hope. (Age: 5+) [LW]

What would happen if a child became king of the world? The young ruler immediately begins issuing laws that reorganize everyday life according to children's wishes: school lasts only half an hour, swimming pools stay open in winter, and familiar adult rules are cheerfully overturned. Each new decree pushes the fantasy of changing the rules a little further, transforming ordinary frustrations into an increasingly playful alternative world. Maria Dadoush uses the language of laws and authority to capture a distinctly childlike desire to renegotiate the rules imposed by adults. Dima Alaa Elham al-Barghouti's inventive illustrations make this reversal especially funny: handwritten lines, exaggerated figures, signs, objects, and typography turn every law into a visual joke. The text itself bends and travels across the page, making reading part of the game. Light-hearted and mischievous, this picture book gives children the pleasure of imagining what the world might look like if, for once, they were the ones making the rules. (Age: 5+) [LW]

When a Palestinian family must suddenly leave their home in a city surrounded by soldiers, each person is told to take something loved, important, necessary, and light. The father chooses the children's birth certificates, the family packs passports and bags, and the children search among toys, plants, photographs, and familiar objects. Outside, neighbours are making the same painful choices. At the heart of Ahlam Bsharat's story is a deceptively simple question: what is truly essential when you are forced to leave home? Haya Halaw's delicate illustrations linger on domestic details, gradually allowing war to enter their warm visual world through smoke, ruins, aircraft, and emptied spaces. The recurring »meow meow« of Mansour, the family cat, gives the story tenderness and rhythm. Dedicated to the children of Gaza displaced with their pets, the book approaches forced displacement through attachment rather than spectacle. Home becomes the people, animals, memories, and relationships one refuses to leave behind. (Age: 6+) [LW]

Drawing on the ghoule, a demon-like creature of Arab and Palestinian folk culture, this story transforms a familiar figure of fear into the heroine of an unusual family tale. Mother Ghoul lives peacefully with her daughters and sons until a violent ghoule steals her three magical hairs and with them her strength and memory. It reshapes family life through fear: the daughters are chained inside the home, the sons learn to imitate the ghoule's authority, and the family eventually forgets how differently they once lived. Yet the youngest children, Shams and Qamar – Sun and Moon – recover fragments of the past and bring the family to resist. Iranian illustrator Amin Hassanzadeh Sharif creates a striking visual world in which Arab and Persian traditions meet, giving this Palestinian folk tale a distinctive cross-cultural language. Its idea that heroism belongs to the family collectively is especially compelling: liberation begins when its members remember one another, break the chains together, and help Mother Ghoul recover her strength. What does love look like to a very young child? This tender picture book begins with affectionate pairs from the animal world: birds, fish, and other creatures come together, care for one another, and create warm homes and families. Gradually, the book moves from these playful examples toward the relationship closest to the child: mother and father. With very simple language and gentle illustrations, »Abi yuhibbu Ummi« introduces love through gestures that even the youngest readers can recognize: closeness, affection, care, and the joy of being together. Particularly charming is its focus on the loving relationship between the parents themselves, presenting the family not simply as a group of individuals but as something built through affection between partners. Simple, warm, and perfectly suited to shared reading, the book gives toddlers an accessible first vocabulary for love, partnership, and family. (Age: 2+) [LW]

An emperor has everything money can buy: lavish food, magnificent clothes, music, entertainment, and treasures from across the world. Yet he remains unhappy. When he demands »the most precious thing in the world«, a mysterious merchant offers him happiness – but every precious thing has its price. The emperor begins a series of exchanges involving happiness, youth, friendship, and contentment, only to gradually discover that value cannot be separated from what we are willing to sacrifice for it. The story ends with a question, leaving readers to decide for themselves what is truly most precious. Hassan Manasrah's spectacular, intricately detailed illustrations give the philosophical tale an additional layer of wit. Palaces, costumes, and visual references to artistic traditions coexist with contemporary technology and objects, collapsing past and present into one exuberant world. The result is a humorous, thought-provoking book about desire, happiness, friendship, and possessing what we value most. (Age: 8+) [LW]

A little boy in a bright yellow playsuit runs through nature and discovers dandelions. He is accompanied by a cloud, which a short time later becomes encircled by a thunderstorm. The rain and wind look sinister and tear the flowers to shreds. The boy is left saddened at first, but soon the »cloud that stayed« re-appears in the company of the sun and all forms of life return – sprouting again splendidly. The boy relishes his time in this paradisaical jumble of plants, with the cloud in the sky as his companion. In strong, intensive, almost neon-bright colours, the illustrator Mikhaela Angelova tells a story of the cycle of life, of growth and decay, showing that along with joy, sadness also has its place in life. To visualize these changes in mood, Angelova makes clever use of the leporello format. At the »turning point« of the front and back sides, the dramatic build-up reaches its climax, only to be resolved in the second half. (Age: 3+) [KW]

When winter arrives, the world is transformed into a magical space just asking to be discovered. There are dancing ovens, cheeky snowflakes and a giant overstuffed cloud. A modest, pensive snowman, who is still only snow on the meadow, just waiting to be built, is also the subject of one of these 14 short stories by Ivanka Mogilska. In »Polyanka za snezhni choveci« the texts readily shift back and forth between fantasy and reality, giving rise to wondrous moments in the everyday world of the protagonist, a sensitive boy who appears again and again throughout the collection. Mila Yaneva-Tabakova's warm-coloured illustrations magnificently capture the sense of security and the little pleasures that are inherent to the stories. Together with the poetic texts, they make for a calm yet buoyant wintertime book, which focusses on the little wonders and marvellous encounters in the life of a child. (Age: 5+) [KW]

Spain ■ Have you ever heard of a »Focavall« (Sealorse), a »Cocopard« (Crocopard) or a »Lleoneu« (Liox)? No, not ever? No wonder, for these peculiar and unique fabulous beasts originated in the head of Salvador Comelles. In his short poems, the well-known Catalan author has brought to life eleven such creatures, each comprising two types of animals and names. We see, for instance, the sealorse (seal-horse) trotting along with its front legs while juggling a ball with its tail fin, or the two halves of the liox (lion-fox), each hoping that the other won't become a vegetarian. The humorous, frisky poems are perfectly suited for small children. The verses are illustrated by Gusti in his own inimitable style. The colourful pictures that, at first glance, appear to be crooked, askance and rather unsuccessful representations of animals, are weird creatures dashed onto paper with ingenious strokes. »Que estan mirant?« is a fabulous invitation to everyone to play with language and give free rein to one's own imagination. Spain ■ Dinu moves with his father to a remote Romanian mountain village where his recently deceased mother grew up. The boy feels drawn to the Black Forest, which extends nearly up to the village and has supposedly not been entered by anyone for many years. During his forays into the woods, Dinu encounters an ancient raven and fantastical creatures who watch over the forest. At the same time, he stumbles upon secrets about his mother's past. In this novel Laia Longan combines an adventure story, a coming-of-age tale, and family history in a suspenseful, highly atmospheric narrative. Beginning as a fantasy story, it develops into a multi-layered narrative about grief, family origins and connection to nature. The forest is not only setting and background but also interacts with the protagonist as a space for memories and is a habitat under threat. Further strengths of the novel are the combination of suspense and reflection as well as the descriptions of landscape which create a bewitching mood. (Age: 10+) [JW]

The narrow vertical format and elegant cover design of this book immediately spark curiosity. Inside there are six aesthetically illustrated double-page spreads on strong, matt paper which can be unfolded from the middle fold into a sheet double in size. Each chapter is devoted to an animal species or animal family that organises and forms aggregations, sometimes counting thousands of individuals. On the first double pages there are geese, starlings, bees, sardines, ants and penguins, each moving in groups: the gaggle of geese, for example, in a wedge-shaped flight pattern or sardines in a circularly rotating shoal. Subsequently, on the twice-as-large pages, there are further illustrations and compact texts which explain how the animals execute their »choreographic« achievements, why they act in such a spectacular manner, and how they communicate among themselves. In text and picture, in content and in design, this is a fascinating non-fiction book that forms a consistent and harmonious whole. (Age: 8+) [JW]

In her debut, Zheng Weizhen introduces Bak Kut Teh, a popular dish in the city of Klang, Selangor, by following a little girl and her father to a restaurant. Bak Kut Teh translates from Hokkien as »meat bone tea«. It consists of pork ribs slow cooked in a rich broth made with spices and Chinese medicinal herbs. While the girl enjoys mouth-watering ingredients like pork feet and trotters, her dad explains the dish's history. In the 19th and early 20th centuries, thousands of Chinese immigrated to work as »coolies« at the Klang docks or in Malaya's tin mines and plantations. A local food stall owner, Lee Boon Teh, added Chinese medicinal herbs and seasonings into his soup for them. Legend has it that the locals named the dish after him. While Dad's story ends, the girl finishes her meal with a full burp. They depart with takeaways, belly full, heart warm. Crucial to the ethnic identity of the Chinese community in an Islamic country, Bak Kut Teh was recognized as a Malaysian national heritage dish in 2024. (Age: 3+) [LO]

This short story collection for children draws its title from a popular 1960s »red song« (revolutionary song), evoking the writer's childhood and the spirit of childhood today. With his innovative narratives, Liu Haiqi deviates from the typical style and content of Chinese children's fiction and its notions of childhood. Realistic images of children collide with contradictory moral concepts, revealing the vibrancy of a »red« generation's childhood, and proving that, in any era, while the lives of children can be disciplined by mainstream ideologies, their innate free spirit still prevails. With rare precision and density, this collection reworks the era's formal literary language and revives forgotten historical experiences. Liu Haiqi is a renowned publisher, former CBBY Deputy Chairman, and outstanding children's author. His books include »You ge zi de xia tian« and »Wu wei xiao shu li xian ji«. He won the National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature twice and received the 2023 China's Good Books prize. (Age: 10+) [FW, ZX]

A snow deer that has saved a boy and his father is transformed into a little girl who comes knocking on their cabin door. Their bond continues to grow but at the price of the deer becoming invisible. This love story, told in the boy's voice, is marked by a masterfully paced narration and genuine emotions. The illustrations blend the aesthetics of Chinese ink-painting with expressive, modern graphic-novel techniques. Blacks, whites, and greys create an atmosphere drawing on memory and myth, flowing in harmony with the text. This graphic novel was named a 2025 China's Good Book and won the Canadian Applied Arts Award. Peng Yi is a celebrated fantasy writer, translator, and scholar. His works include the fantasy novel »Yu you ling ca jian er guo« and the picture book »Xun lu ren de hai zi«. He received the China Publishing Government Award. Tian Yu's picture books »Qiao men xiao xiong« and »Chang bai sun« received the Times Picture Book Award and the Laurel Children's Book Award. (Age: 10+) [FW, ZX]

This collection features nearly eighty children's poems by Tongzi. They are marked by wild innocence, boundless imagination, playful surprises, and profound philosophical undercurrents. Composed in free form and flowing in rhythm, they delightfully alternate between the quotidian and a world of wonder, suggesting no dissociation between real life and fairy tales, everyday words and poetry. »Halfway through the dream / I suddenly forgot who I was...« »I once threw a lion up into the sky / and it hasn't come down yet...«. Tongzi's generation of authors has expanded the artistic expression and aesthetic scope of Chinese children's poetry, while their seemingly aimless whimsy and ostensibly casual free verse also sparked debate. Should poetry for children be like this? Tongzi's poetry collections include »Chi zu tiao lai tiao qu« (Jumping about barefoot) and »Wo zhi dao suo you wen ti de da an le« (I know the answers to all the questions), the latter won the National Award for Outstanding Children's Literature. Aliya, a little Uyghur girl, eagerly follows her father to the grand bazaar to buy sheep. Afterwards, her father leaves to fix his vehicle, telling Aliya to wait. A startled horse and a rainstorm soon plunge the bazaar into chaos, and Aliya gets lost in the clamour and confusion of the vast market. But people notice her in her red dress and come forward to help, calling her father's name until they find him, thus helping to reunite father and child. Earthy yellows and russet browns in the illustrations evoke a harsh but warm-hearted land where busy folk pause to help a child. Zhou Xiang is a leading figure in promoting contemporary Chinese picture books. His best-known works include »He hua zhen de zao shi« (The morning market of Lotus Town) and »Yi yuan qing cai cheng le jing« (A garden of vegetables became alive). In 2023, Zhou Xiang won »Chinese Excellence in Children's Illustration« at the Bologna Children's Book Fair. (Age: 5+) [FW, ZX]

The story follows young Tiang, who desires to climb Tongku Saveq, the sacred mountain of the Bunun people. Although his father – a high-altitude porter who wants to shield his son from back-breaking labour – is at first reluctant, they embark, together with the grandfather, on a trek that requires courage, responsibility, and physical stamina. Weaving in mythology, ecology, and ancestral wisdom, the narrative follows their ascent to the summit, where Taiwan's breathtaking beauty unfolds. Illustrator Maoyu's intuitive approach rejects stereotypical »tribal styles«; using coloured inks to interweave reality and fantasy, she depicts thin air, mist, textures of trees, rocks, mythical creatures and the well-defined calves of the hard-working Bunun. The book reflects the worldview of the Bunun and their desire to reclaim their sacred mountain. Author and illustrator have received numerous national and international awards. This book was awarded the TIBE Grand Prize 2026 for Children's and Young Adult Literature. (Age: 7+) [LO]

»Ke bu ke yi shuo« pairs the literary imagination of the iconic late Hong Kong writer and poet Xi Xi (1937–2022) with the bold, whimsical visual storytelling of award-winning Hong Kong illustrator Joanne Liu. This celebrated poem has been adapted into a vibrant visual narrative where text and image engage in an entertaining exploration of language through a deceptively simple and rebellious poetic device: the deliberately incorrect assignment of measure words. By rearranging conventional phrases to name the world in unexpected ways, the poem subverts rigid grammatical norms and accustomed perspectives alike: »Can we say: A gourd of universe? A bloom of umbrellas? A bottle of Milky Way? A tail of an emperor?« Beneath this playful surface lies a more subversive intent to upend linguistic norms and question societal rules and world views. Joanne Liu's imaginative illustrations bring this rebellion to life, transforming absurdity into acts of resistance against censorship, highlighting creative freedom and challenging hierarchies. 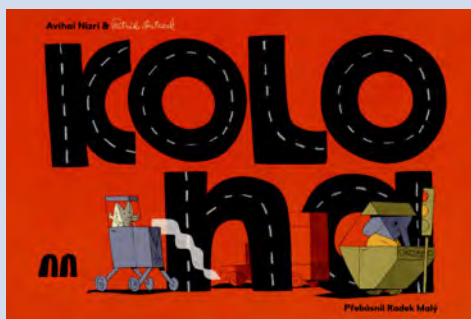

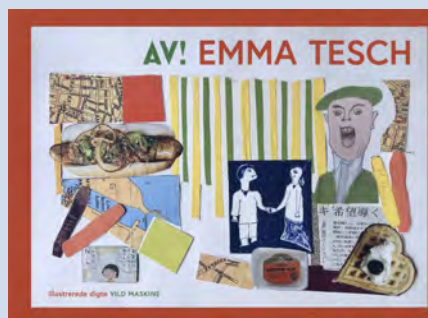

Flemish artists Jacques and Lise take up the idea that »plastic is everywhere« and create an alternative evolutionary history that raises fundamental questions about what it means to be alive, and how living matter can co-exist with plastic matter. In their alternative history, microplastics came first and then clustered to form the first objects which are seen in the illustrations: plastic bags, cutlery and toothbrushes floating in the sea. These are given Latin names, such as »sacculus plasticus«, that mimic paleontological names for fossils. After crawling onto land and further evolving, plastics get bored and invent life. The tale blends elements from the Bible, natural history, encyclopedia articles and pollution warnings in a slightly absurd storyline that prompts more serious discussions. Flags are raised, medals polished, canons brought into position. Yet when the attack never comes, the soldiers resemble disappointed children. With the loss of their imaginary counterparts, their own excitement is exposed as an end in itself. To express the crisis, Tallec employs predominantly dark colours. The clear forms of the city contrast with the diffuse, but more complex depiction of the countryside. This book can be read as a commentary on current political conflicts and militarization. The visitors who are standing between the skeletons help to demonstrate their actual scale. When a young girl touches a Pachycephalosaurus (forbidden!), all dinosaurs suddenly awaken. On the reverse side of the leporello, night becomes day and the children are seen riding and sliding down the animals, depicted with such realistic morphology and subtle colouring that they seem truly alive. On the inside of the book cover, key information about the dinosaurs is presented next to their silhouettes. After many more encounters, Yuki returns to Bao, who has also matured. Together they observe the cycle of nature and understand that »tomorrow will always be a different day«. Clotilde Perrin supplements her vibrant, pithy text with dialogues and commentaries in the illustrations. She employs muted colours for a stunning plant world, always depicting it from the perspective of her witty protagonists. »Brins d'herbe« is a superb book about transformation and can encourage even the youngest readers to shape change themselves and to expand their own horizons. 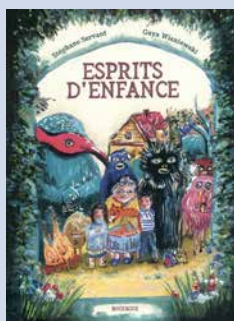

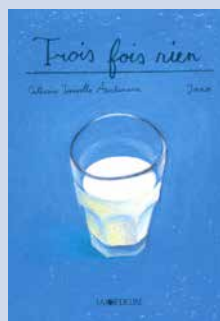

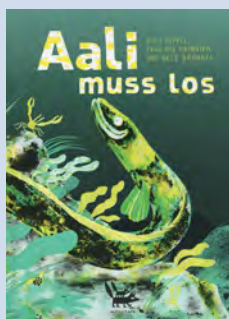

Birgit Weyhe's new graphic novel is another masterpiece. In this book, she links the era of National Socialism in Germany with the rule of the military junta in Argentina in the 1970s. She does so through the stories of two women: Firstly, she presents 17-year-old Jewish Ellen Marx, who flees Germany in 1939 and emigrates to Argentina, where, 40 years later, her daughter Nora disappears during the military dictatorship. Secondly, she follows young German Elisabeth Käsemann, who moved to Buenos Aires in 1970 and – like Nora – was also abducted by the military regime because of her political views. The West-German government refused to call out the terror and did not campaign for Elisabeth's release, as this might have jeopardised the 1978 FIFA World Cup hosted by Argentina. To this day, this stands as a symbol of fundamental cowardice and corruptibility. »Schweigen« is a powerful book about arbitrariness and powerlessness, but also about moments of resistance and courage. 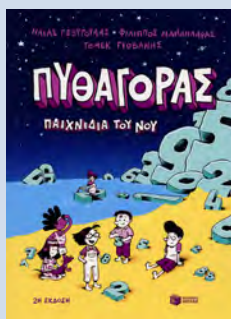

Thus the queue stretches seamlessly from the cover, across the front endpaper, right into the main part: There, the animals wait patiently in front of the ice-cream stall, by the slide and diving platform at the outdoor pool, or outside the toilet. In the chocolate shop, however, something happens: A real – and, what's more, hungry – snake slithers into the shop: Help! Suddenly a big hullabaloo ensues... 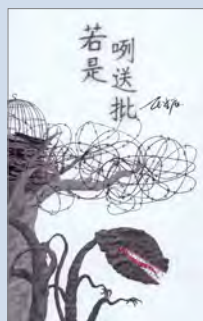

Each one takes the reader back to Romania's socialist period and to Cluj-Napoca, the second largest city, where a Hungarian minority lives. The book gathers widely varying impressions that are neither chronological nor connected by a plotline. Instead, they are coalesced into a multipartite mosaic, which is complemented by Rebeka Hatházi's brilliantly composed collages. The first-person narrator frequently makes use of a latently ironic tone. She depicts school scenes which every pupil will recognize – strict teachers, sports days, playground dynamics. She intersperses these with descriptions of the historical background of socialism – with its shooting practice at school, with Pioneer songs and Pioneer uniforms. All of this makes »A mi iskolánk« a part of the culture of remembrance of an era which the present-day generation still have yet to discover. (Age: 14+) [KW]

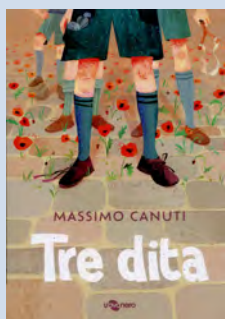

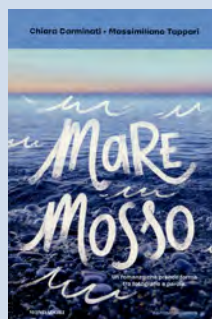

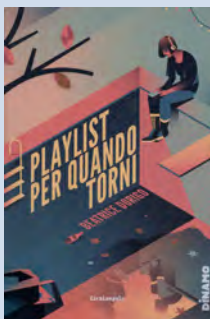

Taking inspiration from the childhood of his father in a Tuscan village occupied by German troops during the Second World War, Massimo Canuti has composed a moving and highly literary novel which gives an authentic view of those years from the perspective of a child. The eleven-year-old narrator, Nado, was given the nickname »Three Fingers« after he found a grenade while playing; it exploded in his hands, and he lost his entire left hand and two fingers of the right. His life was saved by a young German soldier who took him immediately to the hospital. These differing perceptions lead to a bitter dispute that escalates into war. But it is in any case fascinating and, above all, full of facts and insights! Through a well-calibrated balance between text and images, the book conveys fascinating facts about the surprisingly large variety of plants on Earth that eat other living creatures. It gives an overview of the different techniques the plants use to attract, catch and devour their prey. Along with short digressions into the history of explorers and discoverers (e.g., Charles Darwin), »Khto taki khyzhi roslyny?« offers a wide range of detailed portraits of individual plants. Naturally these include species such as the well-known Drosera, commonly known as the sundews, and the Venus flytrap, but also the bladderworts that catch their prey in ponds and rivers, or the Nepenthes, or tropical pitcher plants, which lure victims into large tube-shaped cups that serve as a pit trap. When he asks his grandmother, »Where does Tết come from?« her answer is a poetic journey across the seasons, revealing that Tết grows from tender spring buds and from summer sunshine; it ripens alongside bananas and vegetables and spreads its fragrance in the winter nights. The year's entire harvest will be transformed into candied treats by the time the parents return. Tết is not a mere date, but the emotional reward for a whole year filled with love and patience. The poem breaks with classic Vietnamese rhyming schemes by combining internal and end rhymes and simulating enjambments to lead fluidly into the next stanza or page. The resulting gentle, swaying rhythm evokes Vietnamese lullabies and children's rhymes. For author Quỳnh Lê, Tết is a promise slowly unfolding across all four seasons, while for illustrator Quỳn Thái, it is linked to a sense of nostalgia for rural Central Vietnam. (Age: 4+) [LO]

In this atmospheric bilingual picture book, senior Western Arrarnta woman Marjorie »Nunga« Williams shares a number of childhood memories of growing up on Country in Central Australia. Her colourful full-page acrylic pictures executed in her idiosyncratic style of figurative landscape painting with exaggerated proportions are brimming with details. They depict the various sceneries with their rich flora and fauna, but also highlight the people around her and the hustle and bustle of their daily activities. Her recollections include scenes of going fishing with rods made from sticks, rags, and safety pins; of playing house with friends by the creek; and of families driving »way out bush« for picnics. Each picture is accompanied by a short description in Western Arrarnta and in English, and readers are invited to look for a different detail in every scene. A language introduction at the front of the book gives examples of Western Arrarnta words and of the correct pronunciation of some letters in this Indigenous language. (Age: 5+) [CS]

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
